# Action-Filled Week End On Tap For Area Residents 

A very busy week-end is in prospeet for folks in the Rankin and Midkiff area as the school stages its annual Halloween Carntval on Saturday, preceeded by the important Rankin-Wink football conportant Rankin-Win
test Friday night.
A parade beginning at $5: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$ Saturday, will open activities for the Halloween Carnival. Contestants and floats will gather at the parking area at the football field prior to parade time, and will prior to parade time, and will
march North up Main Street. Enroute, they will make a $10-15 \mathrm{~min}$ ute stop near the Wool House on Main Street to give judges time to make decisions for warding the prizes and spectators an opportunity to take pictures.
This parade will be open to all who care to enter, either in individual costumes, class groups, or eivic organizations and floats. Awards of $\$ 10$ for the best float from each of the three schools and $\$ 10$ for the best-out-ofshhool float will be made, along with ten $\$ 1$ prizes for individual costumes. Awards will be made by the Parent-Teacher Association on the findings of three judges.
The parade will disband at 10th and Main Streets.
Immediately following the parade, the Carnival will open at the Elementary school. It will be held outside, weather permitting. If the weather turns bad at the last moment, it will be necessary to cancel this portion of activities since there would not be time to move indoors.

Rough Rankin Ready For Wildcat Steaks

Friday night, it would appear at this time that the crown of District 7-A will be up for taking by the winner of the Rankin-Wink game. It will leave the victor with a $3-0$ record in district play and facing only two more ganes. In the case of Rankin, these would be with Iraan and Fabens, neither team appearing to be very strong at this point.
However, this is beside the question as it now stands: Who will win Friday night?
Wink, rated number two all season in Class A, will be a lop-sided favorite in the tussle and will also have the advantage of the home field. Opposing them will be a Red Devil team that was hardly considered worth mentioning in pre-season picking but which has aiready downed the other two contenders in the district and is cont the "R-r-r-e-e-d and ready to "upset" the Wink Wildcats.

Last Friday night, playing in Sanderson and again tabbed as the underdogs, the Rankin crew put on one of their best shows of the year for hard charging on defense, and but for a slightly sputtering offense, could have named their own soore against the Eagles. As it was, they settled for a 20-6 win, but were never in any danger of dropping the tilt as they stopped the high-scoring single wing eleven of Sanderson almost in the center of the field while moving the ball well on almost all series of downs.

For two weeks now, the Red Devils have been operating with a slightly injured backfield and a shifted-around line, but this week, it appears that they will be in their best condition since the Sonora game as they go against the heavy, fast Wink team. Wink also has been bothered with injuries to key players this season and their star halfback, Curtis Robinson, is said to have a bruised hip. Their big fullback was also out earlier in the season, as was their heaviest man in the line. They, like Rankin, however, are expected to be in good condition for Friday night.
Game time is at 7:30. Officials for the contest will be from the Abilene Association and will be new to both teams.

## religious confusion

The Bible was inspired of Godwritten for and adopted to mankind. In the Bible we are told all we know about Jesus Christ and the beginning of His church. Most of us were born and reared under the impression that it doesn't make any difference which of the many churches we belong to, or whether we belong to any of them or not. When we came into the world, we found "Christianity" to be divided into over 250 different denominations, ea:h teaching a different doctrine and practicing different things and cach in competition with the
other People are told it doesn't make any difference what you believe, nor which church you belong to, so long as you are honest To some this is entirely satisfactory, but to others this situation furnishes many preplexing problems. How can all churches be different in doctrine and practice, and all be right? Is Gcd the author of confusion? Does God call preachers to preach conflicting doctrines?
Do you find yourself bewildered and frustrated as to just what to do rellgiousiz? Don': you think
the proper thing to do is to take the Bible and learn the characteristics of Christianity during the time of the Apostles, then search for the same characteristics today?
Jesus promised to build His church (Mt. 16:18). The church was established with power (Mk $9: 1$ ) at Jerusalem (Isa. 2:2; Lk. 24:46-49) on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2). Three thousand souls were added to the church that day, and the Lord added daily such as should be saved (Acts 2:47).
The word "church" simply means the "called cut." There are two spiritual kingdoms-the kingdom of Satan and the kingdom o Christ (Col. 1:13-14). When an individual becomes a Christian, he is "called out" of the power of darkness and translated into the kingdom of Christ. Hence, all those who have been redeemed, saved or "called out" were translated into the kingdom of Christ which is simply called the "church." Church is never used in the Bible to refer to a demomina-

Many people think that the "called out" is God's kingdom of saved people, but that this kingdom is invisible and the only way that one can get into the "visible kingdom" is to join some denomination. No such idea can be gleaned from the Bible, but quite the contrary. Three thousand peop:e were added to the church at Jerusalem on the day of Pentecost and "continued steadfastly in the apostles' dostrine and fellowship, and in breaking bread, and in prayers" (Acts $2: 42$ ), yet they joined no denomination. It was visible enough to be persecutThe church at Troas was no denomination, yet they came together on the first day of the week for the Lord's Supper and preaching (Acts 20:7). All the "called out" in every city met on the
Lord's day and worshipped God, yet they joined no denomination. The denominations began many years this side of Pentezost.
Is it possible for us to do this today? All agree that a person can be saved, in Christ, have sins forgiven, and go to heaven when they die without belonging to any denomination. But a person must belong to the "called out" if he is to be saved. (Read Acts 2.47; John 3:3; Ephesians 1:7; Romans 8:1; 2 Timothy $2: 10$.
Can these saved people who are members of the kingdom of God come together to worship God after the New Testament pattern without joining any denomination? If not, why not?
It is possible, therefore, to be a Christian and only a Christian, and to meet with fellow Christians for worship on the Lord's Day without belonging to a single denomination on this earth. This is exactly what the church of Christ is and is pleading for. Be a Christian and only a Christian, and worship God according to the Bible without addition, subtraction, or alteration. COME, INVESTIGATE AND FIND OUT FOR YOURSELF! LET'S GO ALL THE WAY BACK TO NEW TESTAMENT CHRISTIANITY. ACCEPT THE BIBLE AND THE BIBLE ONLY!

## Santa Fe hauls 2.3 million bales of western cotton to markets

King Cotton has moved west．
In 1945，only $36 \%$ of the nation＇s cotton was grown in the West．Today over $62 \%$ of it comes from states served by Santa Fe．
This year Santa Fe will haul over $2,300,000$ bales of cotton to markets in 34,000 box cars－enough box cars to make up a train 284 miles long．
Hauling cotton and other important crops，materi－ als and products from where they are grown or made to where they are needed is another example of how Santa Fe is meeting the transportation needs of a growing America．


If you can＇t afford a new fall hat，give the old one a new look with careful brushing and clean－ in．It works on men＇s hats，too！
Start by careful brushing．This may show up spots and stains that need special treatment．
Try using the sandpaper method first．With a piece of No． 0 sand－ paper，begin at center top of the crown and gently sard in the same direction around the crown， side crown and the brim．
If this fails，use naptha or other cleaning fluid．Dip a small brush， as nail brush，in the cleaning a－ gent，shake out exvess liquid and brush hat until the soiled spots disappear．Remember to work out－ doors when using cleaning fluids．
White or light colored felt hats may need special treatment．Sat－ urate corn meal with naptha or other cleaning fluid．Rub the mix－ ture into the felt with a ciean stiff brush．When fluid has eva－ porated，brush out the corn meal and air the hat before storing．
