1307 Doses of Vaccine Given in First Clinic--

SOS Make-Up Program To Be Held Here Sunday

The Sabin oral vaccine was distributed to 1307 individuals last Sunday in a campaign against polio which Dr. James Gossett termed "very successful."

"We were highly pleased with the turn-out for this vaccine program," Gossett continued. "However, we have not attained 100% participation."

So that those who were unable

to get their immunization last Sunday will still be able to obtain it, a make-up program has been scheduled for this Sunday, November 18, at the Rankin Park Building from 3 to 5 p.m. All who missed taking the serum last week are urged to get it this week since this will be the last time Type I vaccine will be available for such distribution.

The administering process is absolutely painless and takes less than five minutes to register, take the vaccine, and receive a patient's record card.

Three doses of the vaccine are required to complete the program. Other clinics will be arranged and announced at a later date. The Sabin Oral Vaccine will be available at physician's offices but will not be administered there under this type program. Gossett pointed out that everyone over 3 months old should take the vaccine, delaying their dosage only if they have a fever or an upset stomach.

Fly Release Rates To Be Determined By Need in Given Area

Extension of the sterile fly release area and changes in the fly release rates were announced by officials of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program last week. The latter will put a heavier burden of responsibility on individual livestock producers, so said Dub Day, county agent.

An additional 10,000 square miles are being included in the fly release area in Western Texas and the number of flies released will be stepped up in some areas and reduced in others. While definite release rates have been designated for all areas, this will tend to vary according to the number of confirmed screwworms scepia-mans sent to the Mission laboratory for identification. Thus, says Dub, the producers themself-

es will largely determine how many flies they will get each week. This, of course, affects only those counties within the fly release area.

The additional area is composed roughly of the territory encompassed by a line running west from the old line along the

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Sutton-Schleicher county passing just south of Sheffield and continuing eastward until it intersects the old line. (Continued to Next Page)

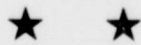

line coming north from the U. S.-Mexican border and passing through Sanderson. This line could vary somewhat, officials have said.

This new release area will receive 600 sterile flies per square mil per week. The Edwards Plateau and surrounding territory where native flies still exist in large number will receive 1,000 flies each week. The areas in southern Texas where fewer cases of screwworms are being detected will receive 400 flies per square mile each week.

Program officials will be watching the number of specimens confirmed as screwworms which are sent into the laboratory each week by livestock producers and livestock inspectors. This will largely determine whether the number of flies being dispersed in any area should be increased or reduced. So, says Dub, it is up to producers to check their livestock on a regular basis and send in samples, unless they want to run the risk of having the number of sterile flies released in their area reduced.

He said producers should put about 10 maggots or worms from a wound in a container of alcohol or water and sent it to: Box 969, Mission, Texas, or they may send the sample to him and he will forward it to Mission.

Cheryl Little, Rankin 4-H Club girl, received an additional award this week for work done on the favorite food show last summer. General Foods presented each girl who took part in the district show one of their five-dollar cookbooks. This came as a surprise to the girls and is a really nice addition to their foods library.

Cheryl had already won the blue award at the district favorite foods show. In the show the girls prepare a food, make a day's menu including the food, set a table for their menu, and make a table arrangement. They are also expected to "know all the answers" on the preparation, setting and nutrition of their exhibits.

Other girls receiving the cookbook as an additional award were Diane and Marsha Proffitt of Big Lake and Deborah Harless of McCamey.

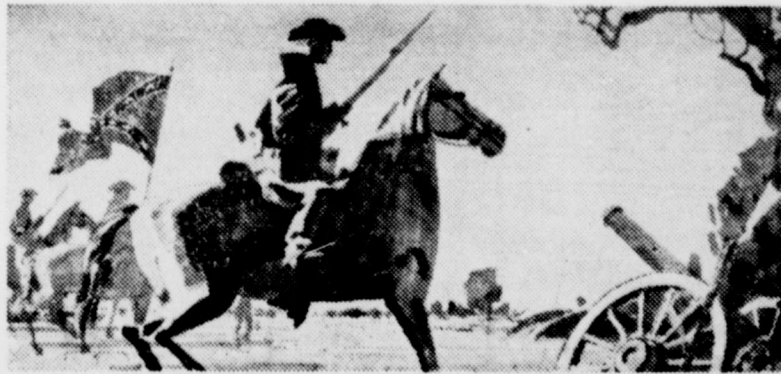
