## Rankin Qualifies Three For Regional Meet

In the District 8-8 track meet, held in Ozona last Saturday, Rankin qualified three for regional competition. Jerry McDonald was 1st in the shot put with 49'1" and 2nd in discus with 137'10"

Eddie Houchins was 1st in the mile run with a time of 5:02.

Robert Brummett qualified by winning second in the 880 with a time of 2:09.8—missing first place by a half step.

In the 440 relay the team of Parrish, Merriman, Humphreys and McDonald placed 5th as did the mile relay team; a group of sophomores who were timed at 3:47.

Tom Gossett qualified for finals in the 440 dash but scratched to compete with the mile relay team.

In the high school junior division, Jerry Lacy was 1st in the high jump and 3rd in the 330-yard dash. Kellam Colquitt was 6th in broad jump, 3rd in the pole vault and 5th in the 100-yd. dash. Tommy Sheffield was also 5th in the low hurdles.

Larry Whiteside placed 6th in the low hurdles and tied for 5th in the high jump. The 440 relay team of Colquitt, Sheffield, Lacy and Whiteside, placed 4th.

Eldorado won the meet, followed by Ozona, Iraan, Big Lake, Rankin and Eldorado.

Rankin took second place in the elementary division of the District track meet with 24½ points, edged out by Sanderson with 28.

In third place was Eldorado at

22 points, fourth, Ozona with 16; fifth, Iraan with 5½ and in last place, Big Lake with 3 points.

Placings for Rankin saw Billy Wayne Hale set a new record of 5.9 in the 50-yard dash for first place and also a first in the 100-yard dash.

have backed off and tried to take a look at Rankin through the eyes of a stranger—one seeing the town for the first time? Try it sometime.

During the recent city election, R. L. Bell said that he would be for working toward a clean-up of the city. That's a worthy objective with anyone.

Not so long ago, the beautifying of Rankin was one of the prime objectives of most of the civic organizations and a good many individuals and also drew considerable attention at city council meetings. Now one seldom hears any comment one way or the other. We seem to be content to "let it stand".

What do you suppose the first impression is on a stranger to Rankin? Does he see all the fine public buildings, the schools, the public facilities, the friendliness of the people—or does he see the many drab spots instead—spots that we who live with them daily become accustomed to and often fail to see in our day-to-day living.

Rankin is something of a paradox. On one hand, we have some of the nicest public buildings to be found anywhere for a town of this size. I often get salesmen in the office from out-of-town who, calling in Rankin for the first time, comment on what an impressive courthouse we have and how it would be a compliment to towns much larger. The number of paved streets in Rankin always impress outsiders.

The amount and condition of

the neglected buildings and property—not only on Main Street, but all over town, erases all the favorable impressions and the new comer leaves with the feeling that he has passed through the first stages of a ghost town. We who have lived here for any length of time, know, however, that this is not true and that a good many improvements have been made over the past ten or so years. The stranger does not know this.

And we seem to have reached the point of not being too interested one way or another—which just might well be one of the symptoms that indicates ghost-town sickness is approaching. A hearty boost on this by our civic clubs, the city and individuals might be in order.

