Reach 3647 Mark


Upton County licenses plate sales as of March 31 stood at a sizeable 3647 total for all types of vehicles.

A breakdown of this figure showed 1980 passenger cars registered, 661 trucks and 1006 for all others such as farm trucks, motorcycles, scooters, house trailer, etc.

These figures compare favorably with the 2707 total for 1958 and the 3350 for 1959.

In '58, 1773 passenger cars were registered and 622 trucks while the '59 total was 2000 cars and 750 trucks.

Totals for the present year will likely be somewhat larger than the 3647 at the end of March as more vehicles are registered during the remainder of the year.





Fellowship Awards To Aid in Search For Limitless Fuel Source

Six graduate students from Texas Colleges and universities have been awarded summer fellowships in atomic energy by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the General Atomic Division of General Dynamics Corporation, it was announced today by Cal Young, Foundation President and President of West Texas Utilities Campony. WTU is one of the 11 Texas power companies who comprise the membership of the Foundation.

All recipients were from Texas. All intend to persue their studies toward advanced degrees in atomic science or mathematics.

In announcing the awarding of the fellowships, Young stated: "One of the purposes of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation is to aid and foster scientific knowledge in Texas. We feel that these fellowships, which proved so successful last year, will serve this purpose by bringing into the state some of the knowledge and experience being developed by the scientists at General Atomic".

The summer fellowship program was inaugurated in 1960 by the Foundation and General Atomic, who have, for the past five years, jointly sponsored the world's first and largest privately financed program of controlled thermonuclear research. The research is directed toward finding a way of controlling and sustaining a fusion reaction. If nuclear fusionthe energy process of the sun and stars- can be brought under control for the production of electrical power, the world will have an almost limitless source of fuel to meet its future energy requirements. This is because the fuel




She introduced Linda Crow who spoke on her trip to the United Nations. "Safety International Pilgrimage to the United Nations" was her subject.
