remodeling and new additions by
the Rankin School Board.

At the same time, additions to
Rankin homes appears to be on
the upswing according to the local
lumber firms and by a look at
the number of projects presently

underway around the town—both
by professional help and the "do-
it-yourself" variety. The largest of
these additions is being made to
the Dr. J. D. Gossett home where
some 1600 square feet is presently
under construction. The Gossett
family recently added a new back-
yard swimming pool to their home
on Elizabeth Street.

A number of yards have recent-
ly been reworked and fences ad-
ded. At the same time, through
the cooperation of the City of
Rankin and others, all vacant lots
have been cleared of weeds and
trash.

In business building, the High-
way Grocery and Drug is now in
the process of rebuilding after
tearing down their old store. This,
and a proposed Standard Service
Station, bids on which were said
to have been opened last Friday,
will give a boost to the Highway
business frontage. Several others
have indicated minor alterations
and improvements to their firms.

Rankin business houses, through
a recently developed BCD plan of
action, have been making an ef-
fort to improve their services and
the appearance of their establish-

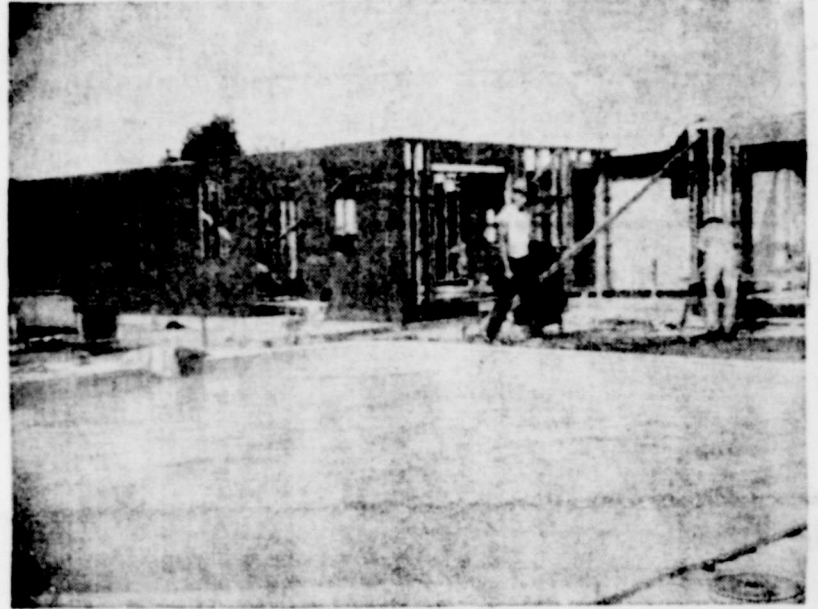

Work Started On Schools

The wrecking crew moved in on
Monday at the Junior High School
and by Wednesday morning had

a little more than \$300,000 going
to Newton Construction Company
of Odessa.

shop area, the new gym and band
hall. New structures planned are

a band hall, bus barn and business
office.

First priority in the program is
being given to the junior high and
cafeteria work which is supposed
to be ready in time for the open-
ing of school on September 12.

The remainder of the work will
be carried out as soon as possible.

