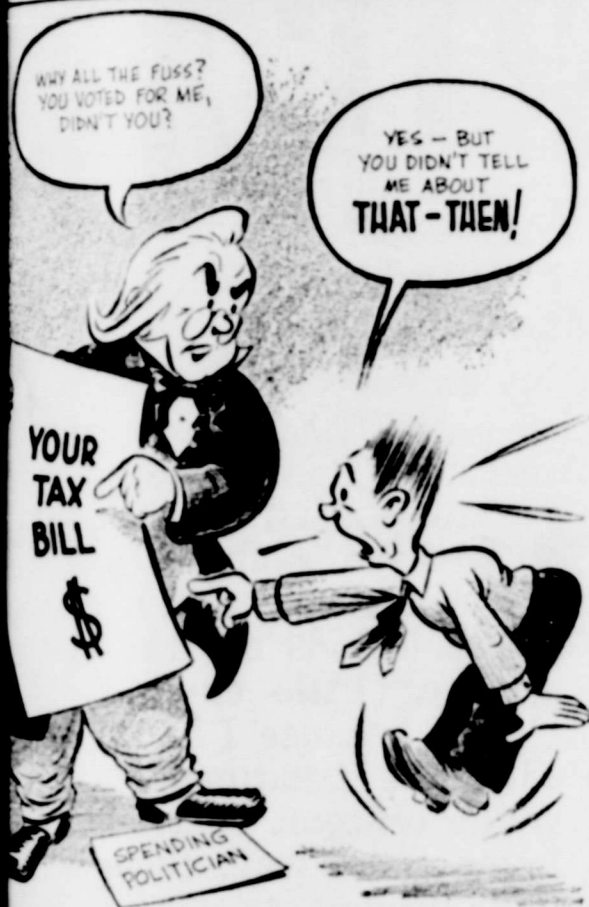

# Voters To Ballot Tuesday In General Election Poll

Upton County voters will join with the Nation Tuesday, November 8 in the general election which is expected to pick the next president. Local interest centers almost entirely on this particular race in the voting and those close to the political situation in the county are said to be picking the Democrats to carry Upton County—some say by as much as two to one.

In McCamey, a strong write-in

race is said to be underway for the commissioner's post in Precinct 3 where E. K. Buford, the Democratic nominee, is being opposed by Jack Carr in the write-in. Buford defeated Carr in the first Primary by almost 4 to 1.

An indication of the interest in the election is the fact that some 128 absentee ballots had already been cast at the clerk's office and Mrs. Nancy Daugherty, clerk, has estimated that the total may go

over 150. A majority of these are from Box 4 which is the Precinct 3 voting box. Absentee voting will close at midnight, Friday, November 4.

Mrs. Daugherty has said that her office will remain open until 10:00 p.m. Friday night for the convenience of those who cannot come during regular hours.

Voting will get underway here at 8:00 a.m. with the polls being open until 7:00 p.m. Box 1 voters will cast their ballots at the court house with E. C. Higday as the election judge and Boyd Cox as his assistant.

Box 2 will be at the Rankin Park Building with Norman Elrod as the judge and Bert Browning as his assistant.

# THE SCOOP by Scoop

## ABOUT TIME—

Finally, we're going to get to cut the mellow. Next Tuesday, it will be decided just who is to be what in the national elections.

This year a good many people in one place and another have come up with the idea that it is time we changed our way of holding the general election—that too much time is left between the nominations of the candidates and the voting. After missing a few dozen of the best TV programs, plus having to listen to first one and then another tell of the virtues of his respective candidate—and getting all nervous and bothered about the situation myself, I have come to the conclusion that the folks who want a change are right. Perhaps in the old days it was necessary to have a lot of time between the nominations and the voting since communications by the pony express, stage coach, etc. were sometimes a little slow. Nowadays with all the modern and fast communication methods available, we can get all the scandal on any candidate in two weeks or less. After that we hear the same thing hashed over and over or a little new tidbit is fed out from time to time.

