THE BIG BITE
Right now, the Legislature down at Austin is writing new tax bills that are going to be paid by the public. At the same time, up in Washington, the Feds are busy trying to figure out how to get a bigger bite. The people are in for still more burdens. But, strangely enough, nobody seems to think much about it-or if they do, they say little publically

Ask the average man on the street if he thinks he pays too much taxes and he will usually say "Yes". Especially is this true of local taxes such as city and school. Quite often, he will include income tax. Now, why is it that we are

prone to cry about these taxes and prone to cry about these taxes and
say noting about the huge hidden tax burden that we carry. Perhaps the answer is in the way they are collected-we can see the local and the income tax because they are more or less billed to us personally but the hidden tax-well, if you can't see it, it doesn't hurt-sorta like putting medicine in orange juice-it may taste a little different but it's still there.
They say that a bushel of wheat sells for $\$ 1.73$ and that that same wheat, made into 66 loaves of bread costs the housewife $\$ 13.20$. This same wheat has been traced all the way through the process from the farmer to the housewife and has been found to carry only a few cents profit per handler. The farmer gets $21 / 2$ cents profit for his share of a loaf, the wholesaler gets $1 / 20$ of one cent, and so onbut the bread sells for 20 cents. (Wheever figured that out had not bought any bread late:y) Why the big gap? Hidden taxes. Over 100 different ones on a single loaf of bread.
It is said that a gallon of gas could be sold with the same margin of profit for about 5 cents if all hidden taxes were removed.
A $\$ 2,000$ car has over $\$ 200$ in hidden taxes included in its selling price. And on down the line Another misconseption about a tax is that a lot of it is paid by big companies. But how do big companies and corporations make a profit? By figuring all their overheads and adding a margin of profit and selling their product cr servise to the consumer-a constmer usually being people-and taxes are overheads to a business so you ought to be able to guess at least on the second try, who really pays taxes

Now the Texas Legislature says we must have more taxes to do all these grand things we are doing for the citizens here in Texas. I say we need more takes like we need fieas but if we must have them, then let's cut out this busi(Continued to Page 3)

ness of trying to sneak them upon folks in orange juice and give it to us straight-then we will know what it tastes like and often, when you find the taste bad enough, you are not long in deciding that you are not sick enough to need the medicine in the first place.
If we must be taxed even more, make it a sales tax.
That way people can see taxes for what they are-a legal form of robbery -a Robin Hood idea that takes from the rish and gives to the poor except it doesn't work that way either,

## LOOPHOLES

Mr. Kennedy and company have had a lot to say about tax loopholes and have devised a number of way to plug them up. Their main items of interest seem to be tax "loopholes" individuals take such as interest on homes, loans, medical bills, etc.
They, like the administration before them, have been very quiet about one "little" loophole that has knocked a mighty big hole in the income of people living in Texas oil producing areas-Rankin for instance.
For each barrel of oil produced in Texas, there is something like $\$ 1.65$ in taxes (hidden to the consumer). On each barrel of forelgn oil imported, there is not one red cent of taxes-but you pay the same price for your gas and oil, regardless of whether it's imported or not.
Now if we are not going to get any of the benefits of this free tax ride out here among the peasants, then it would seem that if anyone is really interested in putting the plug in loopholes, they would do well to start right in the
