Plans Clinic For Community Projects

Billy Watson, manager of the Rankin Board of City Development, said this week that a course on the program of work to be conducted as a community clinic, has been scheduled for later this month. A definite date will be announced in the near future.

The clinic will be a one-night affair and will be open to all BCD members and the public in general. Covered in the discussion, which is to be directed by Mr. Ralph Duncan, community services manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, will be the importance of a program of work in a small town such as Rankin. In the program will be outlined a definite list of projects wanted and needed in Rankin.

Watson has urged all Rankinites interested in planning this program to attend the clinic. He has pointed out that a work program is the blueprint for action and that the thinking of as many as possible will be needed for designing such a plan for Rankin.

Pettit Replaces Moore As Rankin Mayor Resigns

In a special called meeting of the Rankin City Council on last Thursday night, Allen Moore submitted his resignation as Mayor of Rankin. Moore took office last May following a close city contest between himself, J. W. Kennedy and write-in candidate, E. C. Hig-

day. Kennedy, the second highest man in the voting for Mayor, was appointed City Councilman to fill the unexpired term of J. B. Pettit, Jr. who moved up to Mayor. Pettit has served as City Councilman for 8 years and was the only carryover city official this M. O. Price, who took office at the same time with Moore in May, is the other Councilman.

In submitting his resignation, Moore stated that he was planning to bid on work that is forthcoming for the city during which some new water and sewer lines will be installed. He said that he did not believe it would be fair for him to serve as Mayor while doing the work for the City and that he felt he should look after his business interests while at the same time, trying to avoid any criticism of being Mayor whenever the contract for the work was let by the city council.

The new Mayor, who took office

Councilman Kennedy is another long-time resident and is employed by the Shell Oil Company. He has been active in civic and church affairs for a number of years and is a director on the Rankin BCD.

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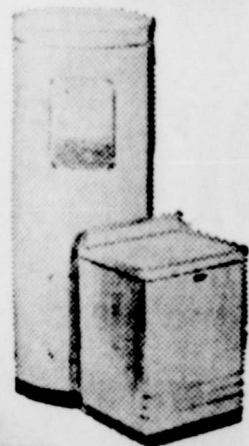

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

Except in wording, there seems to be no difference in the two platforms, both being written by minority pressure groups.  In 1946 the U. S. Senate passed a resolution giving the World Court jurisdiction in international disputes affecting the US. However, a provision was included that the World Court would not have jurisdiction in the "matters which are essentially within the domestic jurisdiction of the US as determined by the US". This provision is known as the Connally Amendment which is now propos-

ed to repeal.

Big Money Comes From Animal Sales In Sheep Business

Sheep growers get over twice as much money from the sale of animals as they do from wool.

Last year's cash receipts from marketing of sheep and lambs, including farm sales of lambs and mutton, were over \$336 million. In addition, sheep raisers consumed almost \$4 million worth of their own lambs and mutton, so that their gross income from the sheep enterprise totaled \$340 million. This was a little less than in 1958 but more than any other year before 1952.

About two-thirds of the income from sheep during 1950-54 came from the sale of animals. Since then Government payments to encourage wool production have raised the income attributable to wool somewhat.

The value of shorn wool produced in 1959 was \$110 million, a fourth more than in the year before. Farmers will receive additional income in the form of incentive payments, but these payments are expected to be somewhat less than they got for the 1958 clip, approximately \$85 million.

part of the \$32,777 million received from marketings of all crops and livestock last year. Even including income from wool, receipts from sheep raising were less than 2 percent of the farmers' cash receipts. But in some States—notably those with extensive dry or mountainous pastures—sheep provide a much larger part of the farm income than that for the country as a whole.

Iowa, Colorado, California and Texas lead in receipts from marketing of sheep and lambs with sales of over \$20 million each.