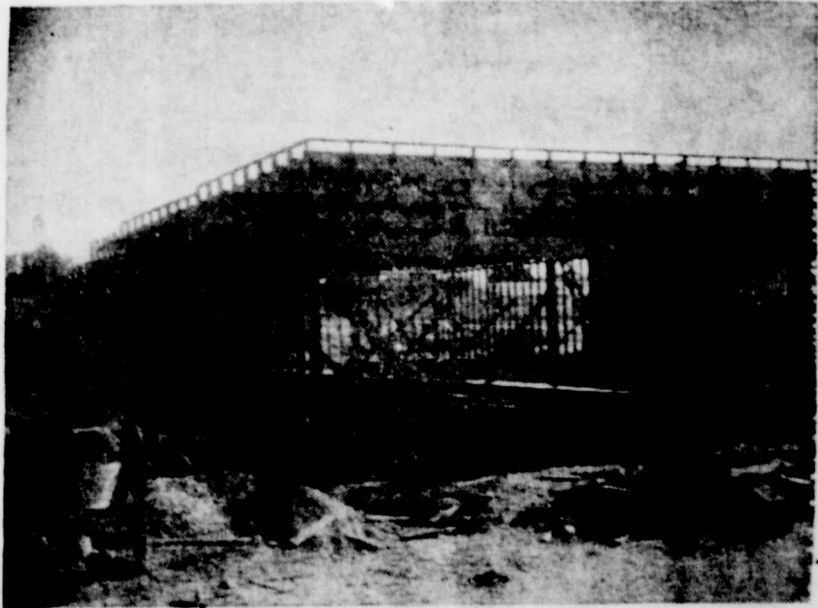

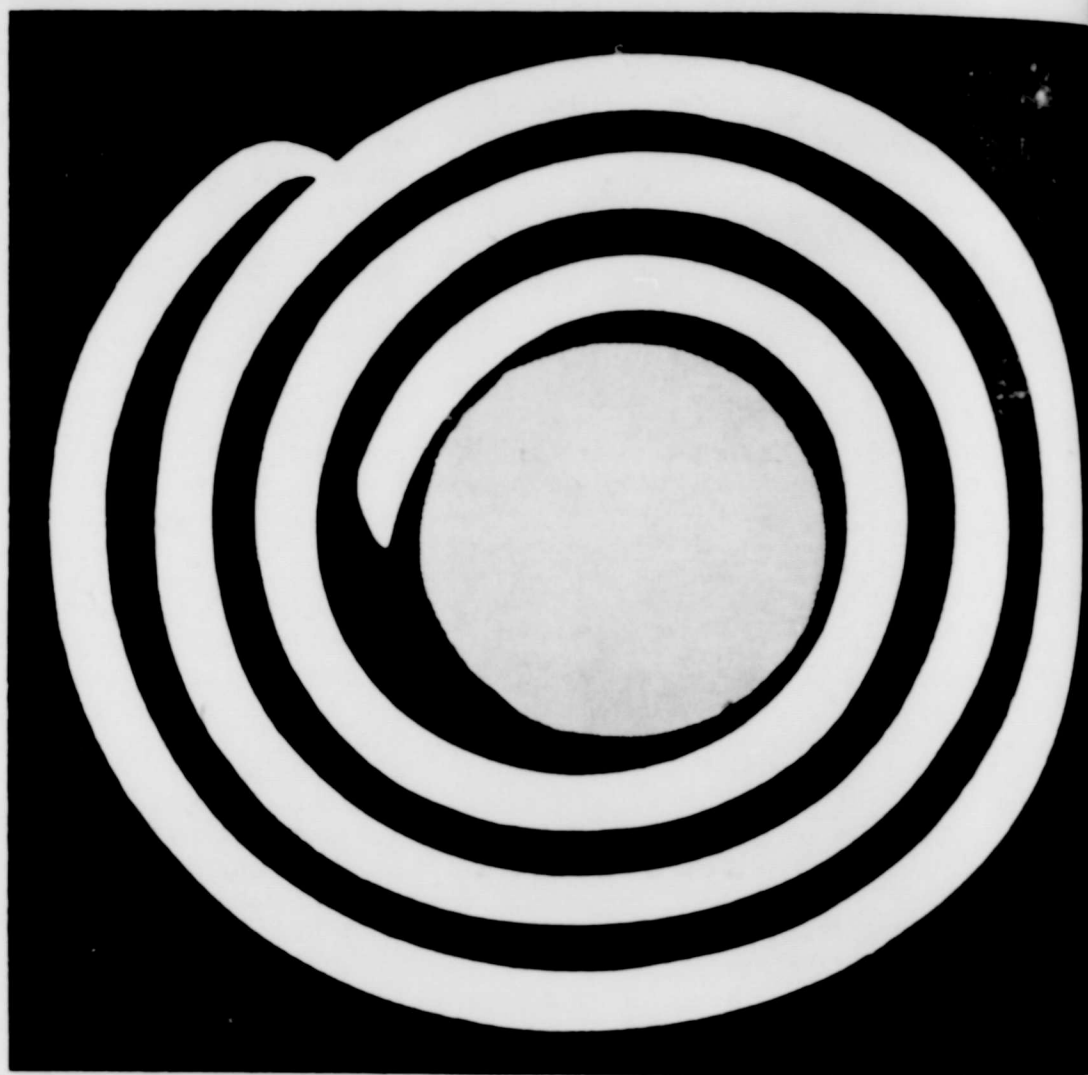
