Lawyers Take Job On Commission Basis --

City Contracts With Law Firm To Collect Delinquent Taxes

In an effort to secure payment of delinquent property taxes owed the City of Rankin, the City Commission has employed the law firm of Johnson and Tupper of San Angelo, effective August 1, 1961 to July 31, 1962 to handle the legal aspects of the work of collections. The firm was hired on a commission basis of a straight 12 1/2 percent of all delinquent taxes collected.

Johnson and Tupper is a law firm which specializes in the collections and processing of taxes and the contract between the City and them was signed early this week. This contract calls for the firm to begin work at once and they have indicated that their procedure will be to contact each of the delinquent property owners and give them an opportunity to pay their back taxes, plus the

penalty and interest. After thirty days, if a settlement has not been reached, the firm will proceed to file a law suit against the owner for the full amount due, plus the costs of court proceedings.

Property taken over for taxes will then be sold for the amount necessary to clear all claims.

Anyone who wishes to clear up their back taxes before the law firm begins action may do so by

going to the City Hall and working out an agreement for payment.

City officials have stated that some of the delinquent taxes go back as far as 1939 and that amounts over \$2,500 are owed in some cases.

Speech Workshop Open to HS Students

A Summer Speech Workshop for Rankin High School students is scheduled for five days beginning Monday, August 7, through Friday, August 11.

The workshop will offer courses in speech fundamentals, prose reading, poetry reading, extemporaneous speaking, debate, and persuasive speaking. Lectures for the various events will be during the morning sessions and individual research and laboratory work will be done during the afternoon. The final schedule will be worked out on Monday following registration at 9:00 a.m. in the high school auditorium.

The workshop is open not only for advanced students, but also for freshmen students and those who have not done any speech work or who have not been members of a speech class.

There is no tuition charge nor registration fee for the workshop nor is there any credit toward graduation given.

Red Devil Practice Session To Start Monday, Aug. 14

Coach Don Leach said this week that he expects to have eleven of his lettermen and 8 regulars back from last year's Red Devil team when the squad opens practice on Monday, August 14. About 40 boys are expected to report for the sessions which will be held at 9 to 11 a.m. and 6:30 to 9 p.m.

Through graduation, moving and

Navy enlistment, the Red Devils will open their fall practice without any experienced line backers and only limited experience at the end positions. Three new members of the team will be transfer students and will not be eligible for the first game. Making their first appearance as Freshmen will be Ronald Thorn, Tom Gossett, Sammy Warriner, Gary Houchins, Richard Frost, Jim Ivy, David Prouty, Eddie Love, Ricky Miller, Roy Winters and Jimmy Parrish.

From this group, returning lettermen will be Robert Browning, 200 lbs., center; Keith Whiteside, 150 lbs., guard; Richard Abalos, 138 lbs., guard; Fred Moore, 210 lbs., tackle; Jerry McDonald, 185 lbs., tackle; Earnest Clay, 134 lbs.,

end; Lonnie Ferrell, 160 lbs. at quarterback; Bucky Scarborough, 178 lbs., quarterback; Tom Aguilar, 138 lbs., left halfback; Troy Chesnut, 151 lbs., right halfback; and Jimmy Linticum, 166 lbs. fullback.

Coach Leach has indicated that there will likely be considerable shuffling of the line-up before the first ball game and that at this time he considers almost every position on the team up for filling.

"We have lost some of our key players and will have to do a lot of trying-out before we come up with a combination," Leach has said.

