HOMECOMING SLATED FOR RANKIN THIS WEEK-END

ABSENTEE VOTING OPENS

Absentee voting in the November 8 General Election got underway here Wednesday, Oct. 19, according to Nancy K. Daugherty, County Clerk. Anyone who is not physically able to go to the polls on November 8 or who will be out of the county on that date is eligible to cast their ballot in absentee. Also, this would apply to residents such as men in the armed services who still have home addresses in the county.

This year's general election ballot will be the largest in size to be printed in recent years having a total of six columns, including the write-in column, in which voters will have a chance to choose their candidates. Included will be 4 proposed constitutional amendments to the Texas Constitution. Political parties listed on the ballot and having candidates for of-

fices, in the order which they will appear, are: Democratic, Constitution, Republican, Independent, and Prohibition, plus the write-in column in which voters may write in the name of anyone they prefer in preference to those whose names are printed on the ballot.

A total of 2500 ballots were ordered.

Political interest in the Rankin area was reasonably light as of this week with only a mild interest being expressed generally in the presidential race. Apparently following the trend said to be developing across the state, Rankinites have not spoken out much of late about their choices in the presidential race but it would appear that the Republicans and the Democrats are fairly evenly split here with the edge going Democratic.

Crowning of Homecoming Queen at halftime.

Homecoming Dance— Park Building from after the game until 1:00 a.m. Admission is \$1.50 per couple and \$1. stag.

Saturday, October 22—Ex-Students' Coffee at the Rankin Golf Club at 9:30 a.m.

Postal cards have been mailed to over 150 exes in the hopes that this can be one of the largest and best enjoyed homecomings in Rankin school history. Local exes are to consider this news item as a personal invitation. Postal cards were not sent locally.

The Homecoming dance is for former students and their families, present high school students and their dates, present and past faculty members and their husbands and wives. It is not open to the general public.

The coffee is for former and present students, ex-faculty members and present faculty members plus their husbands and wives.

"The Rankin High School Student Council and many of your friends are looking forward to seeing you at the 1960 homecoming," a spokesman for the group has stated.

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Red Devil-Sanderson Game To Highlight Homecoming

Friday night, the winless Rankin Red Devils will host the team with the best record in District 7A as the Sanderson Eagles and the single wing formation move into town for the second round of conference play for both squads.

Last week, the Red Devils went down 32-0 before the Van Horn Eagles while Sanderson was having their hands full in winning over an Iraan team that has yet to score a win. Sanderson was de-

feated one time this year, by the Ozona Lions, a team which also posted a win over Rankin.

For the Red Devils, weakened last week by sickness, it will appear that they will be in a little better shape this week. Coaches report good workouts and a better spirit than has been evident for some time. One blow struck the squad however when it was found that Fred Moore, 210 pound lineman, had a broken bone in his foot and would be out for the remainder of the season.

A "B" game originally scheduled with Monahans was called off this week when it was found that too many boys would be involved who might be needed Friday night. A Junior High game is set for Thursday afternoon.

In the Sanderson Eagles, over which the Red Devils hold an edge in games won, fans will get to see the old-style single wing in action. The Eagles have too fine backs, both leaders in scoring in the district, and are said to be better than average on defense. Points in favor of the Red Devils will be the home field advantage, plus homecoming spirit and the fact that they would like to beat somebody.

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THE SCOOP by Scoop

BEEN POLLE DLATELY?—

Just about everywhere you look at this stage of the game, you find the results of a guaranteed, 100 per cent accurate poll taken in Scratchme, N. J. or Brokenneck, Neb. that proves most definitely and without a shadow of doubt that Nixon is going to win the election. At the same time, and often on the same page of a newspaper, you find another poll that gives the match to Kennedy beyond a shadow of a doubt.

I have reached a point where I put about as much faith in these polls as I do in my own forecasting of how the Red Devils will do from week to week. So far I have batted 1000—all wrong.

In this matter of taking polls to find out what people are thinking, it would seem to me that a poll of some sort ought to be taken to see what the candidates are thinking—all the candidates, that is, except LBJ. It fairly obvious that he is thinking of his own neck.

And speaking of the Red Devils, this week, just for a change, I'll pick Sanderson to beat them by two touchdowns and see if that will change their luck or make them mad enough to play football. I hope it does.

AND THE BAND PLAYED ON—

Last week, the Red Devil Band did not make the trip to Van Horn. This was done by order of the school board.

At about the time news got out that the band would not go to Van Horn, certain individuals in town had a walled-eyed fit and proceeded to raise Ned about this most terrible happening since the Japs bombed Pear Harbor.

