2. You do not have to vote for all the candidates of any one party as they appear on the bollot. You can vote for candidates in two different parties or you can vote for some in all the parties listed and can write in names if you so de-

3. You must scratch out the names of all the rest of the candidates in any given race, leaving your choice the only unmarked name in that race.

4. If you do not approve of the platforms of the party for which you wish to vote and wish to split your ballot on the presidential election, you can register a protest vote against the platform by voting for several other candidates in some other party such as the Constitution party. 
