## Rankin School Activities Begin Annual Fall Upswing

### NEW TEACHERS HIRED FOR TERM

Six new school teachers have been approved by the Rankin Board of Trustees and possibly three others are prospects for employment here this fall. New faces in the faculty will include:

**Robert L. Holden**, new elementary principal and past employee at Kerrville schools. The Holdens have four sons. He is a graduate of South West Texas State College and is from Austin.

**Raymond Earl Roycroft**, the new high school math teacher, is 24-years-old and a graduate of South West Texas State College and is from Goliad, Texas.

**Miss Ima Gene Bouldin**, and the future Mrs. Roycroft, will teach high school English. She is 21-years-old, a graduate of Southwest Texas State College and is from Harwood, Texas.

**Mrs. Melba Jameson Wilson**, 24-years-old, and a graduate of SW-TSC, will be the new homemaking teacher in high school this year.

**Mr. Clifford Edwin Wilson**, age 26, and a graduate of Southwest Texas State College, will teach the Sixth Grade and is from Silver, Texas.

**Gene Austin**, age 25 from Eagle Lake, Texas, is a SWTSC graduate and will teach the 5th grade in Rankin.

Preliminary school census figures indicate a possible increase in overall school enrollment of 25-30 students in Rankin Independent School District this fall.

**FOOTBALL SEASON—**

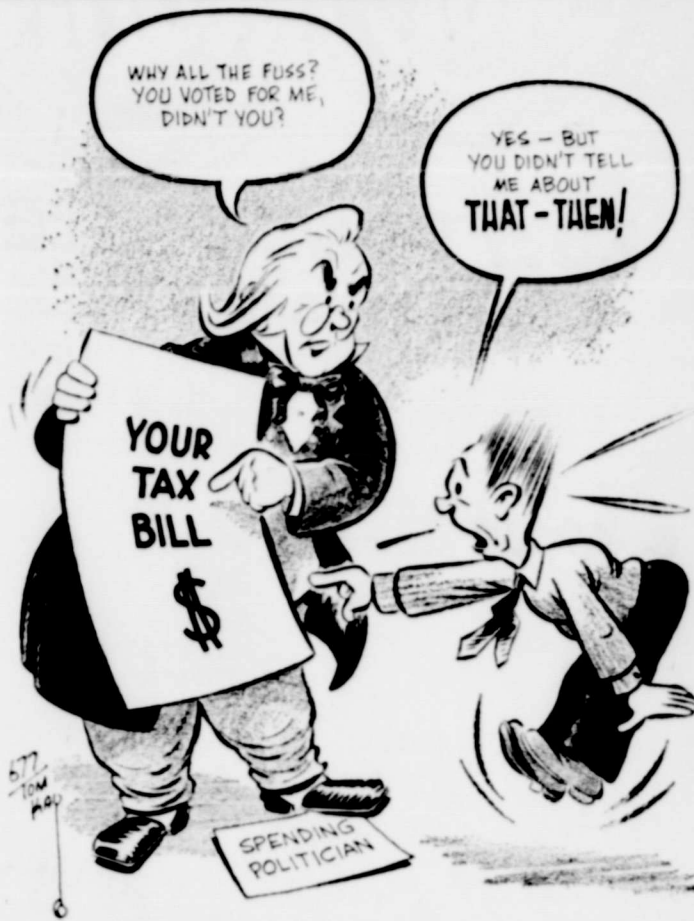

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing to three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first

Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency cancels or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballots; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; provided, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest all contracts for a greater rate of interest than ten per centum (10%) per annum shall be deemed usurious; provided, further, that in contracts where no rate of in-

terest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Should any regulatory agency, acting under the provisions of this Section, cancel or refuse to grant any permit under any law passed by the Legislature; then such applicant or holder shall have the right of appeal to the courts and granted a trial de novo as that term is used in appealing from the justice of peace court to the county court."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Elrod is one of sixty stockmen in a large area of West Texas who has been asked to serve as "Wagon Boss" to contact ranchmen in their own communities and urge them to donate a few head of livestock as gifts, tax-deductible.

Livestock given will be marketed through regular channels on special sale days at Producers Livestock Auction Company in

San Angelo. Plan is to auction sheep August 17 and cattle August 19. Livestock in the various communities will be taken to central gathering points Monday, August 15, then trucked to San Angelo. Any class or number of livestock will be acceptable whether they be good calves and lambs or old cows or ewes. The only requirement is that they be salable.

All proceeds from this First Annual Fall Roundup sale will go to Boys' Ranch for the Ranch's operation. The animals are to be sold, not retained for the Ranch.

The Boys' Ranch is a West Texas Project, organized in 1947 to serve "hard-luck" boys of West Texas. The Ranch has served boys from almost every county in this West Texas area during its thirteen years of operation, and is currently planning to expand to accept the increasing number of applicants.
