THE WEED CUTTERS—

The City of Rankin has now on hand in operation, a first-class weed cutter in the form of a mowing machine on a tractor. AND, they have offered to cut the weeds on vacant lots in town, FREE OF CHARGE, if the property owners will only clean up the property of tree limbs, trash, wire, etc.

Now this is a mighty little to ask of anyone who has vacant lots that grow weeds and brush and generally make Rankin look something like a gnat pasture in the summer time. Think how nice it looked here last summer and how many compliments were received from visitors about the neat appearance of the town—and it did look nice. Rankin could be a very attractive little spot—what with all the many trees that are beginning to grow up to big size, plus the fact of its natural location.

An hour or two of work will clean up any lot so that it can be mowed of weeds and brush and I'd guess that many folks are going to take the city up on their proposition.

PAY RAISE—

Representative Pete Snelson in Austin has introduced a bill to permit Upton County to pay certain county officials more money.

I thoroughly support the idea of the state "permitting" the people of Upton County paying their officials more money if they see fit to do so. In fact, I believe in "County Rights" just as much as in States Rights and think that—as in the case of Federal regulation—so is it with state regulation; that the less you have, the better and that it's really none of Austin's cotton picking business what we pay our county officials.

This type of bill is what is known as a permissive or local bill in the legislature and they usually go through the mill without any trouble unless they are contested by the citizens directly affected since they will not ap-

ply to the state as a whole. Sometimes there will be opposition if another house member fears that the bill might set a pattern that would cause his own voters to demand similar treatment but this is not likely to happen on this one and Rep. Snelson,—who has been a very busy man in this session of the Legislature, is to be complimented on taking time to tend to a bill that is strictly local with Upton County.

And it might be further pointed out that, in some cases, there is a definite need for better salaries for county officials. The best example would be that of Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector where the office handles about a million dollars a year of county money in addition to being responsible for maintaining law and order on a twenty-four hour a day basis—and that's exactly what it amounts to at times. For this service, the official gets less than many truck drivers can earn per month. This office is really two offices and in many counties only a little larger than Upton, it is divided into two separate jobs. We really get both done on one man's pay.

We demand full time service and honesty in our officials and we get it but we're not paying what it's worth in some cases and just because one office is worth a certain salary should not mean that all are. It ought to be based on the amount of work and responsibility involved. (I'm not going up to the courthouse for a few years after that statement.)

I, personally, would like to further commend County Attorney John Menefee for opening his files on this matter, which has been going on for about two years in an effort to get such a bill introduced. He offered us all the information he had on hand.

There is far too much of the attitude among those in public office that the less the public knows, the better. The right to know what is going on is one of the big fights

