Hop in School Values Stirs Local Property Owners --

Taxes, Budget Hearings On Tap For August Airings

August seems like it's going to be a good time for local tax payers to make themselves heard.

Three meetings related to various taxing agencies are slated for the next few days with the school's equalization board, originally called for August 7, reset for Wednesday,

August 9 due to the death of Mr. Thomas Y. Pickett, their evaluation engineer.

A hearing on the budget for the County of Upton has been scheduled for August 24 at 10 a.m. in the Commissioners' Courtroom in the courthouse. Anyone who is a

tax payer in the county has been issued a notice to attend this hearing if he so desires.

On August 15, the City of Rankin will hold their board of equalization meeting with all property owners within the city limits welcome to meet with the board and discuss their values. This meeting will be held at the City Hall beginning at 8 a.m. and holding open until 5 p.m. Tax payers may meet with the board any time during those hours.

Considerable comment was making the rounds this week about the school tax situation following the receipt by tax payers of notice of intent to raise their values on local property. Indications were that a number of property owners would be on hand to meet with the equalization board.

Work was continuing on preparation of the county budget by the commissioners court with a number of items still subject to change according to courthouse sources.

WOOL BUSINESS—

In this week's issue of the News County Agent Dub Day explains the wool incentive program as it is carried out by the federal government. I say he explains it—with no reflection whatsoever on the Dubbers ability to explain—but I will never believe that any one human can understand all the double talk that goes into any given government regulation, be it wool or preservation of a yellow-tailed sap sucker.

For example the regulation says: "All wool sold during the year is figured in on the national average, which was 42-cents for the marketing year just ended. After the national average is obtained, the payment figure is based on the percentage of the difference between the 62 cents and the national average in relation to the national average. This percentage is obtained by dividing the difference—here it is 62-cents, 42-cents or 20-cents—by the national average of 42-cents".

Now, I guess all you folks understand just how to figure your wool business.

No wonder they don't know what to do about the farm program. No body knows what the farm program is.

I'm going to lump mine in with my income tax form this year. I may get a refund by the time they get through that mess.

To get back to the subject at hand, Dub's article points out one most important fact—one which a lot of us probably did not know, and that is that all money paid out under the wool incentive program comes out of tariffs collected on foreign imports of wool into this country and not out of tax money collected here in the U. S.

Thank goodness.

BOMB SHELTERS—

All the latest talk is about the building of bomb shelters. With the Russian space ship overhead that may be as good a subject as any.

The federal government — as

usual—is urging everyone to get busy and build a home shelter right away. Down in Austin there is talk of building one for all the state officials and the only question that raises is: Why?

According to all the literature now available on the proper way to build a shelter, you should be prepared to stay inside the thing for two weeks after the bombing. Of course, that's allowing for only one bombing raid. If you have one every two weeks, you can see where a thing like that could lead. And then, in all this literature, they do not explain how a family of four people, a cat and a dog are to stay cooped up in those close quarters for two weeks without reaching the point of biting one another.

Lewis Smith is trying to drum up the idea of a community shelter instead of individual affairs. He figures that way you could get up a domino game much easier.

But suppose you did make it through the two-week stay and came outside again. The first item of operation as listed in the little survival booklet is to take a hose and wash down all buildings, cars, equipment, ect. It does not say how Box McDonald is going to keep his water wells going for 2 weeks without attention. If could be that they figure a little fall-out won't hurt Box and that it will be alright for him to go about tending the wells.

After you have done the washing bit, you are to then go out and turn over all top soil. Now in the case of Rankin, that's going to take some turning on some of these rocky hills.

**Wool Incentive: How
It Works Explained**

What is "Wool Incentive", and how does the program operate?

The National Wool Act of 1954 set up an incentive payment program for wool producers. The money paid wool producers is based on the selling price a grower receives for his wool, thus getting the name incentive payments. By making this an incentive payment program, the producer with the

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better wool gets the higher price and in turn gets paid more by the government through this program.

The payments are based on an average price of 62 cents per lb. This figure was set in 1954 by producer representatives and the Department of Agriculture. The marketing year for wool is from April 1 to March 31. All wool sold during the year is figured in on the national average, which was 42 cents for the marketing year just ended. After the national average is obtained, the payment figure is based on the percentage of the difference between the 62 cents and the national average in relation to the national average. This percentage is obtained by dividing the difference—here it is 62 cents, 42 cents or 20 cents—by the national average of 42 cents. This year each grower will receive \$47.30 for each \$100.00 worth of wool he sold during the year. If, for example, a grower netted \$500.00 for his wool clip, then all together he would get \$500.00 plus \$236.50 or a total of \$736.50 for his wool.

If this wool grower produced 1,000 pounds of wool in the clip and sold it for 50-cents per pound, net, then he received 23.65-cents per pound from the government, he would wind up selling his clip for 73.65 cents per pound. Naturally, the person who does the best breeding job with his sheep and the best preparation job on his wool will receive the most money before and after the incentive payment.

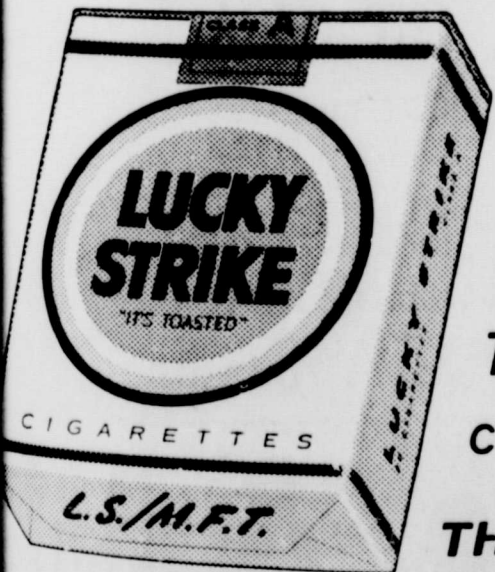
A producer is also paid 80 cents per 100 pounds of unshorn lambs he sold during the year. For example, a producer sells 5000 lbs. of lamb; then his unshorn lamb payment would be 80 cents times 50 or forty dollars.

There is one very important aspect of the incentive program that the average person or taxpayer does not know. Every penny that is paid the producers comes from tariffs received on foreign wools imported into the United States.
