## Television Cable Service Now Available To Rankin

After some two months of testing during which a few homes in Rankin were tied into the new TV Cable, owners of the Rankin Cable Company have announced that all the bugs have been detected in the installation and that they are now ready to receive all the customers they can get.

Rates for tying into the cable line are \$15.00 down, which will pay up for 2 months, then a regular monthly rate of \$5.00 per month. The \$15 installation fee

pays for all work connected with getting hooked onto the cable and includes all equipment needed to run the line to the home or place of installation. It would not include costs of running lead-in lines through attics or up under floors. Where present television owners already have lead-in wires connected to their set from outside antennas, the cable can be hooked onto these present lines at no extra cost.

Installation and further infor-

mation may be had by contacting H. G. Yocham at Yocham Furniture Company. Yocham will be the Rankin representative for the company. Stations available from the cable are Monahans, Midland and Odessa and are said to be free from all snow or other types of local interference.

The tower for the cable, located on the hill north of Rankin and just off the Midland Highway, was constructed at a cost of approximately \$23,000, including poles and the cable itself which has been erected throughout the city limits of Rankin. At the present time, approximately 50 customers have tied into the service.

## City Begins New Trash Hauling Service Monday

Monday marked the beginning day for use of the newly acquired trash-hauling truck for the City of Rankin. Purchased from the City of Pecos for \$1,000, the truck has been repainted and overhauled and is said to be performing most satisfactorily.

With this new equipment, it is believed that all trash can be picked up throughout Rankin within two days' time. This will give each residence at least twice-a-week trash hauling service.

At the same time, City officials have pointed out that, with the new truck, they will be able to

pick up loose trash such as weeds, grass, sticks, small tree limbs, etc. The trash crew will not be able to haul large items such as dead

cut from trees. Property owners should haul these themselves to the dump ground.

The City has also asked for the cooperation of the public in the manner in which they deposit their trash. Grass, weeds and the like should not be put into the trash cans but stacked beside them for easiest loading. Cans, papers, garbage, etc. are all that should be put into the barrels or cans. Grass and weeds tend to matt once they are packed into the containers and are very difficult for the trash-hauling crew to get out.

Old, burned out barrels should also be replaced as these cannot be picked up for loading.

With the cooperation of everyone, we can have a much cleaner town and give property owners much better service, one city official has pointed out.

## READIES NEW POLICY BOOK DISTRIBUTION TO PUBLIC

page booklet entitled "Regulations of the Schools" is being prepared under the direction of the Independent School District of Trustees by the offices of the school superintendent. It is ready for distribution shortly. In it, set forth all the present and regulations for the schools.

At the same time, they have established the duties of everyone in the schools such as the superintendent, the principals, business manager, bus drivers, etc. It is stated that the purpose of development to the fullest extent, the individual welfare of the society

in which he is to live.

The Board of Trustees is the legal instrument through which the legislative and appraisal functions are exercised. The executive functions shall be delegated fully and completely to the Superintendent of Schools, who shall be charged with the responsibility for devising means and ways of executing efficiently the educational policies adopted by the board.

A large number of other items are covered in the bulletin-type report including the handling of complaints and criticism by parents, students and employees of the district, the administering of discipline—which includes corporal punishment or spankings, for disregard of rules and regulations, the married students; pupil bus passengers; senior trips, awards, etc.

It sets forth the teaching policies

for students in elementary, junior high and high school and points out that a total of 29 subjects are now offered in Rankin High.

The policy booklets will be distributed to all teachers and school employees. Any interested individual may pick one up at the high school administration office now.

## TEXAS LAWMEN

### Chas. A. Siringo, the Pinkerton Man

"One hand on a 6-shooter, the law in the other!"

One Texas lawman made his hot pursuit of crime pay off in cold cash. Charles A. Siringo wrote books about it, some of the best sellers of yesteryear. He had many a tall tale to tell.

Born in Matagorda County, 1855, he left home, and school, as quickly as possible for life on the Mississippi. After several round trips from New Orleans to St. Louis, he headed for the West and a cowpony, ranging through Colorado, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas. At one time Siringo became a Chisholm Traildriver, and was next heard of as a Pinkerton detective. In those days "the Pinkertons" were fast, famous and fearsome—the man-hunters who never failed! And this was, apparently, Siringo's happy hunting ground.

During the next 22 years the Texas rolling stone gathered a fine polish as the relentless nemesis of Southwestern desperados. But—at the height of his renown as a Pinkerton, he abruptly quit, set up as a storekeeper in Kansas and began to write. His best known books were "A Texas Cowboy, or 15 Years on the Hurricane Deck of a Spanish Pony," "A Lone Star Cowboy," "The Cowboy Detective" and "Riata and Spurs."

As Texas lawmen were making this a better place to live, industry and commerce were playing their part, too. And one industry, brewing, was providing enjoyment as well as employment, and the pleasures of moderation as well as revenue for the communities. In Texas "Beer Belongs." Brewers, wholesalers, retailers and the United States Brewers Foundation are working constantly in cooperation with today's lawmen, to assure the sale of beer and ale under pleasant, orderly conditions.

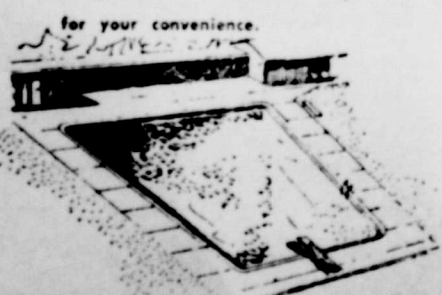
