City, School Ballot Positions Kennedy Out **For City Post**

With the deadline near for filing in the city election for the city councilman seat up for voting, only the incumbent, J. W. Kennedy had announced with city secretary, Vacie Grimm, as of Wednesday morning, March 1. Voting in the city election will be held on April 4, the same date as the State balloting in the Senatorial Election in which some 44 candidates are now running. Deadline for filing is March 4.

Kennedy will be seeking his first full elective term to the city council after having been appointed to fill the unexpired term of J. B. Pettit, Jr., the present Mayor. Absentee voting in these two elections will begin March 13 at the County Clerk's office in the courthouse.

The remainder of the city council consists of M. O. Price, council man. City officials are elected for two year terms of office.

Five new candidates tossed their hats into the school board election ring this week, bringing the total seeking the two seats up for voting to seven with still one more day remaining before the deadline for filing which was March 1.

New candidates are Arvel Gryder, C. L. Miller, D. L. Trowbridge, Dell Cooledge and Gordon Steele, Those who had announced previously are Horace West and J. D. Gossett.

Gryder is an employee of the Plymouth Oil Company while Miller works for the Phillips Oil Co., Trowbridge for The Halliburton Company, Cooledge is the owner and operator of Cashway Grocery and Market and Steele is employed by Hadley Oil Company. All have children attending Rankin Public Schools.

As of last Wednesday, the last day for filing, it was rumored that

still others would give their names to the school business manager for a place on the ballot before the deadline. Voting will be held at the high school lobby and at the Phillips Recreation Hall in Midkiff on April 1.

Absentee voting will open on the 9th of March and will continue until three full days before the election. Absentee ballots may be cast at the County Clerk's office anytime after the March 9 date.

Seats up for election are those presently held by Ed Guy Branch and Carl Shaffer.

"We certainly want to impress on the public that they are more than welcome at Rankin Schools during this week of educational observance," Superintendent Kenneth Welsch has said. "We believe that the people of the Rankin Independent School District have every right to be proud of their schools and we want them to take advantage of the visitation program offered during Public School Week," he has said.





Col. John S. (Mip) Soldier - Statesman "Just a few kind words ..."





While John Salmon Ford was a regimental adjutant during the Mexican War a regular duty was to issue official death notices. He began each message, "Rest in Peace." When battles became hot, thick and fast, he shortened this to "R.I.P." and acquired a lasting nickname.

This kindly-spoken gentleman was highly accomplished and versatile. South Carolinian by birth (1815), Rip crowded an incredible number of activities into his 82 years of life. As a soldier, three wars: the Texas Revolution, Mexican and Civil Wars. As a statesman: Mayor, Congressman under the Republic, State Senator, Member of the Secession, National Democratic and Constitutional conventions. Between times Rip had practiced medicine, edited three different newspapers, explored and mapped the Ford-Neighbors Trail between San Antonio and El Paso. All this - and three years with the Rangers, stationed between the Nueces and the Rio Grande, where the Indians were usually looking for a fight. One historian commented that Rip always discharged his duties with "tactful moderation." In later years Col. Ford enjoyed writing reminiscences and historical articles, about history he had helped to make. He was adding a few kind words when he died in San Antonio in 1897.

Texas public schools enrolled 1,309,415 students and employed 50,330 teachers in 1948-49.

Texas public schools enrolled 2,129,967 students and employed 88,050 teachers in 1960-61.

By 1965 Texas will need 104,000 teachers for an anticipated student enrollment of 2,450,000.

Since 1952, enrollment has increased annually at the rate of about 80,000 students and will continue at this rate for the next six years.

Almost half (38,000) of the teachers in Texas public schools have taught 13 or more years.

More than 15,000 teachers have taught 26 years or more.

Texas ranks 34th among the 50 states in average salary paid teachers.



The first duty of the newly organized Hospital Auxiliary was to take over the Blood Bank files at the Rankin Hospital and to bring them up to date. This job has just been completed and very few names were left in the file. It will be the work of the Auxiliary to keep this file active.

At the present time, there are a very small number of residents of Rankin and the surrounding area who have their blood type on record in the Blood Bank file, which was started several years ago. Many people have moved away while other, for variour reasons, are unable to donate blood now.

One objective of the Hospital Auxiliary is to maintain a complete record of all types of blood to meet any emergency at any time. Mr. Leon Feuge, the hospital administrator, has agreed to type, free of charge, for everyone who would like to have their blood typed and placed in the Blood Bank file at the hospital.

Having all available types of blood on file will save a lot of time and possibly a life in case of an emergency.

A card will be filled out for you and one placed in the file. It is also a worthy suggestion to have your blood type on your identification card and carried with you at all times-especially if you have one of the rare types.
