A. J. MCDONALD ENTERS JP RACE

A. J. McDonald has announced that he is a candidate for Justice of the Peace, Precinct No. 2, Upton County, subject to the Democratic Primary May 5, 1962.

McDonald has lived in Rankinwith the exception of outside trips to work-since 1913 and is wellknown in the area. The family consists of Mr. and Mrs. McDonald, James, in the University of Texas, and Linda, a Senior in Rankin High School. The family owns and operates the Highway Grocery and Mkt. in Rankin.

In addition to the primary and general elections to be held this year, the city and school will also have voting. All require the voters to have a poll tax or exemption. Any bond elections that might be called in the year would have the same requirement.

GENE HENDRYX IS CANDIDATE FOR REPRESENTATIVE

Gene Hendryx, 36-year-old Alpine businessman and civic leader, authorized the Rankin News this week to announce his candidacy for the State Legislature from the 72nd District of Texas.

He has held public office in Brewster County for the past 10 years and is President and General Manager of KVIF-AM-TV. He is an honor graduate of Sul Ross State College, with a Bachelor's degree in government and a Master's degree in economics.

A past president of the Sul Ross Ex-Student Association, he has served in many civic capacities and is completing a term as President of the Texas Association of Broadcasters. Hendryx is wellknown throughout the state in both business and civic affairs. He is listed in Who's Who in the South and Southwest, Who's Who in American Business and Commerce and Who's Who in World Business and Commerce.

He has appeared in nation-wide broadcasts on NBC and Mutual and has been the subject of many feature articles in the press. including Time Magazine.

The former totally disabled Marine was recently honored by fellow citizens in Alpine at an appreciation banquet.

Hendryx is married to the former Lucille Kempen of Alpine and they have three sons. He is a member of the First Baptist Church.



"Put Something in The Pot" says IRS

All citizens or residents of the United States, including minor children, who had gross incomes of \$600 or more in 1961, must file a federal income tax return, J. R. Robinson, administrative officer, Internal Revenue Service in Odessa, announced today.

If the taxpayer is 65 or over as of December 31, 1961, he or she is not required to file unless his or her gross income for 1961 was at least \$1,200.

The IRS representative added that even though a taxpayer is not required to file under these rules, he or she must file to obtain a refund, if any income tax was withheld from his or her pay.

He said there is one exception to the general rule. Self-employed persons such as sole proprietors, partners, and independent contractors, must file an income tax return and pay a self-employment tax, if net earnings from selfemployement were \$400 or more.

Many questions about federal income tax returns can be answered by telephoning the IRS office. Deadline for filing this year is

Monday, April 16.
