You are correct in saying that I did not attend the "trial". I have never cared much for the farcecomedy situations.
You say that the trial was fair when it was ruled that state law
does not apply to government of ficials. Then again I say, "why have the rules?" Again you say that it's quite evident to any news paper editor who has a working knowledge of his country's govern ment that county candidates are governed by State laws and that government officials are governed by the Constitution of the United states of Amerids. Then that leaves two things evident: (1) Either Congressman Rutherford did not believe this-else he would never have bothered to comply with the law on filing his contributions in the first place, or (2) he's as ignorant of the laws of the land as is this country newspaper editor. Personally, I have always admired him as being a cut above this.
