Valuation Study Ordered On School Tax Property

Rankin School Board this week announced that they have instructed W. M. Scarborough, the school tax assessor-collector and business manager, to make a personal inspection of all local property within the Rankin Independent School District and to fix a value on the property for tax purposes to be presented to the school equalization board, which, in turn, will set that taxes on the property.

The board has pointed out that this does not necessarily mean a raise in the property so inspected, but that the personal inspection is being made in order that a more equal and fair value may be determined on all property.

This action came about, according to the school board, at the request of some of the major tax payers in the district who had requested that such inspection be made and had suggested the use of an outside firm to come in and reappraise properties. The board investigated this angle and found that it would cost from \$12,000 to \$20,000 to hire an outside firm. They felt that a substantial saving could be made by using the tax assessor-collector, and that he, being a local man, would be better qualified to determine the present value of properties in the

QUESTION-

How Much Is A Mesquite Tree Worth

BY W. M. DAY, JR. Upton County Agent

Extension Range Specialist G. O. Hoffman of Texas A & M College says that actually a dead mesquite tree is worth more than a live one. A live mesquite, 10 inches in diameter, will use a ton of water to produce a pound of beans. That same ton of water would produce four pounds of good grass. The point of the whole thing, he says, is that you can kill the tree for 5 cents—let it live and it will cost you \$9.00 per year.

Hoffman recommends that trees over 4 inches in diameter be frilled or cut off and treatment applied to the cut surface. Spray solution in the cut surface until it bubbles. For mesquite control, mix one gallon 2,4,5,-T to 48 gallions of oil; for oaks use 1 gal-

lon of 2,3,4-T to 24 gallons of oil. All you need in the way of equipment is an ax, a knapsack sprayer and chemical solution.

Special Science Program Slated For Rankin Schools

Stillwater, Okla.—A science program of unusual content and interest will be presented at the Rankin High school during the period of May 8-11. The program will be presented by W. N. Spreadbury, traveling science teacher, who has a repertoire of lecture materials designed to inform and stimulate teachers and students in the areas of science and mathmatics and is equipped with a station wagon loaded with unique

science demonstration appratu

Mr. Spreadbury is one of 26 science teachers who were trained and equipped at Oklahoma State University last summer with the assistance of a grant from the National Science Foundation.

Schools are scheduled only if they have requested the program. Rankin school is said to be fortunate to have been selected to receive the program this year since more than twice as many applications were received as could be scheduled.

By the end of the spring semester, each traveling teacher will have visited approximately thirty schools and nearly a quarter of a million students will have seen the demonstrations.

In addition to 12 to 15 lecture demonstrations to science and to mathematics classes and to student assemblies. Spreadbury will be available for presentations to the teacher's meetings, science clubs, civic groups and P-TA meetings.






