## Texas Teacher Pay Falls To New Low: TSTA Urges Increase Approval

Texas' ranking among the 50 states in average salaries paid to classroom teachers has fallen to a new low, the Texas State Teachers Association announced Wednesday.

The annual salary of a classroom teacher in Texas, according to new statistical data, is \$6,025 compared to the national average of \$6,821.

The deficit places Texas in the 33rd rank among the 50 states.

Last year, Texas ranked 29th in the nation. But the state dropped to 33rd because other states moved ahead with improved teacher salaries.

Texas fares worse in the new ranking with an average salary increase granted in 1966. For Texas this amount was only \$95. This puts Texas 49th in this salary increase grant category. Only Wyoming, with a \$46 average increase, is lower.

The rankings were prepared by the Research Division of the National Education Association in Estimates of School Statistics 1966-67.

Texas State Teachers Association has proposed teacher pay increase platform in its 1967 legislative program.

If the Texas Legislature approves the pay increase proposed this year, according to a TSTA leader, the new boost would "just barely" bring Texas as up to the present national average "and no higher."

The official, Dr. Joe, B. McNeil, Superintendent of Wichita Falls Schools and Chairman of TSTA's Legislative Committee, said the TSTA program envisions an average increase in Texas classroom teachers salaries of \$775 in the minimum salary schedule for classroom teachers.

"Compare TSTA's \$775 average increase with the difference of \$796, in our present salary schedule and the national average and you can see that TSTA's program is indeed a 'must,' McNeil said.

"At best," said McNeil, "the TSTA pay program is an in-

terim measure preparatory to termination on salaries we hope will be granted two years from now."

A study committee set up by an act of the Legislature of 1965 is expected to recommend higher salaries for Texas teachers in 1969.

"Texas can't wait until 1969 for action and we think the Leg-

There will be no charge for these classes as they are sponsored by the Goodwill Center as a service to the community.

"The TSTA program," he added, "is an interim measure needed now to prevent our present shortage of 5,000 teachers from becoming a deeper crisis."

On the local level, Superintendent of Muleshoe Schools, Neal Dillman has been speaking to some of the civic clubs and states that he is available to speak to any civic, social or other groups to explain in detail this situation and the financial status of Muleshoe Independent School District.

In a story last issue, Dillman pointed out that Muleshoe school's coaches were paid less salary than any other class AAA school coach in the area.

He also said "We want the public to become interested in this legislation on teacher pay . . . your schools are only as good as your teachers."

## Residents Alerted On Inflammable Dolls

Some of the less inflammable fire dolls, thusfar have been discovered in Muleshoe. The one shown here was purchased by Ray Cline some four months ago for his four-year-old daughter, Rebecca.

Cline took the doll to Fire Chief Earl Ladd Friday and it was found to be made of the inflammable material of the vinyl face variety, considered much less inflammable than some made in Poland with faces of Nitrocellulose. The nitrocellulose dolls burst into flames when exposed to flame or intense sunshine, however the

vinyl faced ones are set by open flame.

The dolls are inexpensive and this particular one cost \$11, tax included. They are said to range in size from very small to 15 inches in height and can more easily be identified by a

## Trio Attends Tourist Workshop

Chamber of Commerce manager, Bob Janca, Bob Stovall, chairman of the C of C tourist committee and Gil Lamb attended the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Tourist Workshop in Colorado City, Friday.

Lamb was on the panel for one of the workshops "How to Develop manmade and Natural Attractions." J. B. Phillips, Del Rio, co-chairman of the Tourist and Travel Committee of the WTCC, led the panel discussion on developing manmade and natural tourist attractions. The Palo Duro Canyon theatre, the famous Mule Memorial of Mule-

shoe and the Alley Oop Park in Iran, and the railroad museum in Weatherford were some of the items discussed in this workshop and those persons instrumental in the creation and promotion of these attractions were on the panel.

"Tourist development is the greatest potential for growth in West Texas," according to the consensus of opinion of hundreds of businessmen in "brainstorming" sessions of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce during recent months.

This Friday's workshop was the first annual Tourist De-

velopment Conference of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. This conference emphasized the "how to" workshops which have proven so popular in conferences on other subjects.

Development of history as a tourist attraction, developing manmade and natural attractions, the care and feeding of tourists, use of brochures in attracting and developing tourism and other related subjects were discussed in the day-long meeting.

## Melvin Munn is C of C Banquet Speaker

One of the nation's top twenty public speakers, Melvin Munn of Dallas, Texas, will address the Annual Banquet of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce

Monday, January 30, 7:30 p.m. Munn, who is heard daily over more than 440 radio stations, is the Commentator on LIFE LINE Radio. Until January 1 he reported from Washington, D. C. and has just moved his operation to Dallas.

