ones in other places.
For instance, a number of cities in the North have their own Municipal Income Tax (Ugh). It costs $\$ 29.81$ per head to live in Cincinnati; $\$ 26.01$ in Toledo; $\$ 25.88$ in St. Louis; and $\$ 23.57$ in Philadelphia. Having been in each of these places, I don't think it's worth it.

Here in Rankin-the place that has such high taxes according to some-the tax rate is $\$ 1$. In Amerillo it is $\$ 1.30$; in Beaumont, $\$ 1.72$ in Dallas, $\$ 2.40$; in San Antonioa cheap town- $\$ 2.00$; in Lubbock, $\$ 1.50$-rates that range all the way up to 140 percent more than Rankin.
We don't have a lot of things here-and one of them is high taxes.
