## Only Small Change Anticipated in Enrollment --

# Rankin Schools To Open With Full Day September 4

Tuesday, opening day for Rankin Independent Schools, will be a full day's work for students in all grades. Buses will run on their regular schedules.

As best as can be determined by pre-school registrations, the enrollment for the overall school is going to be near the same mark that it was at the end of the term last spring. A first grade class of close to 60 is expected by Elementary Principal Mike Huges. In the second grade, three sections will be taught.

Junior high enrollment is expected to remain at near the same as last spring while over in the high school, Principal Bill Hood said that he expected a drop-off

of possibly 6 to 10 students. The senior class looks like it will be one of the smaller ones for the past several years.

Time schedules for the Rankin Schools are as follows:

**HIGH SCHOOL**—8:25 to 12:13, first four regular periods of class instruction with four minutes between each class. Lunch—12:13-12:50. 12:50 to 4:00—three regular periods of class instruction with four minutes between classes plus 20 minute activity period. Total school day: 8:25 to 4:00.

**JUNIOR HIGH**—8:30 to 11:35, first three periods of class instruction with five minutes between classes plus a 20 minute

activity period. Lunch—11:35 to 12:15. 12:15 to 4:00, four periods of class instruction with 5 minutes between classes.

**ELEMENTARY**—Grades 1 and 2—total school day, 8:30-3:00.

Grades 3—8:30 to 3:30.  
Grades 4—8:30 to 4:00.

Lunch—11:00 to 11:35 in the cafeteria with an additional 25 minutes for supervised play before returning to class at 12:00.

## MANY THANKS—

Some have suggestions for improving The News—such as suggesting that I drop dead—and others comment on various news items, editorials and things in general—or just say "hello". There are too many this year to answer each personally so may I simply say "Thanks" to each who took a moment or so to drop a line. I assure you that each and every one was appreciated.

## NOTHING NEW—

Among the most popular questions around town the last week has been, "what has happened to the deal the MDA is working on with the clothing factory?" The answer is "nothing yet." And it may end that way.

But the fact that more and more inquiries of the sort received here seem to be coming from "up North" is a good indication and one which tends to give at least a shadow of hope that one day—if we keep trying—we may hit the jackpot and land something here. ## GENE HENDRYX—

Most of us probably never had had the pleasure of knowing Mr. Gene Hendryx, Democratic nominee for Representative from this district, until he began campaigning last winter. Now it seems that we have gone and selected a quite well-know personage.

In a letter of August 20, Mrs. Stewart L. Udall, Secretary of the Interior of the United States, offered Mrs. Hendryx a place on the National Parks Advisory Board to become effective in 1963.

clined the appointment stating that, "recently the voters of West Texas nominated me to serve in the Texas Legislature and I feel my first duty is to Texas."

Mr. Hendryx, I salute you for putting your obligations to your constituents before any honors that might have befallen you as a member of this board.

Dedicated public officials—those dedicated to the job for which they were elected—are always to be commended. It is not unusual to see those in high office try to spread themselves too thin with the result that they do not do a very good job anyplace.

And along this same line is a little practice that irks a lot of people—that of judges elected to an office stepping aside and having an outside judge take their place when a case comes up that might be a political hot potato. They were elected to the bench—they ought to be the ones who do the presiding—no matter what.

A recent example of this was the case involving the county in which Judge Starley from Pecos was brought in to replace the regular judge.

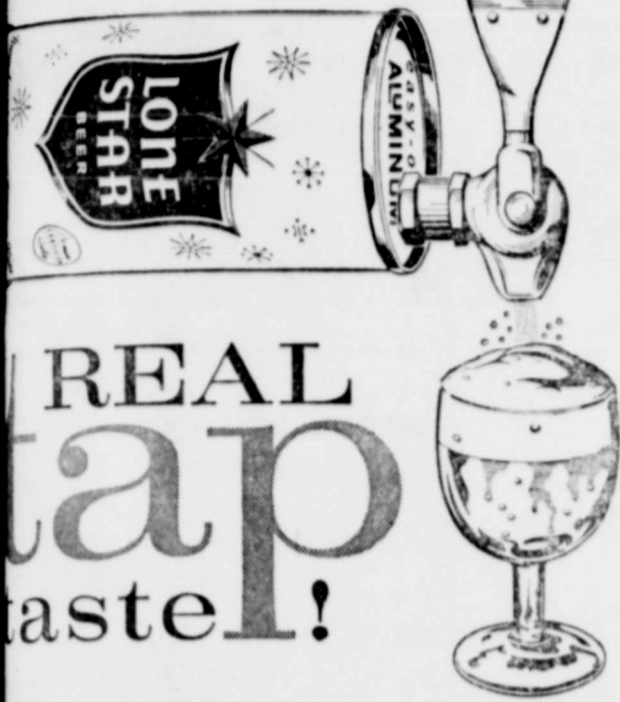

Then there's always the excuse of having a few days vacation on tap—conveniently falling on the same date as the trial.

