The Rankin Public Schools employs the services of 38 professional personnel, all degree holders, with 19 holding master's degrees and 19 holding bachelor's degrees.

Of the total teachers, 12 teach in the elementary school grades 1-4, 9 teach in junior high-grades 5-8, and in high school, 12 teach grades 9-12.

Of the total current enrollment of 533 pupils, 217 are enrolled in elementary school, 190 are enrolled in junior high and 126 in high school.