It does not appear that any more than a very small handful of people in Upton County have changed their minds about the candidates and their parties since last July. Most likely the vote could have been taken here the week after the conventions and the percentage would have been the same as it will be next Tuesday.

Now some zillion or two dollars have been spent, a lot of time has been wasted and we're ready to go to the polls and vote. Forecasting elections is almost a useless thing as has been proved in the past but just for the record I will make this one: Upton County will go Democratic, Texas will go for Nixon and—going against the poll taken by weekly newspaper men all over the Nation—I forecast that we will have our first Catholic President when Kennedy takes office in January. (The weekly newspaper editors, who have been correct on every poll taken, predict a Nixon victory. They goofed this

time, I fear.)

And I further forecast that good ole LBJ will be elected to the office of vice-president and to that of Senator all at the same time, proving that anyone who can get in the saddle in Texas can get away with anything since it appears that a majority of Texas voters think kindly toward anyone who can manipulate them around.

If my crystal ball is not colwided, Tuesday, November 8, 1960 will be marked as the date America turned to Socialism.

Without trying to tell anyone how he should or should not vote, but because we have been asked to do so, the following information is for whatever use you care to make of it:

1. It does not matter how you voted in any primary election or how your poll tax has been stamped, you can vote for any candidate you choose in the election Tuesday.

2. You do not have to vote for all the candidates of any one party as they appear on the ballot. You can vote for candidates in two different parties or you can vote for some in all the parties listed and can write in names if you so desire.

3. You must scratch out the names of all the rest of the candidates in any given race, leaving your choice the only unmarked name in that race.

4. If you do not approve of the platforms of the party for which you wish to vote and wish to split your ballot on the presidential election, you can register a protest vote against the platform by voting for several other candidates in some other party such as the Constitution party. This way your vote, when the policy makers get their heads together to analyse the vote, will show that you not only disapproved of the party's candidate but also the platform, otherwise, if you vote only against the presidential candidate and cast the remainder of your votes down the party line, it will be interpreted to mean that you just did not like the candidate.

5. Constitutional Amendments—

No. 1 on the ballot deals with

the creation of a hospital district in Lamar and Hidalgo Counties. A similar amendment was approved two years ago for Amarillo. It will be of no effect, if it carries, until the people involved in the two counties give their approval to the district.

No. 2 on the ballot deals with allowing the Veteran's Land Board to increase the payable interest rate on veterans' land bonds from

3 to 3½ percent. This involves about \$2 million worth of bonds and the extra ½ percent, along with the original 3 percent, will be payable by the people of Texas.

No. 3 on the ballot concerns a raise in pay for members of the Legislature and sets the amount at some \$6,240 per year provided they are in session 120 days. On an off year—when the Legislature is not in session—the salary would

be \$4,800.

No. 4 is a proposed shark control and the Legislature the power to loans and lenders maximum rates of

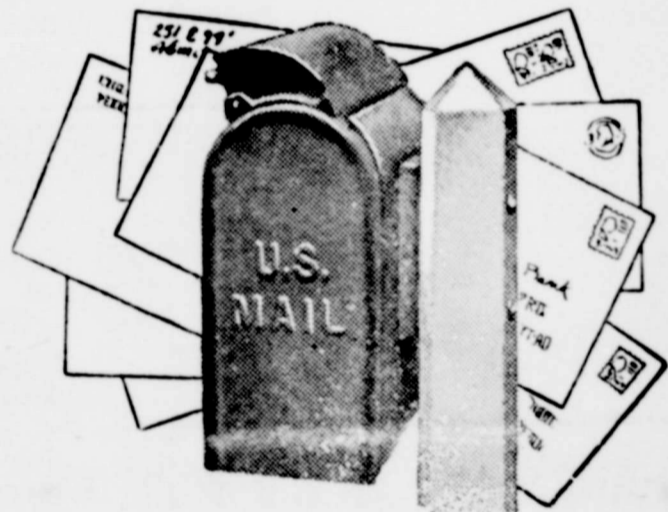
