Red Devils Ready To Begin Improving Last Season's Record --

Red Devils Open Season In Friday Night In Big Lake

Football opens Friday night. At 8 o'clock in Big Lake, the 1961 version of the Rankin Red Devils will get their first regulation game test. They have already had two scrimmage games, one with McCamey in which they were outscored by one touchdown and the other last week in Alpine in which they romped to a 6-2 goal-crossing outing.

Almost without exception, the Reagan County Owls have been picked by sports writers to have an easy time of it with the Red Devils Friday night—the exceptions being in the Red Devil rooter section where it is felt that this year's team may deal out a few surprises to foes that found an easy mark in them last season. Big Lake was one of these, taking a sizeable win over the Devils in their opener for the 1960 season.

Rankin fields a squad containing nine seniors and will be paced in the backfield by Jimmy Linthicum and Tom Aguilar with Lonnie Fer-

rell and Bucky Scarborough sharing the quarterback spot. Up in the forward wall, Rankin will be able to match the Owls in size in most key positions with Robert Browning, Fred Moore and Jerry McDonald giving the line size and a mighty tough little man in Richard Abalos who makes up for his light 140 pounds with hard-nosed work.

The key problem worrying Coach Don Leach and his staff at this time is the lack of substitutes to

replace any starters who might be forced to the sidelines in any game. Although the Red Devils presently have about 30 boys out for football, only a very few have had much experience and some 17 of them are either frosh or sophomores. Also missing will be one of their key players on both offense and defense, Keith Whiteside who accidentally shot himself in the shoulder during the first week of fall training and will be out for an indefinite stay. He was an

all-district man last year. Coach Leach has said that he is more worried about his defense than his offense but feels that a good fired-up ball team spirit on Friday night could overcome this part of the question mark. He also has pointed out that the team is playing well together his year.

BIG LAKE EXPERIENCED—

Big Lake will field a team that has played together for the past three years and which has been boomed by some as the upcoming squad in West Texas with perhaps the best backfield in their district. Standout player in this department for the Owls is Mike Holmes, a fast back who runs the 100-yards in 10 flat. He is supported by a big fullback and another fast running mate.

This will be the first game for their new coach, Ken Williamson, who moved up from an assistant's spot last year with the Reagan County school. Big Lake last season had a 2-1-7 won, tied, lost record while the Red Devils could manage no better than 1-9

Both will be out to improve the record books and will be seeking a win in the opener to start the slate off in the right direction.

Indications are that a large following of fans will make the trip Friday night to cheer on the local squad.

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**Cotton Root Rot Is
Big Plant Killer In
Parts of Texas**

Cotton Root Rot kills shade trees, shrubs and flowers. Cotton root rot is one of the most common plant diseases in Texas. Except for the Panhandle and High Plains, the disease generally is found throughout the state. It is very common in heavy, alkaline soils. The disease first occurs in the south of Texas during late May, and is observed in north Texas during June and July. About 80 percent of the wild and cultivated plants are susceptible in varying degrees. The fungus may live on some native trees and shrubs without killing them.

Small flowers, shrubs and trees die suddenly after the first wilting symptoms occur. Large shrubs and trees may die more slowly. The bark of affected roots is decayed and brownish. Woolly, buff or brownish, fungal strands are present on the surface of the damaged roots.

The whole root system decays. Bark is rotted off the harder wood of the root, and roots slip out of the soil with comparatively little pulling effort.

Under moist conditions, with or without affected plants, spore mats sometimes appear on the soil surface. These mats are 2 to 12 inches in diameter, at first snow-white and cottony; later they appear tan and powdery.

The disease fungus generally invades new areas by continued slow growth through the soil from plant to plant. It may live in the soil for many years. The disease is often found as deep in the soil as the roots penetrate.

The disease is controlled by the growing of resistant or immune trees and shrubs. Certain cultural practices may help prevent the disease from occurring more often.

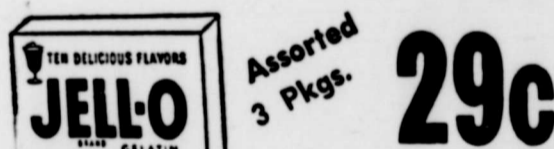

payments for the current year from October 1 to November 1.

This move was taken since tax statements may be later this year than they would ordinarily be due to the late negotiations with the major payers of the district.

At the same time, the Board officially adopted the 1961-62 school year budget with major categories remaining approximately as they were for the previous year with the exception of an increase in salaries. Salaries awarded to teachers and principals with and increase of \$500 per year and a \$200 annual increase for some