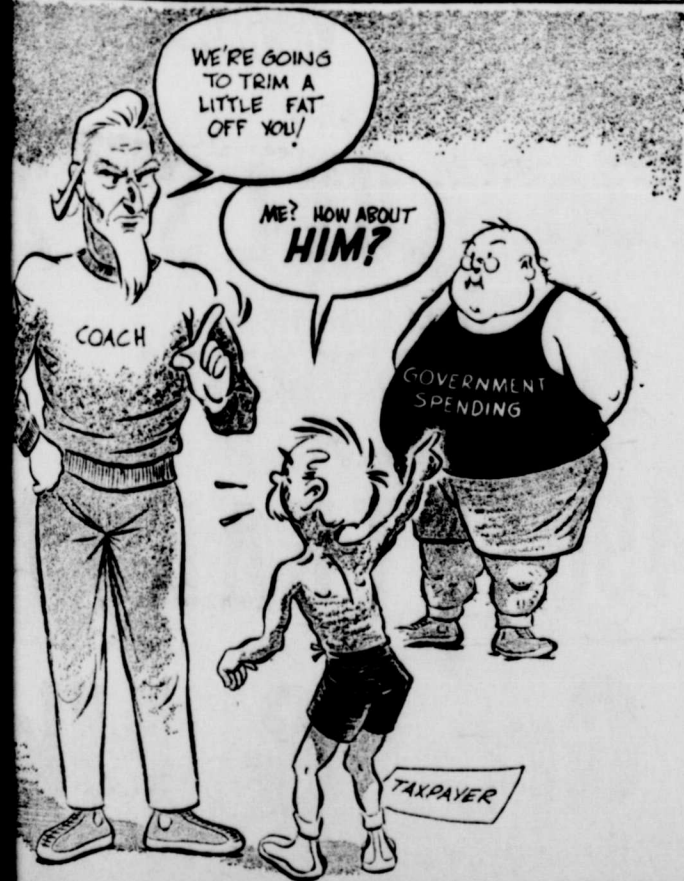

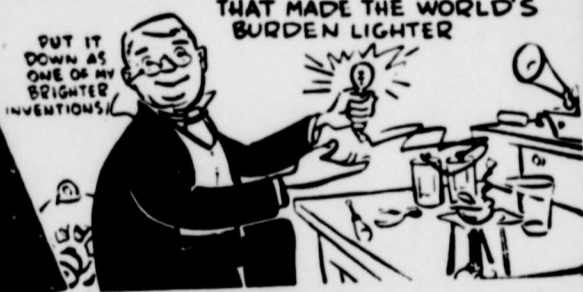

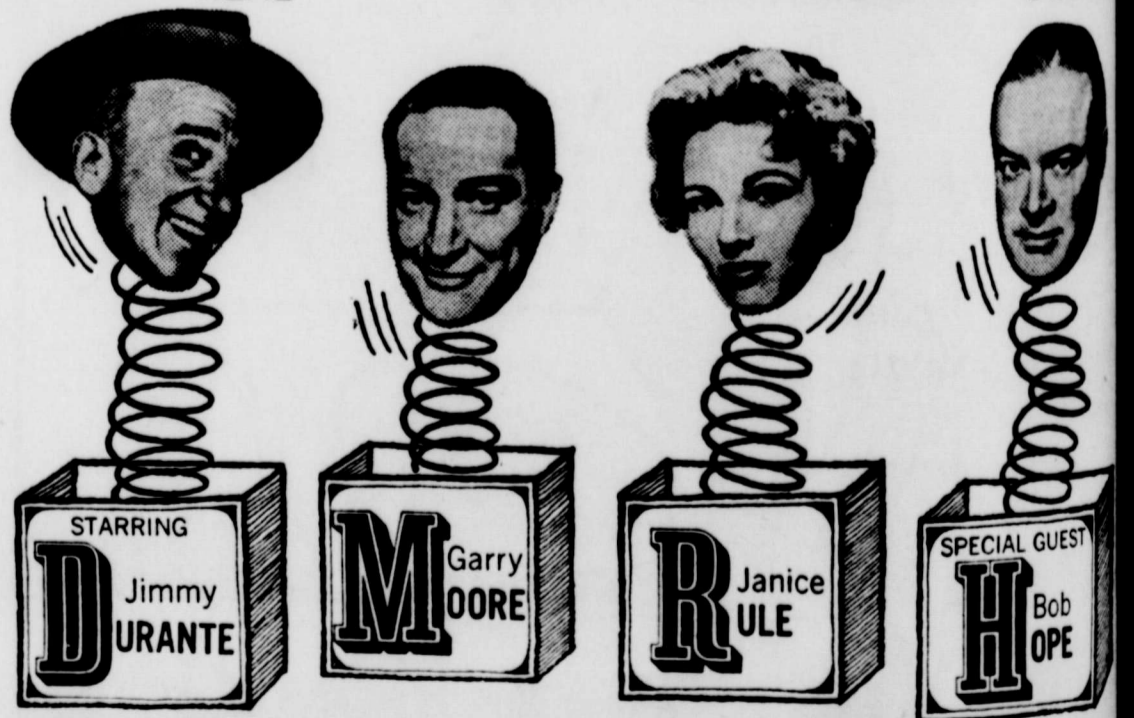