Now that's a queer attitude. It was only a few years ago that most schools did not even have bands and if they did, they were not transported approximately 400 miles to play a half dozen numbers at a one-hour football game. Not long ago, there was a big rumble in town about the amount of money spent by the schools and most especially about how much went into athletics. It was said

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to be all wrong. Tax money ought to always be saved. And then, at various times, there has been comments on safety first for the students, common sense applied to sports, etc.

Now, for the first time, a little of these many suggestions were followed in deciding not to send the band to Van Horn—and also to Fabens later on. And the roof came tumbling down.

It would seem to me that's it time we made up our minds just what we want and stick with it. Personally, I think it was about the smartest thing that has been done concerning band trips since I have been around these parts. I, for one, would not permit my kid to make a trip to Fabens just to toot a horn for twenty minutes. I'd even think once before getting my golf clubs out and going that far to play nine holes.

It does the school and the students no good to have the citizens raise a stink every time things do not go just to suit them and by them, it might be pointed out that "them" is not a majority. We have elections every year to select board members to run the schools. If we elect them, we must think they have enough judgment to know how to handle the job else we would not have elected them. In turn, they are closer to the workings of the school than any others of us in the district. They know the financial situation where most of us only have a vague idea about taxes, expenditures and such. It is their responsibility to give their best efforts toward operating the schools in a businesslike and efficient manner. To do this, they spend a lot of their own time—free—in night meetings mostly, and take into consideration a lot of different angles whenever they establish a school policy.

Certainly, we as citizens have a right to disagree with their policy or method of operations but we, as citizens, have an obligation of our own and that is to lend our support to the school and its efforts to improve the educational

with our children try to get along in this

After all, I believe we all agree that school is first, a place of learning and second, a place in which to have a good time.

If we find that we cannot hold

with the board, then we should replace the members at election time. And at election time—if we feel that the board members are wrong in their efforts, we should step up and offer ourselves as a replacement. Then, if the majority of the citizens feel as we do, they will elect us to the job.

In the meantime, let's not have so dad-blamed many sideline quarterbacks for the school board but remember that these are elected officials and that we have a few obligations other than bitching about the way things are run.

Comes next April, there ought to be a whole slug of candidates since we seem to have more than our fair share of people qualified and thoroughly versed on how to run a school.

SAMPLE BALLOT—

A Sample Ballot of the General Election appears in this issue of the News. Save it. Look it over closely, especially the constitutional amendments. Know what you are voting for on these things. If we, as voters, would take a little more time and make sure that we are voting the way we want

to vote, we would often avoid the mistakes that have been made in the past on these amendments. And, a lot of us still do not know how to mark a ballot in order to vote the way we want to vote. If you are not sure, ask your election judge and he will instruct you. You may think you are voting for or against some particular candidate when, in fact, you are not casting a vote at all. Study the ballot and make sure of what you want to do.

QUESTION—

Last week the Grand Jury met in Rankin for an all-day session. A large number of witnesses were on hand, including some school students, and the Grand Jury was said to have a number of questions which they wished to investigate in Upton County. It was a long day.

The only thing missing was the District Judge, the District Attorney and the County Attorney. Question: "Have our elected officials come to the point where they are too busy to meet with the Grand Jury or did the Grand Jury have a hot potato?"

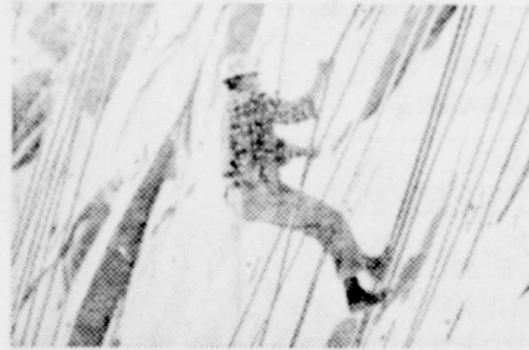

Mrs. J. D. Haywood of Rankin, Mrs. Weldon W. Webb of McCamey, and Mrs. Zane Harshbarger of the Benedum-Texas Natural Camp will begin work with younger girls on clothing and foods units right away. Other subject matter units will be taken up as leaders are available.

Grapefruit, orange and lemon peel, apples, pears, carrots, pumpkin, pineapple, and cherries were among the products crystallized, and observed in various stages of preparation, and sampled by women in Rankin, McCamey and Big Lake in demonstrations this month. 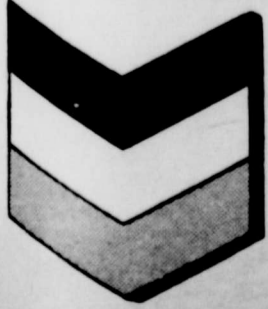