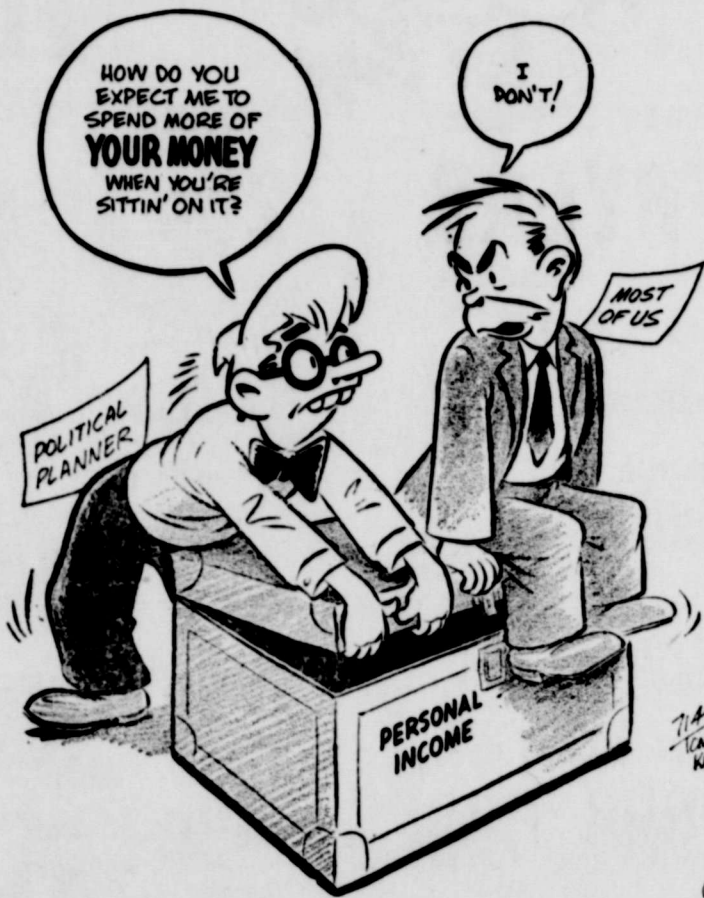

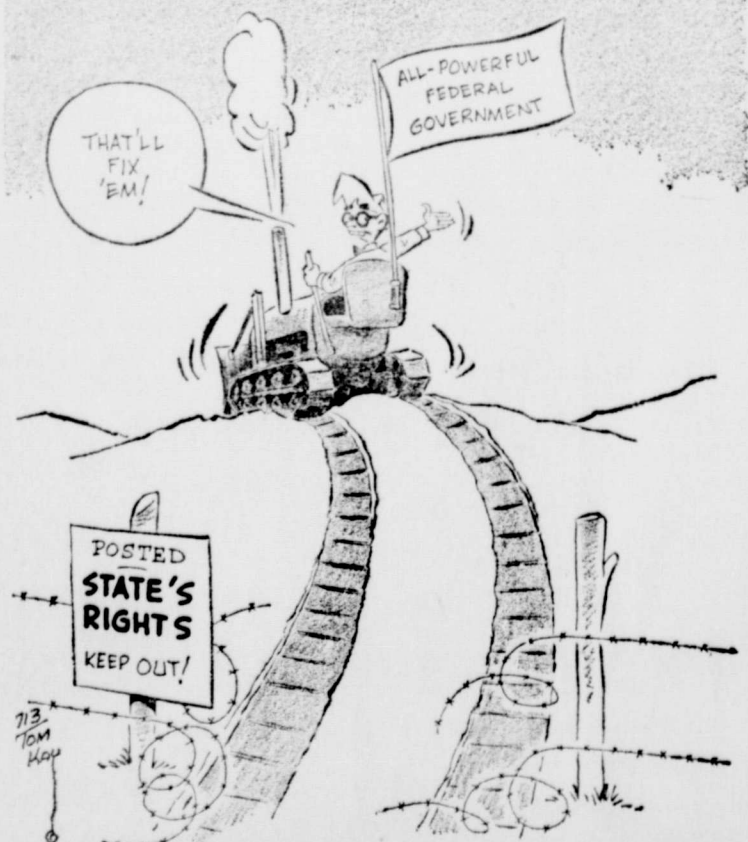

A \$38 million decision for or a-
gainst Texas motorists will be
made in Congress between now
and midnight, June 30. A num-
ber of Texas Congressmen have
been frank to say they will stick
by the promise Congress made
two years ago when it raised the
federal gasoline tax from three
cents a gallon to four cents—a
\$38 million a year increase on the
Texas gasoline users. The promise:
to cut the tax back to three cents
June 30, 1961.

pays gasoline taxes—be spent on
highways rather than for general
governmental purposes. The pre-
sent law provides for this, to re-
place the expiring one-cent a gal-
lon federal gasoline tax.

But congress is under pressure
from the Administration to con-
tinue the "temporary" gasoline tax
so other highway-user taxes can be
spent elsewhere in the federal
budget.

Texans have seen their gasoline
taxes increase 63 per cent in the
past 10 years. It's time to call a
halt to this undue imposition on
one of the necessities of modern
life—transportation.

This promise can be carried out
without slowing down the big fed-
eral highway construction prog-
ram. All Congress has to do is in-
sist that some \$800 million a
year in various automotive taxes,
paid by the same taxpayers who

