Norman Elrod, Upton County financial chairman for the screw worm eradication program in the Southwest, reported this week the county livestockmen had contributed a total of \$5,100 to this program since its beginning. He said that over \$1,000 had been donated by Upton ranchers during the recent emergency fund drive that kept the program in operation. He further stated that siil more funds had been pladged and would become available later.

The eradication program has been successful to the point that in 1962, 113 cases of screwworms were reported in the Southwest for the month of February as compared with only 10 cases for the February just past.





Quick Action Makes Difference In Fight On Screwworms

BY W. M. (DUB) DAY County Agent, Upton County

If Kinney County livestockmen ever had any doubts that collecting screwworm samples brings quick action, that doubt no longer exists. Within hours after a specimen submitted by a producer from that county was confirmed as a screwworm, there was a buzz of activity with emergency procedures being initiated and extra sterile flies being released. The same prompt, action can be taken in confirmed cases anywhere in the Southwest if producers will send in samples.

Kinney County was already receiving sterile flies at the rate of 1,000 per square mile per week but additional flies were immediately dropped on the Chapman Ranch and surrounding premises up and down the Nucces River. As an added measure, flies were brought into the area by station wagon and were released at the ground level. Increased releases of this nature insure that native flies are outnumbered by sterile flies.

Knowing immediately when all screwworm cases in the South-west are located has become so important to the eradication program that arrangements have been made so livestockmen can call the Mission headquarters collect when an infestation is detected.

When a screwworm case is found, officials would like producers to do two things: (1) collect 10 worms from the wound,






