## ELEMENTARY BUILDING:

 Rearrangement of cafeterianeluding a large dining area and a modern kitchen arranged for best use with placement of equipment, walk-in freezer and coole unit, adequate sanitary garbage disposal area.
2. Teacher work room area, with shelves for library books as well as text and supplemental readers space for film-strip cabinets and disc-record cabinets and professional materials area for teacher's planning
3. Classrooms-elementary main-section-each to receive sink and drinking fountain
4. Elementary "B" Wing-new heating units in each classroom to replace noisy units to be used elsewhere in renovation program. A concrete ramp almost the length of the wing to afford teachers bringing in equipment on stands and casters withouts difficulty.
