




—He should have his sights set on the future, and be able and willing to consider the broader picture.

FIRST PHONE CALL VIA SATELLITE!

The day isn't too far off when you and your family, relaxing in your home right here in Rankin, may watch a royal wedding in Europe or a tennis match in Australia by live television. Or you may place a call to Singapore or Calcutta-by way of man-made satellites thousands of miles in the sky.

These things were only dreams a few years ago. Now they are much closer to reality, all because of "Project Echo." It was the first successful attempt to "bounce" a voice off a satellite.

Perhaps you've seen the silvery "Echo" satellite orbiting the earth. To think of "bouncing" a phone call off it staggers the imagination. But that's what happened when a Bell Telephone Laboratories engineer in New Jersey talked by way of outer space with an engineer in California. They said they could hear each other as clearly as if they were talking across town.

Project Echo relied heavily on telephone science and technology. Bell Laboratories scientists not only participated in the first test of voice communications via satellite, but Bell Labe provided the guidance system that directed the satellite into its selected orbit.

This test opens a new era of worldwide communications. The Bell System has already proposed a plan for using satellites as relay stations to carry telephone calls and television programs throughout the world.
