Filing Deadline Shapes Up Field of Hopefuls --

Lively Political Contests Taking Shape In County

Interest in the forthcoming primary elections on May 5 took a big hop this week with the passing of the deadline for filing in the various races and the candidates moved out of the starting gate on their campaign drives for election.

On a state level, more names were still cropping up as late as last Wednesday with the new-charging Republican Party coming out with a rather heavy slate of office seekers.

No Republicans announced for local offices in Upton County but several will be contesting in district races. Both the Democrats and Republicans will hold their first primary election on May 5, followed by the run-off on June 2 and the General Election in November.

On a county basis, several candidates seeking re-election made it past the deadline without drawing opposition. Among them were Commissioner Tommy Workman, County Treasurer Elizabeth Rains and County and District Clerk Nancy K. Daugherty. Mrs. Monnie McSpadden drew a bye in the Justice of Peace, Precinct 1 race.

In the J. P. race for Precinct two, Mrs. Bandy Kaine did not seek re-election. Her post is being sought by W. J. Price, Elsie Turner and A. J. "Archie" McDonald.

Of prime interest on the local level will be the county judge's race where incumbent Bud Fisher is opposed by B. J. (Joe) Guthrie, Allen Moore and Norman Elrod. This is expected to be the top attraction of the county.

1962 License Plates On Sale At Courthouse

Bright, new 1962 license plates are now being offered for sale at the office of H. E. "Gene" Eckols in the courthouse in Rankin. The new plates, black with white lettering, went on sale February 1 with deadline for purchasing and installing, without penalty, being April 1.

Those purchasing their new tags are requested to have with them their title certificate and last year's registration papers. Prices of the 1962 licenses have not been changed over that of past years. Car owners who have out-of-state titles, and those having Texas titles that are not cleared or registered, must file at the court-

NORMAN ELROD IN JUDGE RACE

Norman Elrod, 40-year-old Rankin business man and civic leader, has authorized the News to announce that he is a candidate for the office of County Judge of Upton County, subject to the Democratic Primary May 5, 1962.

Elrod filed his name with Kirby Dawkins, Democratic county chairman, Monday; thus becoming the fourth candidate to announce for the office.

A graduate of San Angelo High School, Elrod attended San Angelo College and the University of Texas. He is married to the former Betty Bailey of San Angelo. They have one daughter, Judy, 13-years-old and a student in Rankin Junior High.

LONGTIME RESIDENT

Originally, the Elrod family began ranching in Upton County in 1932 when Norman's father leased the Noelke Estate. In 1942, Norman moved to his present home where he has been actively engaged in ranching since that time. He has also operated an insurance business since 1956.

The Elrods are members of the First Methodist Church in Rankin where he is now serving on the Board of Stewards. He has served several years on the Rankin School Board, is a member of the Rankin Hospital Board, works with the Girl Scouts and a number of other local organizations. He is connected with a number of ranching organizations and is a county chairman for the Animal Health Research program now being carried out in Texas and Upton County.

Mrs. Elrod is secretary to the Superintendent of Schools in Rankin and is also active in church and civic affairs and is a past president of a Rankin Beta Sigma Phi chapter.

MAKES STATEMENT

"I certainly want the people of Upton County to know that I am willing to work hard to be elected to the office of county judge, and if elected, to work just as hard to carry out the duties of the office in a manner that will truly represent the majority of the citizens," Elrod said.

On the state level, the big attention getter will be the race for governor where a grouping of just about something for everyone has been paraded forth. We have a Teddy Roosevelt charging up San Juan Hill in General Walker. We have a New Frontiersman in this fellow Yarborough. We have a hand-picked fair haired boy of the LBJ stables in John Conally. We have a nut in Will Wilson. We have a bold-faced liar in Price Daniel. And we have several others thrown in for good measure—plus the latest drapings in Texas political circles—Republicans.

Norman Elrod had experience four years ago in the same race and can be expected to put up strong contention for many of his former supporters are again backing him in his efforts. Striving to hold onto his seat will be Bud Fisher, the old pro of the judge business in Upton County and a man who has withstood political charges by a number of opponents over the years. All in all, this promises to be a hum-dinger of a race.

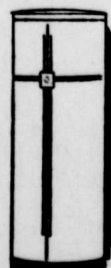

2120 Voters Make Eligibility List

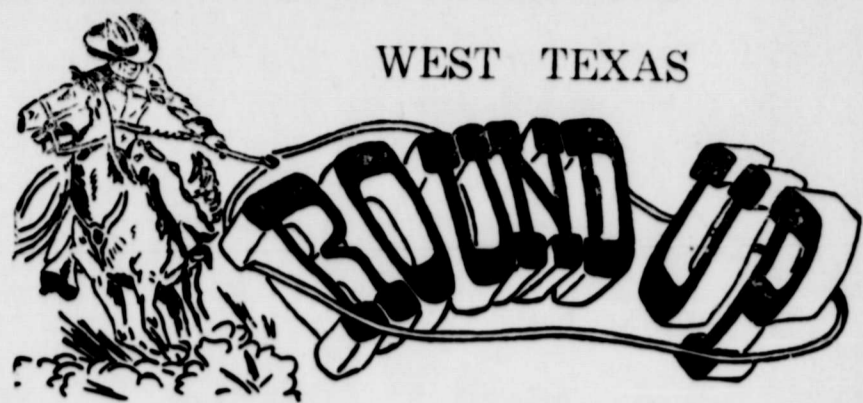

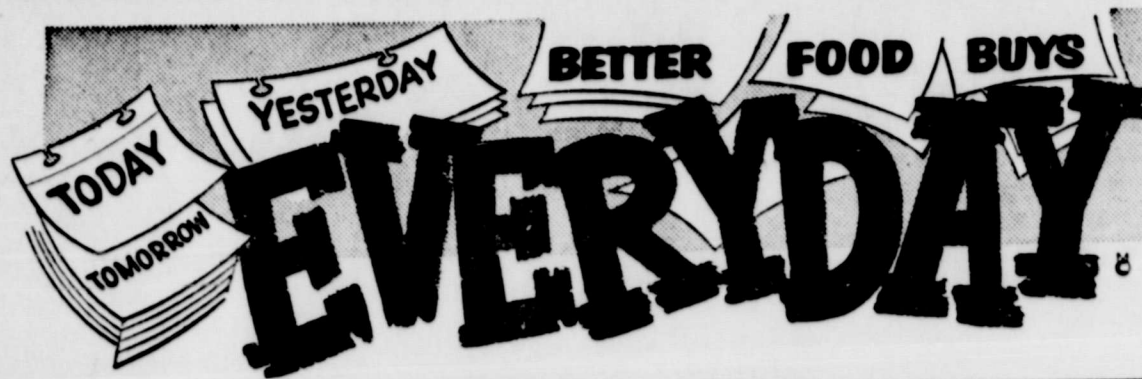