A native Texan, graduate of Texas schools, and former banker, Munn was first widely known for his news, sports, and special events broadcasting over KRLD radio and television in Dallas. As an independent public relations consultant he and his family lived in Panama from 1959 until 1963 when he moved to Washington. He became public relations consultant to several Representatives and Senators in the nation's capital.

For the past twenty years Munn has traveled as much as 200,000 miles annually addressing school, business, service, and church groups throughout the country. He is famed for his presentation from memory of "Christ's Sermon

On The Mount", quoting Matthew 5, 6, and 7. He was honored in Washington, D. C. on August 23, 1966 when a city-wide service was arranged at Capitol Hill Methodist Church to hear his 2,000th presentation of this famed message.

Munn has announced his subject, "Different Somehow", as a study of what it takes for modern citizens to be extraordinary Americans. Among his honors, Munn is an Honorary Citizen of over 100 American cities, and 21 states. He holds the International Key of Honor from Key Club International, a boys' service organization sponsored by Kiwanis International. He is past president of the Kiwanis Club of Dallas, Lieutenant Governor of Kiwanis, Division II, Kiwanis District Chairman for Key Clubs, and Resolutions, and served two years on the Key Club Committee of Kiwanis International.

Jones had the responsibility of the Outgoing Letter Section, and 1200 employees, in the Chicago Office. The record day during the Christmas Mailing Period, was 28,000,000 pieces handled. The Chicago Office had a 12% increase in mail volume, with a decrease of 10% in man-hours, in comparison with the previous year.

Jones, at this time, does not know which Post Office he will be assigned next.

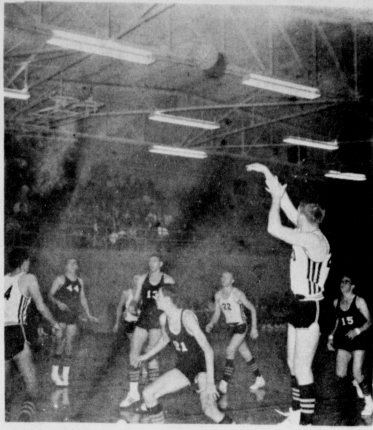

children and their education and property taxes, our source of income, is already just about as high as it can go, it seems, whereas the state has many sources of revenue such as tobacco, gasoline, etc.

Texas lost 11,000 teachers with one to five years experience from May to September last year.

"It is important that citizens learn more about this legislation and the importance of salary increases. When a near-

by state pays more salary, it is only natural, and especially with the rising cost of living, for these teachers to seek and accept positions outside Texas," Dillman said.  
 According to statistics, Texas teacher pay average stands \$2,898 below the highest ranking state.

 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with 1/3 cup milk. Beat until mixed well and pour batter into a deep lightly greased pie plate. Cook at 350 degrees until done, and set aside.  
 Mix 3 egg yolks  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 3 tablespoon cornstarch  
 1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
 In a saucepan put 1 & 1/2 cups milk and 2 tablespoons of butter. When this begins to thicken, remove from heat and beat until smooth. Pour over foundation. Top with meringue, as any cream pie and brown in 450 degree oven.

The bride's mother chose a blue silk dress with matching hat and the bridegroom's mother wore a gold suit with matching accessories. Both wore white carnation corsages.

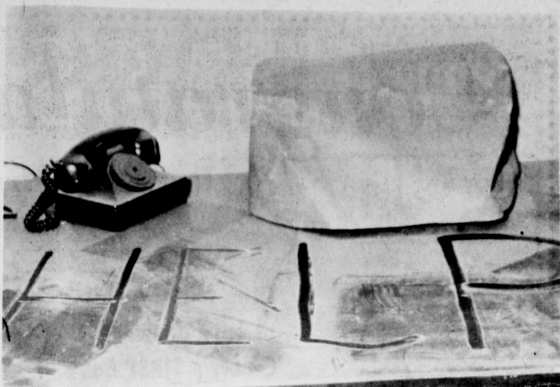
Following the ceremony, a reception was held at the Country Club in Sweetwater when the

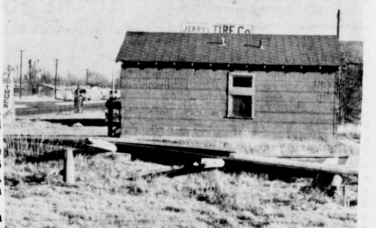
