Betty Ann Holder Is Omicron Tau Host


November 22 Betty Ann Holder was hostess to Omicron Tau Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi. Roll call was answered by a nonsense jiggle.

Rankin Booster Club members met last Tuesday night at 7:45 p. m. at which time Coach Don Leach explained the changes in the rules for basketball for the current season.






