Of particular interest—especially to those who have never seen one, will be the cutting horse contest on Saturday afternoon.

Final performance in the Rodeo will start at 8:00 p.m. Saturday night. The all-round kid cowboy will be selected after this performance from points he or she has gathered in the two nights of the competition.

There will be no charge to any of the events except the Rodeo for which admission will be \$1.00 for adults and 50c and 25c for children.

"We hope the town will give our visitors a fine welcome and turn out for the Rodeo", Day said.

Board For BCD Picked

The Rankin Board of Directors, in a meeting Tuesday night, voted in Bill Kenney as president, J. W. Kenney as vice president and Dell Hutchens as treasurer. Other members of the board of directors are E. E. Ivy, J. L. Manry, R. L. Dub Day, R. L. Hutchens.

The board is scheduled to meet on the Thursday of each week at the present time.

Plans Revealed For Schools

The architectural firm of Crockett and Covington have completed plans for the building program for Rankin Schools, including renovations and additions and bids have been called for on a portion of the work.

Plans are as follows:

ELEMENTARY BUILDING:

1. Rearrangement of cafeteria,

including a large dining area and a modern kitchen arranged for best use with placement of equipment, walk-in freezer and cooler unit, adequate sanitary garbage disposal area.

2. Teacher work room area, with shelves for library books as well as text and supplemental readers, space for film-strip cabinets and disc-record cabinets and professional materials area for teacher's planning.

3. Classrooms—elementary main-section—each to receive sink and drinking fountain.

4. Elementary "B" Wing—new heating units in each classroom to replace noisy units to be used elsewhere in renovation program. A concrete ramp almost the length of the wing to afford teachers bringing in equipment on stands and casters without difficulty. A centrally located equipment store-room for roll-out equipment to be used in classrooms such as film-strip projectors, 16-mm. projectors, tape recorders, opaque projectors, etc.

5. Rearrangement of play area for primary grades to afford more room.

JUNIOR HIGH

Complete interior renovation of the junior high building, adding size to all classrooms to be used. A large library and science lab to be located in the downstairs section, as well as the teacher's workroom. Each floor level is to

be provided with roll-out equipment storeroom.

Restrooms are scheduled for each floor level. In the gymnasium section, the present bleachers are to be removed and showers and dressing rooms to be built in that section with a gymnasium activities section located above the dressing rooms. Heating units to be replaced and new and adequate lighting to be provided for all rooms.

GYM AND BAND HALL

The high school gymnasium and dressing area is to be extended to provide adequate facilities. The present band hall is to be used for extended gymnasium activities such as weights, weight lifting, ping pong, etc., as well as for storage, laundry, and coaches offices. A new band hall is to be built on the west side of the present location.

STORAGE

The present bus garage to be converted to be used for central storage room, as well as to receive all shipments of freight.

HIGH SCHOOL

One small petition is to be removed in order to afford an adequate teacher workroom. In addition, on each floor level a roll-out equipment center shall be installed through minor alterations. An addition to the industrial arts shop is scheduled to afford adequate floor space for that department for the present program as well as for the expansion into another area. The drafting room is to be included to be part of

the shop with glass partitions for visual supervision. The present drafting room is to be used for student publications.

ADMINISTRATION BLDG.

An administration building to accommodate the superintendent and the business manager-tax collector's office is planned.

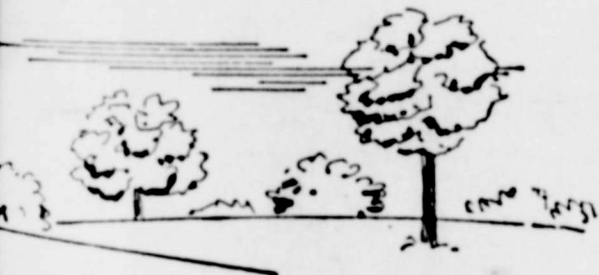

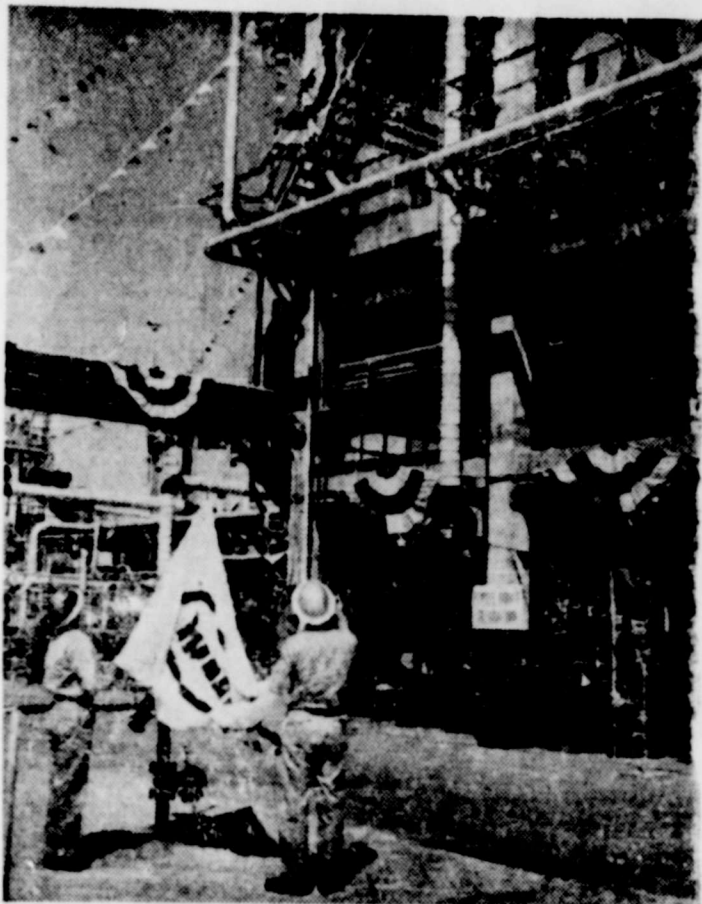

A bus garage to house ten buses is also planned.

