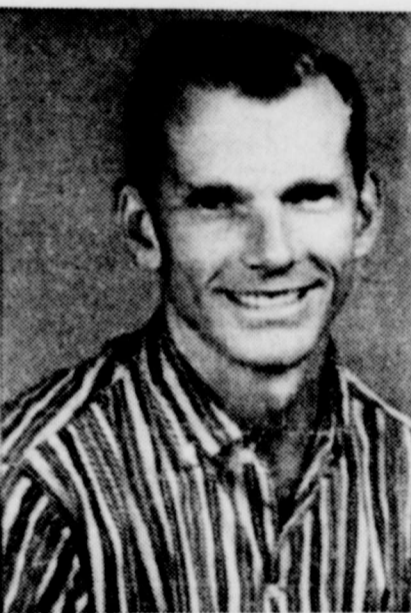
Yarbrough Opens Standard Station

School Picks Two New Coaches For Assistants

Boone Wikening, presently associated with Van Vleck high school on the coast as assistant football and basketball coach, is 24-years-old. He and his wife, Ann, have two children, ages 3 and 1.

Wikening is a graduate of Webster of Clear Creek High School and Southwest Texas State College. During his college days he was an outstanding basketball player having been named All-Conference in the Lone Star Conference and selected All-Tournament at guard in the National N.A.I.A. Tournament, which SWT SC won in 1960. His boys basketball team won 21 games last season.

The Van Vleck High School football team had a 7-3 season record.

Rankin School Board last week picked two new coaches for the Rankin athletic program from a large field of applicants. They are Boone Wikening and Ricky Mantooth.

They will both work under head coach Don Leach who this week indicated that his present plans are to use Mantooth as girls basketball coach and Wikening as boys basketball coach. In addition to these duties, both will be used in the football program and in other athletic coaching capacities in Rankin Schools.

Leach said that he expected the new coaches to arrive in Rankin around the middle of July and that football workouts for the 1961 Red Devils would get under way on August 15.

Rankin, now in District 7A which reaches all the way to El Paso, is making an effort to get assigned to a district closer to home. Although they will definitely be in 7A this coming season since assignments are made on a two-

year basis, there is some hope that they may get reassigned when the Texas placement committee meets this summer.

It's said to be most relaxing and good for one's outlook and system in general. It also helps out folks who are in the business of providing all the little necessities that go into making an enjoyable vacation such as refrigerated motel rooms, airconditioned cabins on the lake, fancy boat and motor, etc. This is what is known as roughing it.

So, you need not bother to look for me down at the coffee shop or out at the golf house—don't call me, I'll call you.

As for next week's issue of the News, it will be out at the usual time—maybe—or it may be a day or two late or a week or so, or I may find a job that pays money and just stay with it.

THE REPUBLICAN—

It now looks like Texas has a Republican Senator.

And the question is being asked: "Where did all these Republicans come from?"

I don't think there are many more Republicans in Texan than there was ten years ago—a few, perhaps, but not many. There are, however, a lot of folks who are tired of Democratic political bosses who take it for granted that they always have Texas in their pocket before the voting starts.

Things have reached the point where the candidate did not need to be known or accepted by the people of Texas—just as long as he had the blessings of the high powers in the party. Political part-

ies, like any organization, can get out of kilter with the thinking of those who make up the party or membership of the organization when its leaders reach the point where they no longer are willing to stand up and be counted on issues which the membership favors. This has been the case with the Democratic Party in Texas.

A vast majority have called for cuts in foreign aid and Texas Senators and Representatives have failed to heed this request. Texans, as a whole, have called for less governmental interference in state and individual matters and their lawmakers have failed to heed this call.

Texas is not yet a liberal state and men who are elected to office from Texas are expected to be guided by this and not to bend to the wishes of every minority in the state and the big bosses of the Democratic party from liberal areas of the North.

When the Democratic Party learns this lesson and is willing to accept it in their thinking and actions they will find that they have a huge majority of backers in the state and can easily defeat any Republican anytime.

I'd say that Democrats now in office could well learn a lesson from last Saturday's election. It is doubtful that they will.

YOUR HELP NEEDED—

DO MOSQUITOES PREFER BLONDS?

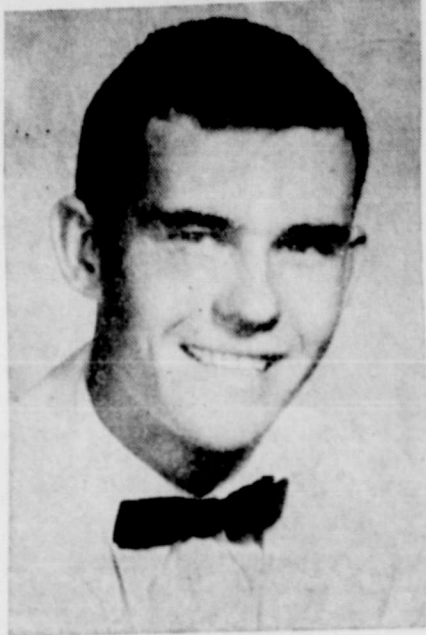
Do you often wonder why mosquitoes seem to prefer you over someone else? If you do, you are not alone. Research entomologists in more than one country are trying to find the answer to why mosquitoes and other insects are attracted to man and animals.

If scientists can find precise causes of insect attractions, more effective repellents that would mask the attraction might be developed. Attraction retarding materials might be combined with insecticides. This would result in fewer insects bothering treated individuals, and the more persistent pests would be killed by the insecticides.