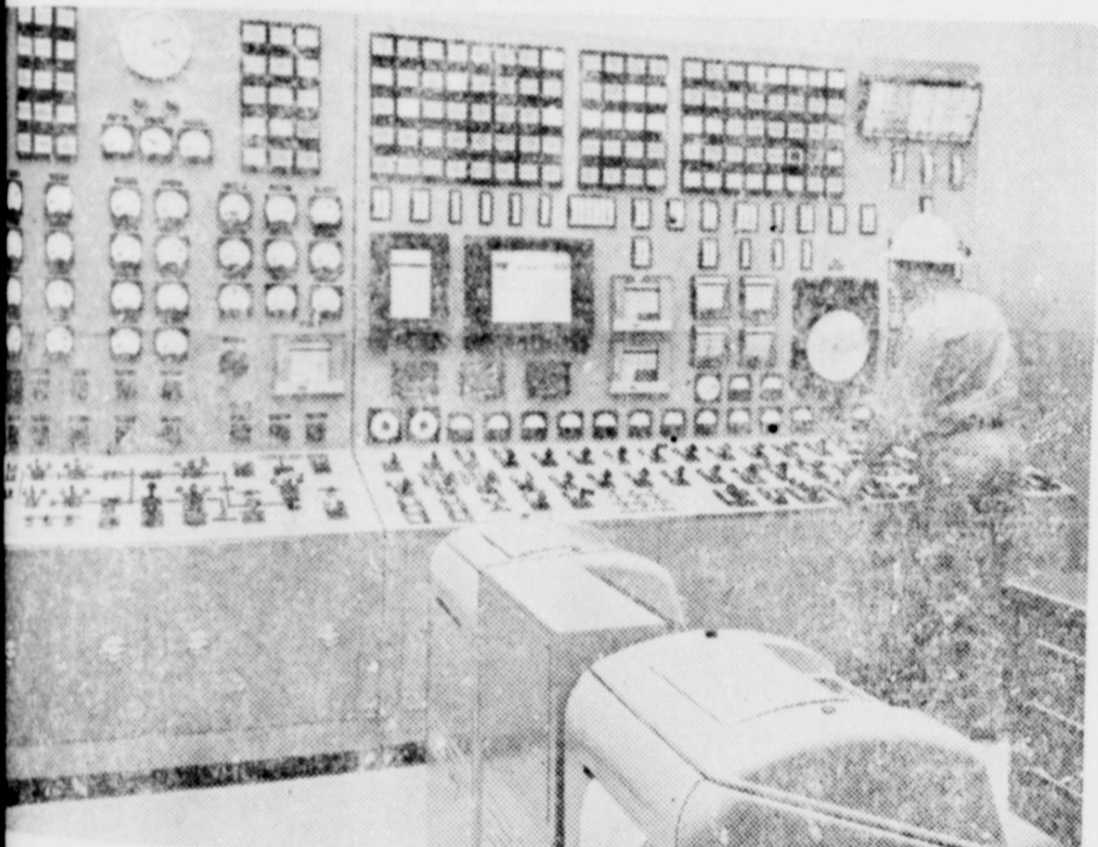
Oh, well—why not take the easy way out—it's the accepted practice.

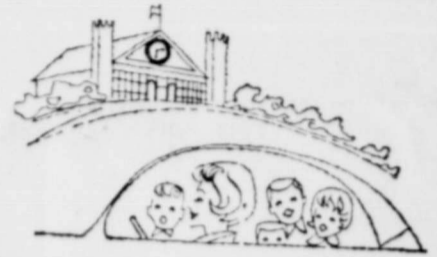
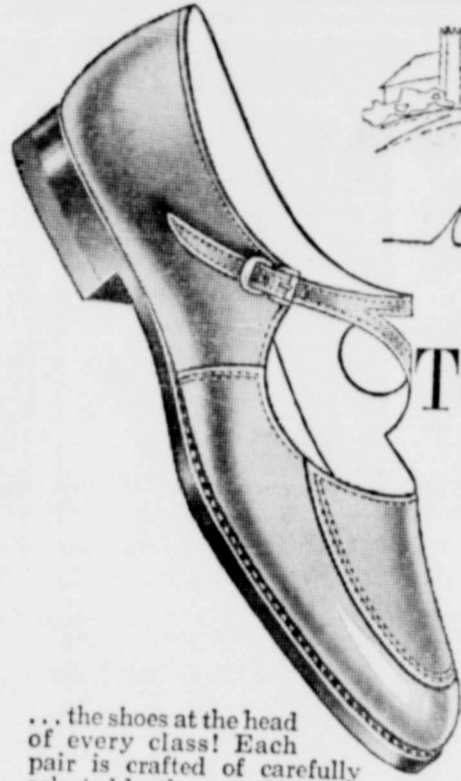

ED.—Since I do not know you personally and your name does not appear on our mailing list—plus the fact that you are evidently not a regular reader of **The Rankin News** for two reasons: (1) you would have known that all half-way reasonable letters to the editor are printed without any rather cornball references to "In all fairness . . ." and (2) I have never made any claim to being even half-way an informed editor—one can only assume that you have been "chosen" to make reply to the above mentioned editorial.

You are correct in saying that I did not attend the "trial". I have never cared much for the farce-comedy situations.

You say that the trial was fair when it was ruled that state law

does not apply to government officials. Then again I say, "why have the rules?" Again you say that it's quite evident to any news paper editor who has a working knowledge of his country's government that county candidates are governed by State laws and that government officials are governed by the Constitution of the United States of America. Then that leaves two things evident: (1) Either Congressman Rutherford did not believe this—else he would never have bothered to comply with the law on filing his contributions in the first place, or (2) he's as ignorant of the laws of the land as is this country newspaper editor. Personally, I have always admired him as being a cut above this.

Any joker can become a newspaper editor—he doesn't even have to be an authority on constitutional law. A congressman ought to be a little sharper.

This newspaper has long been a supporter of Rutherford's—giving him pats on the back when he has seemed to us to have been right—gigging him when it looked from here that he was wrong. It looks to me like he passed up

a fine opportunity to set the record straight on the whole Billie Sol mess when he did not have his attorney fully explain his part. There are many questions that are unanswered and much suspicion has been spread.

Continued support under these circumstances will be hard for me to give and why you chose to answer an editorial printed in an obscure weekly newspaper only adds fat to the fire.
