few days now, Texas
go to the polls. They
ballot in Upton County
size of a pillow and
their choices in the
columns, will have

fourteen amendments at the bot-
tom of the ballot.

This is a large number of a-
mendments for Texas ballots and
it would take a pretty smart per-

son a long time to study all of
them and make a wise and prop-
er selection in the "For" and
"Against" proposition.

Several of them call for more
spending and—if past indications
are any measure—will pass. One
has to do with water, one is to
give the Legislature power to act
on its own in creating hospital
districts without having to have
a constitutional amendment pas-
sed. Discussing each one would be
long and dry.

The really interesting one is
the last one on the ballot—num-

ber 14—Trial de Novo. On this
we have had much publicity, most
of it against the amendment.

It is the only one which I
strongly favor.

Let me say that I do not fav-
or tying the hands of commis-
sioners' courts, school boards nor
city councils. We have the power
to control these in the ballot
boxes. And, contrary to what most
of the publicity against the a-
mendment would lead you to be-
lieve, the Legislature does not at
this point show any indication to
interfere with the above mention-
ed bodies or their decisions. The
Legislature, from its beginning,
has not tried to control these
bodies. There is no reason to be-
lieve they will start now. In fact,
the amendment, as stated on the
ballot, makes no mention of what
departments or bureaus will be
covered. It only grants the Legis-
lature the power to make such
provisions.

When the constitution of Tex-
as was written, we had no depart-
mental bureaus such as the fish
and game, railroad, highway, all
the various licensing departments
nor any zoning boards, water dis-
tricts, hospital districts, and the
many, many others that are now
in existence. Since that time, as
the new departments have been
created, they have been able—
under our present set up of laws—
to become the rules makers, the
investigators, the judges and the
enforcers. They have been able to
make their own rules and these
rules—for all practical purposes—
have become law with hardly any
protection for Mr. Average Citi-
zen to have his day in court when
slapped with penalty or unfavor-
able ruling.

This amendment, —if passed,—
would give the Legislature some
authority to correct this situation.

Suppose you are stopped by the
Highway Patrol and they find
that you are supposed to wear
glasses when you drive but that
you do not have them on. They
can—and have—given tickets that
have resulted in fines in J. P.
courts. You have injured no one,
you did not have an accident, yet
you are fined.

So, you decide to fight the case.
But before you can go into court
and put your side of the story be-
fore a jury, you must get your
case into court and that—as the
situation now stands—is where
you are stuck. Due to the present
legal set up, it's almost impossible

for the individual to have his day
in court in such circumstances.

It works the same in many,
many other instances involving
rulings made by bureaus.

is favorable toward individual rights. It protects the individual from the bureaucratic ruling.


That may well be one reason it is being so thoroughly condemned. Bureaus have great powers and they do not want them weakened.

One of the big arguments against it is that it will flood the courts with law suits. I doubt that. It costs money to have a law suit and few of us have it to spend on a case that might involve little more than a principal. But sup-

pose it did. Do we set a price on justice? Is the individual and his rights worth only a certain figure? Do we say this much and no more for a man's rights? I think not.

If I really believed that passage of this amendment would hinder our local self governments such as school boards, city council-

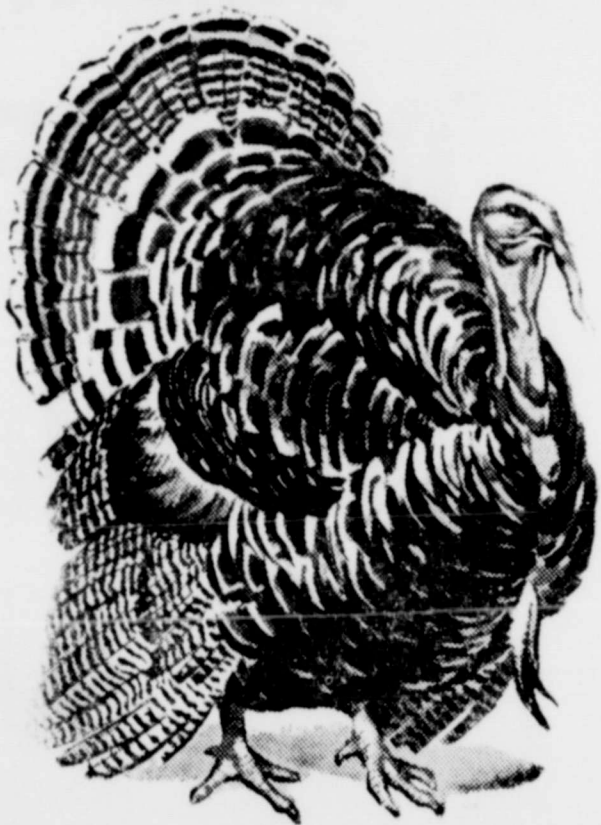

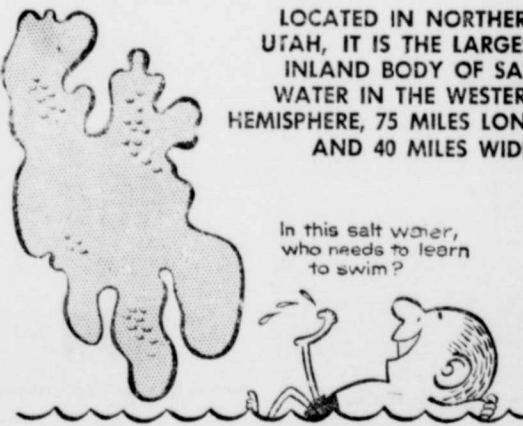
