Firm To Build New Plant in West Texas--

MDA Studies Inquiry On Clothing Plant Location

Members of the Rankin Merchants' Development Association met at the courthouse last Thursday night to discuss a letter received here concerning a clothing location in West Texas.

The firm, contacted through the West Texas Utilities Company office in Abilene where a full-time employee makes contact with prospective firms wishing to locate in this area, was not named but the information requested indicated a

They were interested in transportation facilities, employment figures for the area and a building. Indications are that they will manufacturing firm looking for a employ about 200 people and will require a one-story building of about 30,000 square feet. They indicated that they were going to reach a decision on thier location in the very near future.

The MDA members present decided to investigate the prospect fully and to make an active effort

to secure its location here. They felt that sufficient labor would be available with the towns surrounding Rankin used as a source from which to draw. As for the building, it was felt that this could be arranged with some local financing and the remainder handled by firms dealing in such business.

The MDA was to meet again on the matter as soon as more information was available.

At the same meeting, the position of president of the Merchants Development Association was declared vacant and Dell Cooledge was elected as president. Tommy Workman is vice-president and H. Wheeler is secretary-treasurer of the organization.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the proclamation and publication of this proposed amendment by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows:
"Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by eremy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of Constitution and laws of this state.

the Constitution of Texas, known as the "Bill of Rights" shall not be in any manner, affected, amended, impaired, suspended, repealed or suspended hereby."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section to be known as Section 1-A which permits the Legislature to delegate certain zoning powers to the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, immediately following Section 1, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows:
"Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

"Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

"The Legislature may enact any laws not inconsistent with this Section which it may deem necessary to permit said counties to implement, enforce and administer the provisions contained herein.

"Should the Legislature enact legis-

lation in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."