Experiments by entomologists at USDA's insect laboratory at Orlando, Florida, illustrate the complexity of such research, however. They dressed a man in a lightweight diving suit that kept water vapor, carbon dioxide and other gases from escaping to the surrounding environment. He was paced in a small observation room with three man-sized dummies and 300 mosquitoes. The subject's breath was drawn out-side the room through a hose.

Mosquitoes showed no preference between the man and the dummies. When carbon dioxide was discharged above the man's head, however, he attracted more mosquitoes. The pests also were attracted when a cloth suit was put over the man's, diving suit—regardless of the presence of carbon dioxide.

Researchers exposed the man's

face—no increased attraction. But when his hands were uncovered, the mosquitoes were attracted. These mosquitoes prefer the body, but another species showed marked preference for the face.

This shows that different types of mosquitoes aren't necessarily attracted to man and animals for the same reasons. Other insects don't respond alike either. For instance, one study showed that horse flies preferred red cattle to white ones. Perhaps scientists will find the answer some day, but until they do, the hum of mosquitoes will continue to mean discomfort for many people.

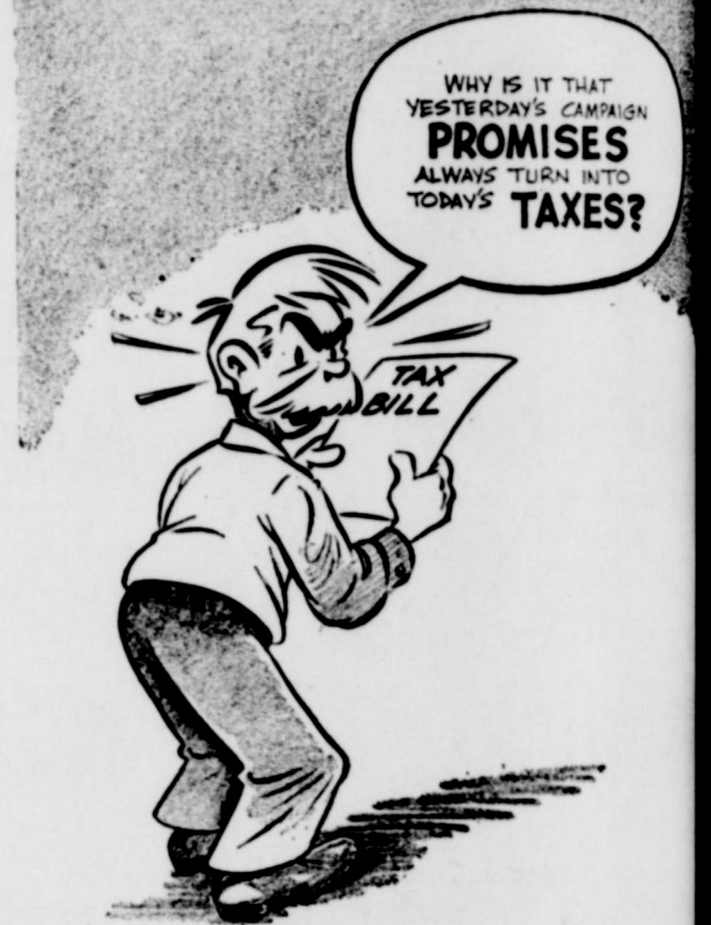

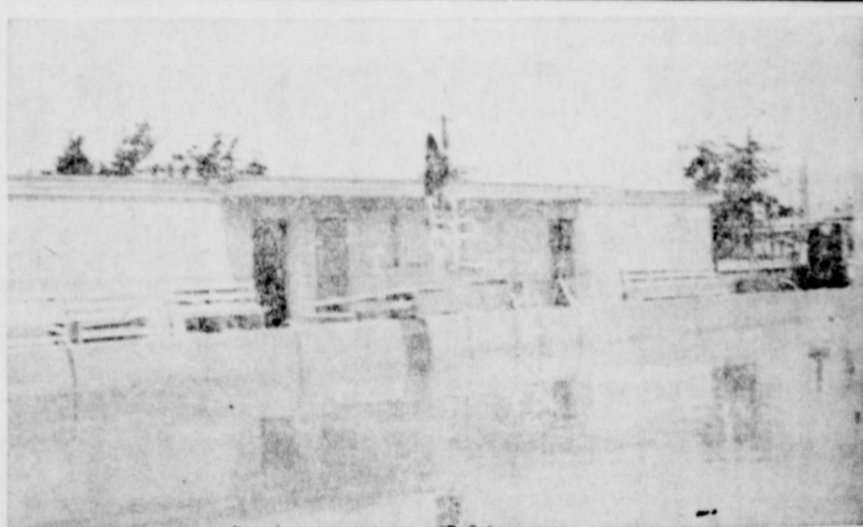

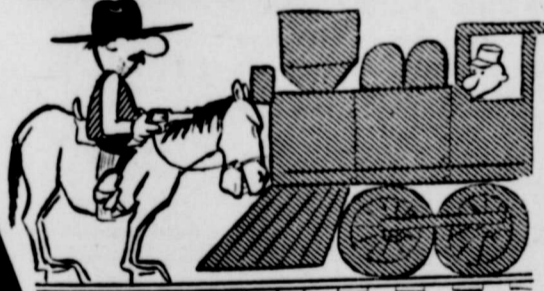
