## Polls Open At 8 Saturday In First Primary Balloting

Voters all over Texas will go to the poll Saturday, May 5 and cast their ballots in the First Primary Election, and for perhaps the first time, a large number of Republicans will be making their choices along with Democrats as the State of Texas gradually moves toward a two-party state.

In Upton County, the only voting will be in the Democratic side of the primary with the polls to open at 8 a.m. and remain open until 7:00 p.m. Voting in Rankin will be held at the Couthouse for those living in Precinct One, Box

1. Voting in Box Two, Precinct Two will be at the Rankin Park Building while residents living in the Midkiff area in Precinct One, will vote at the Phillips Camp in Box 3.

Absentee voting in the Primary ended on May 1 with some 187 votes reported by County Clerk Nancy K. Daugherty.

Political fever has not been particularly high in Upton County this year with most attention on the governor's race where a good many people have expressed indecision about just what to do. No

strong favorite appears locally in this race. Another race that is drawing some attention is that of U. S. Representative in the 16th Congressional District where incumbent J. T. Rutherford is opposed by three candidates, none of which have made any driving campaign efforts in Upton County.

County-wide, the top attraction is in the Judges race where two McCamey men and two Rankin men vie for positions. Most observers are saying that there will be a run-off in this race. Several precinct races are drawing interest and one or two write-in campaigns are going on.

Another topic of interest will be the propositions on horse racing and the repeal of poll taxes. Neither of the propositions are more than a straw vote by the voting public and may or may not be used by the Texas Legislature for further action along the lines indicated by the vote.

## Election Returns Plus Drawing on Tap May 5

Saturday ought to be a full and busy day for most people in this area. Starting with voting at 8 a.m., the day will include a free drawing for prizes from a number of Rankin merchants, a cake walk at 7:00 p.m. sponsored by the Rankin Lions Club, and election returns for a good part of the evening.

The free drawing will be held at 5 p.m. across from the First State Bank. The winner must be present in order to receive the prize. If the names drawn are not on hand, drawing will continue until someone present is found. Contestants may sign up at any of the participating firms until the boxes are taken to the drawing at 5. Each firm participating will have its own winner—thus a

large number of people will be awarded free gifts.

The cakewalk will be staged between the bank and the Ford Theatre where the street will be roped off. Proceeds from this event are used by the Lions in their local civic projects.

Beginning as soon as returns are released after 7 p.m., an election board showing the names of candidates of local interest will carry totals and standings. This procedure has been very popular over the past years and always provides suspense as leads change back and forth.

A concession stand is usually operated in connection with the election returns and everyone is invited to be on hand.

The rest of the races are either uncontested or are on the precinct level and since none of my own precinct races are contested, I'll stay out of the others.

As for the horse racing and the poll tax propositions, they should never have appeared on this ballot anyway since the vote will have no authority of any kind. If those elected to the Legislature of Texas do not have backbone enough to do what they think is right without having to stir up a big squabble such as these propositions have, then we need a new slate in Austin from top to bottom—and that we do need.

So that's that. Just one thing—if you don't go vote or if you did not pay your poll tax—don't say a word one way or another. It's none of your business.

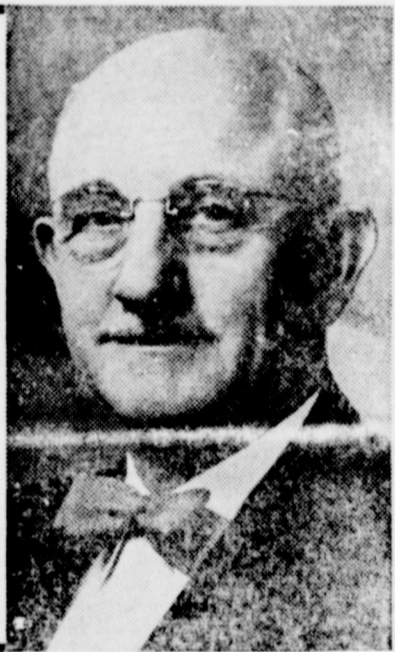

### THE DAILY FOOD GUIDE—

These are the things we need from our food each day:

Protine for growth and for repair to the body.

Minerals and vitamins for the growth and to keep the body functioning properly.

Fat and carbohydrate for energy.

Most of our foods contain more than one nutrient, but no food contains all the nutrients in the amounts needed. So we need to choose foods from each group each day.

Remember the four lane food-way? There were milk-cheese, meat group, enriched breads and whole grain cereals, and fruit-vegetable group.

In the milk group we find milk—fluid whole, evaporated, skim, dry, buttermilk; cheese—cottage, cream cheddar type—natural or processed and ice cream. Milk is our main source of calcium, which is needed for bones, teeth, and a lot of other regulating processes in the body. It also provides high class protein, vitamin A, riboflavin (that's one of the B vitamins), and other nutrients.

Since it is nearly impossible to get enough calcium in the diet with milk products the following equivalents are measured in terms of the amount of calcium. They may be higher or lower in calories and other nutrients.

1 inch cube cheddar type cheese equals 2/3 cup milk

1/2 cup cottage cheese equals 1/3 cup milk

2 tablespoons cream cheese equals 1 tablespoon milk

There's the reason for milk—2 cups for adults, 3 to 4 cups for children, teen-agers, and pregnant women. We'll talk about the other lanes later.
