In their meeting last Monday. the first regular session with new County Judge Allen Moore presiding, the Upton County Commissioners' Court gave most of their attention to salaries.

The minutes of the meeting indicate that the court voted to retain all salaries for county office holders and employees at the same figure as it was on December 31, 1962 with the exceptions

County Judge Allen Moore has issued a call for a meeting of the Upton County Historical Survey Committee on January 19, 1963 at 10:00 A. M. in the Upton County Courthouse in Rankin, Tex-

This meeting is being held in accordance with a proclamation by Governor John Connally, declaring January 19 as Texas Historical Preservation Day. Over 2,000 committeemen in some 240 County Historical Survey Committees over Texas are expected to convene on that day to elect officers and formulate plans for the year's work.

Every county has a history all its own and Upton County is no exception, Judge Moore has pointed out. The County Historica Survey Committee has unlimited possibilities for doing our county a great service in the field of preserving our history for future generations, he has stated.

"The work being accomplished by these committees throughout our area will help stimulate tourist trade for history seeking travelers and be an aid to the economy of our county," Moore said.






