Postal Receipts Register Slight Decline For Year

Postal receipts for the Rankin Post Office were off slightly for the year just ended as compared with receipts for 1959, according to Grace Roach, Rankin Post Master.

Total receipts for 1960 amounted to \$16,911.04 as compared to the 1959 receipts of \$18,546.83—a net

decrease of \$1,635.79. This was the second year in a row that gross receipts for the Rankin Post Office have shown a decline.

However, the December mailing for 1960 was well over that of the month of December, 1959. In December just past, the total gross was \$1,549.00 as compared with a

Other items of interest to voters will be the school and city elections here in April—both requiring a poll tax. In addition, other special elections such as bond issues, could be called during the year by city, school or county officials.

Ad-Valorem taxes owed the county and state also go delinquent on January 31 and penalty and interest will be added to these taxes after that date, it was pointed out by the Tax Collector's office. In Rankin, all such taxes may be paid at the courthouse.

Exemptions for residents over 60 and those who are 21 and voting for the first time, are issued at the tax office without charge. Regular poll taxes are \$1.75 each. Over-age exemptions are issued to voters who are 60 prior to January 1 of the year assessed—in this case, 1960.

Poll tax payments are always for the preceding year, thus, those now on sale are 1960 taxes.

Upton County Marks Business Gains in '60

According to a report released this week by Dun & Bradstreet from their Fort Worth offices, 244 manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers are now operating in Upton County.

During the past year, 139 changes were made in the records of the company as related to this county. Forty-nine names were added, 37 deleated and 53 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occuring in Upton County are about even with the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds, according to Dun & Bradstreet.

Upton County has managed to mark up a slow but steady gain in the number of businesses in operation over the past several year. In 1956, the count was 134 and in 1958, it was 184.

gross of \$1.316.87 a year ago, indicating that the local office has experienced a rise in business for the past several weeks and wnich is believed to be continuing thus far into 1961.

Cancelling machines recordings of first class mail cancelled from December 1 through December 24 for 1960 was 30,340 pieces and for the same period in 1959 was 30,870 pieces, a reduction of some 530 pieces under last year mailing even though the gross volume of money collected was up for 1960. These figures do not include large flat manila envelopes, bulky letters, unusually small envelopes or metered mail, all of which does not go through the cancelling machine, the Post Master has explained



WASHINGTON-J. M. Swing, commissioner of immigration and naturalization, announced Saturday that all non-citizens must report their addresses in January under the U. S. Law.

Rankin area aliens can report their addresses by getting a card at the Post Office.

The legal requirement applies to all aliens admitted for permanent residence who have not been naturalized and to all aliens temporarily visiting the United States. The only exceptions are: Non-citizens in diplomatic status, foreign representatives if international organizations of which the U.S. is a member, and those admitted temporarily as agricultural labor-

Swing also stressed that no address card should be mailed. He said the alien should return the card to the clerk who issued it.

Swing said 2,948,000 aliens reported their addresses last January. The 1961 figure will be about 3,000,000, he predicted.