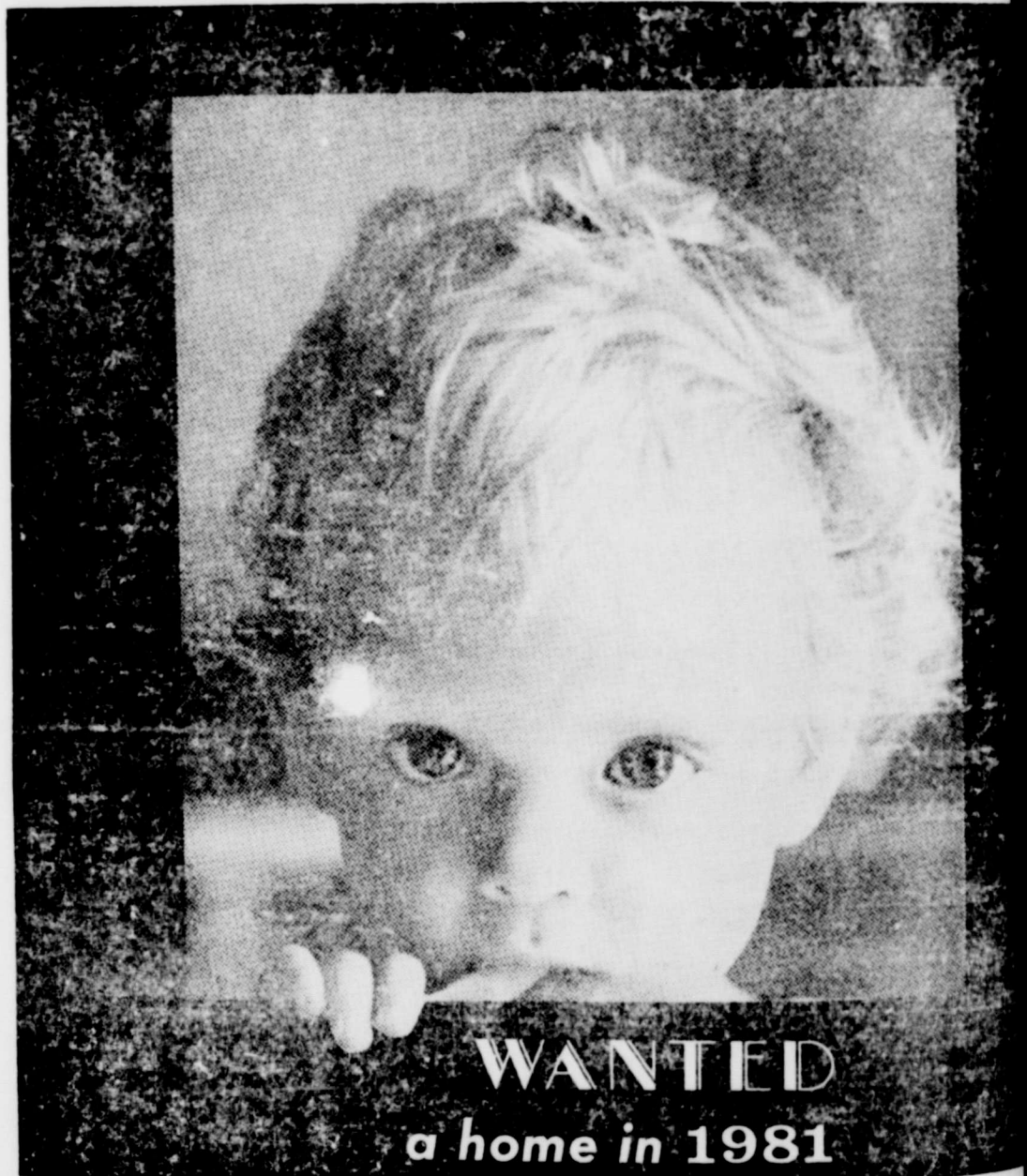

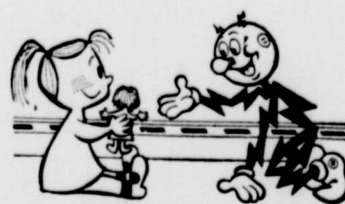

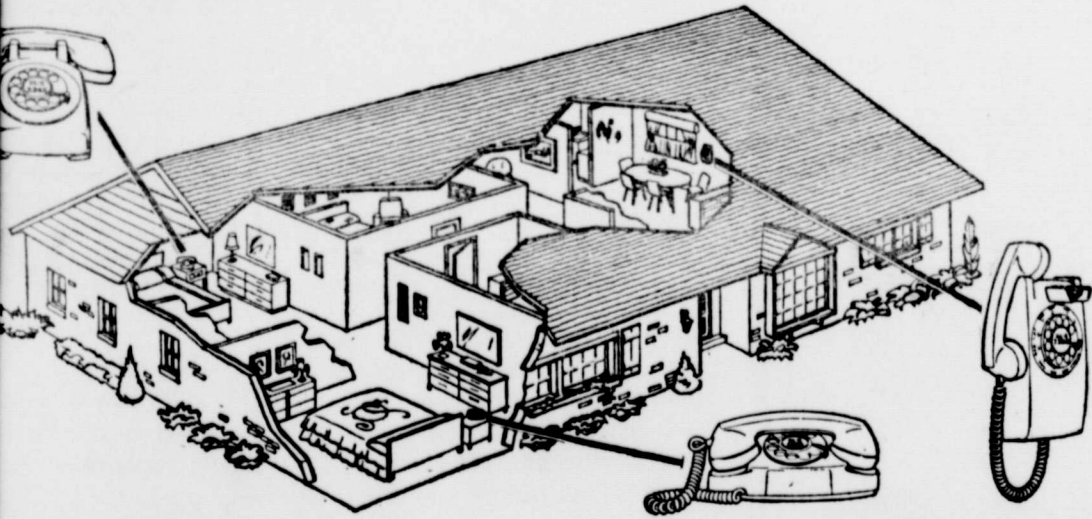
