Six graduate students from Texas Colleges and universities have been awarded summer fellowships in atomic energy by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation, it was announced today by Cal Young, Foundation President and President of West Texas Utilities Campony. WTU is one of the 11 Texas power companies who comprise the membership of the Foundation.
All recipients were from Texas. All intend to persue their studies toward advanced degrees in atomic sceience or mathematics.
In announcing the awarding of

"One of the purposes of the Texas
