Prolific Gas Discovery Indicated Near Rankin on Neal Ranch --

Oil Well Fire Not Too Serious

Considerable excitement racked Rankin last Tuesday evening when it was reported at about 7 p.m. that an oil well was on fire near the J. Lane ranch home some 8 miles west of town. Answering the alarm was the Rankin Volunteer Fire Department, the Mc-Camey Fire Department and two pumpers from the Halliburton Co.

The well had caught fire during a testing operation but the main blaze was brought under control by shutting off gas at the

well head. Some damage was sustained by the rig but an estimate on the amount was not available.

First reports stated that one of the crew had been injured but it was later discovered that he had escaped the flames by sliding down a guy wire from out of the top of the rig.

Elsewhere on the local oil front, the well some two miles east of Rankin on the Henry Neal ranch has been tested and first indications are that it is producing approximately 15 million cubic feet of gas per day from the Devonian section, thus making it by far the largest gas discovery in the immediate area. It is also said that it flows between 500-600 barrels of fluid per day. This well had been difficult for the operators to control while drilling and it

W. A. (BILL) STROMAN CANDIDATE FOR 25TH DISTRICT STATE SENATOR

W. A. (Bill) Stroman, of San Angelo has announced that he is a candidate for State Senator from the 25th Senatorial District of Texas, which includes Upton County. His candidacy will be subject to the May 5 Democratic Primary.

Stroman is a native of Texas, having finished high school in Uvalde and earned his money to go to business college. He then worked in courthouses and abstract offices, including the abstract office of former vice-president John N. Garner at Uvalde. He is married to the former Elsie Cloudt, daughter of a pioneer ranch family of Rocksprings. The Stromans have three children; Eileen, a graduate of Texas University, married to Col. John Lemp, Army Reserve, Washington, D. C.; Wm. J. Stroman, a graduate of A &M College, ranchman and married to Cleo Lane of Concho County; Gusta Mae, a graduate of Austin College and married to Fred O. Brewton,

Presbyterian minister, Levelland.

Mr. Stroman studied daw and was admitted to practice in Texas in 1923; was elected County Attorney of Tom Green County in 1924 and 1928; then elected District Attorney of the 119th Judicial District of Texas in 1934 and 1936. In 1951, he was elected to fill the unexpired term of Hon. Peppy Blount who resigned from the Legislature after the regular session that year. He was reelected to the State Legislature as Representative from Tom Green County in 1952, 1954, 1956 and 1958. He did not seek re-election to that post in 1960.

"I am now asking to be your State Senator and consider it an honor, a promotion and a sacred trust," Stroman said.

"While I am an Attorney in good standing in the State of Texas, I am not engaged in the active practice of law, and did not engage in the practice of law while State Representative, direc-

Last week, with the passing of the deadline for candidates to file their names with the Democratic chairman for a place on the ballot, an incident of two people failing to get their names in the pot has brought to light a weakness in our present system of selecting candidates for a

Both candidates have stated to me that the failure was entirely their fault and that in no way had the county chairman or any of his staff neglected their duties or obligations. I'm sure this is true and this is in no way a condemnation of the county Democratic organization.

To me, however, it points out a rather said lack someplace in the manner in which we go about putting names on the ballot. We make great talk about the high priviledge of citizenship, of the right and obligation of the citizen to vote and of the sanctity of the ballot-yet, through a hair-splitting process that forbids the chairman seeking out candidates, two people who had made public announcement of their intentions to seek an office will not be listed for the voters themselves to choose from but are forced to have to seek the office by way of write-ins.

It was a well-known fact and of public knowledge that these two people were running for the office-had even gone so far as to solicite votes.

It would appear to me that we need some changes - or at least a little leniency - that would permit the chairman to notify in writing, all those he knew of who had indicated an interest in getting on the ballot as to deadlines on the various steps of seeking the office. 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



NEW SALARIES SET FOR YEAR OF 1962


Topping the list of salaries of elected officials is the Courty Judge with an annual salary of \$6.750 plus \$1,200 for judicial and administrative service and as chairman of the County Juvenile Board. He also receives \$75 per month for car expenses.

Receiving an annual salary of \$6,750 during 1962 will be the county clerk, county tax assessorcollector, county auditor, county treasurer, county attorney and the sheriff. The sheriff and his deputies also receive 10 cents a mile for car expense.

Commissioners receive an annual salary of \$6,390 plus \$75 per month car expense. The justice of peace in Precinct No. 2 receives an annual salary of \$1,-200 while the constable of this precinct receives \$2,1877.60 per year. The salary of the justice of peace of Precinct No. 4 is set at \$2,187.60 as is the salary of the constable of the same precinct.

The county juvenile officer is paid \$6,600 annually plus 10 cents per mile expense on his car, and is allowed \$50 per month for a part-time secretary.






