School Board Puts Changes into Effect
In a recent notice to parents, Rankin Schools pointed out the following has been adopted by the Board of Trustees for the high school schedule for the 1962-1963 school year.

1. The high school schedule is to operate under a 7 period school day, ending no later than 4 p.m. and beginning approximately the same time as now scheduled. 4. Beginning with the summer of 1962 , drivers education is to be offered only during the summer manths.
5. All boys organized athethes Local graduation requirements are also under study by the board at this time. It is explained that the object of the seven-period sshool day schedule will offer more student choise of subjects offered by RHS