BIDS

The architect has let the plans out for bidding and the date for bid opening has been set for 2:00 p.m. June 17. The present plans were not inclusive of cabinet work for classrooms as well as a sight work and landscaping. Word has been received from firms that they hope to have these plans ready for bid within a few weeks. Priority is to be given to the construction of the classroom additions and renovations and the cafeteria. The building plans have been submitted to contractors with the administration building and bus shed to be figured as alternates, meaning they may or may not be built, depending on the amount of money needed to take care of priority items.

Plans have been completed for moving four of the school-owned teacherages to other locations in the community in order to afford more play ground space for the south section of the elementary building and additional parking in the gym area. The Vergil Dobbs residence is to be moved to a location on Elizabeth Street. The purchase of lots for the schools teacherages and the cost of moving the teacherages and the home of Dobb's is to be paid for out of teacherage funds.

The above items are those included in the plans as drawn by the architect and the board can only know the exact cost after bids have been opened and a bidder accepted. It is the board's desire to give emphasis to the instructional needs first.

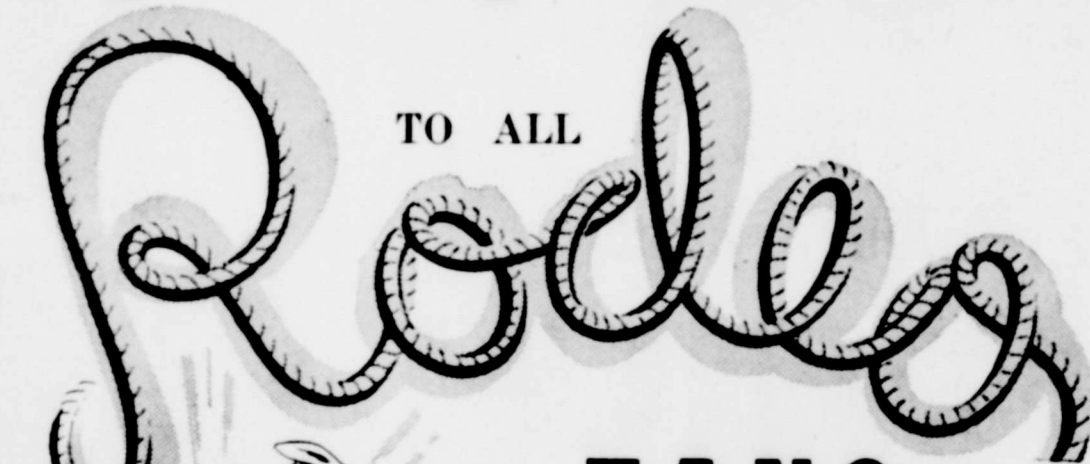

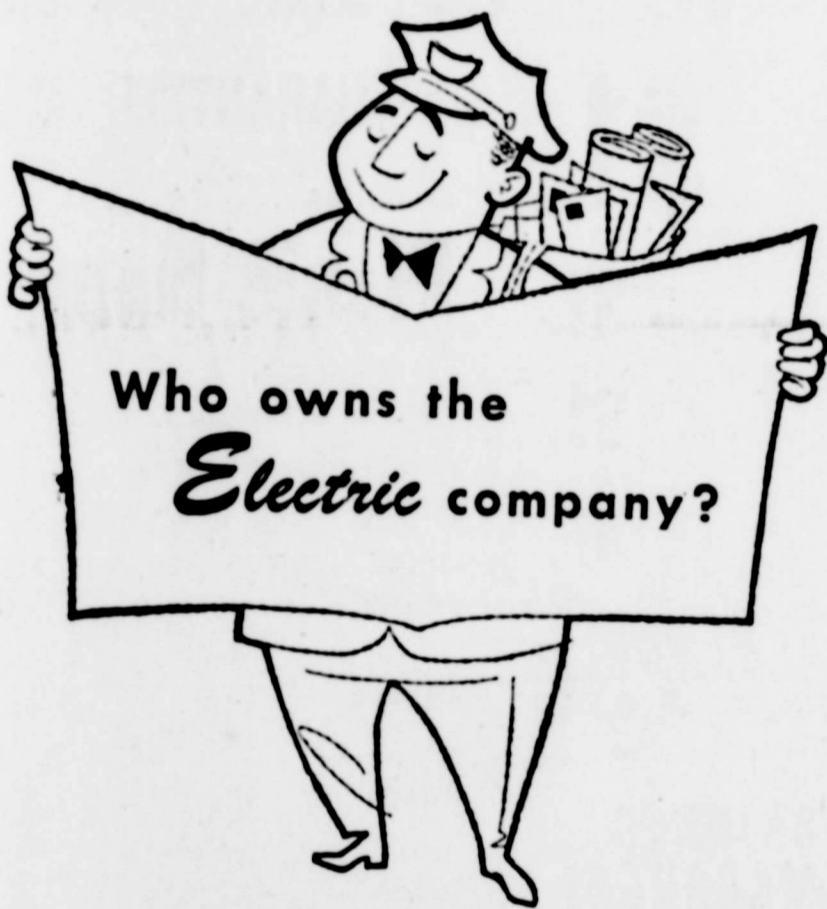