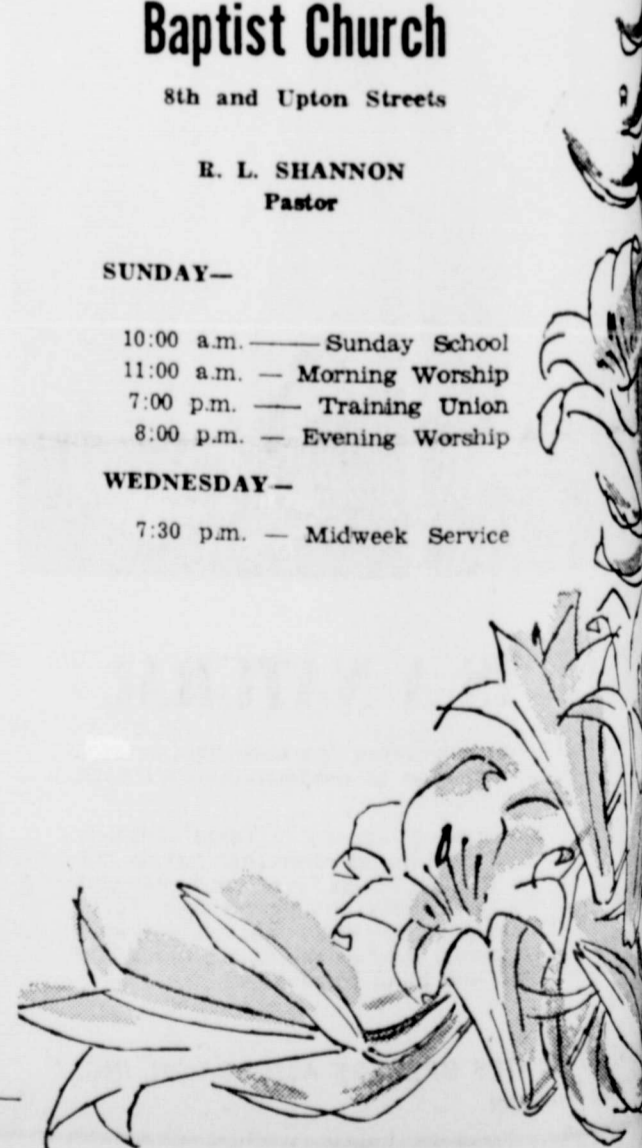
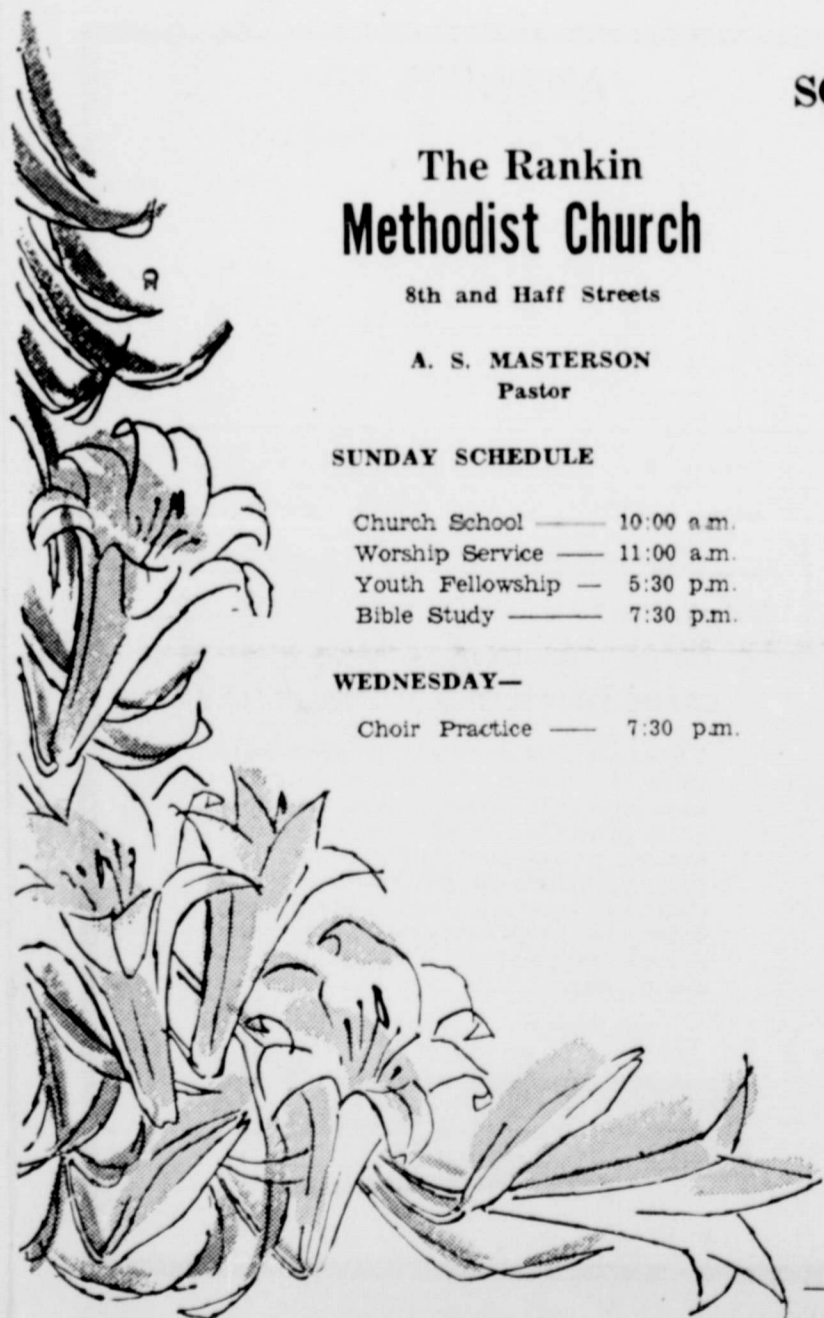

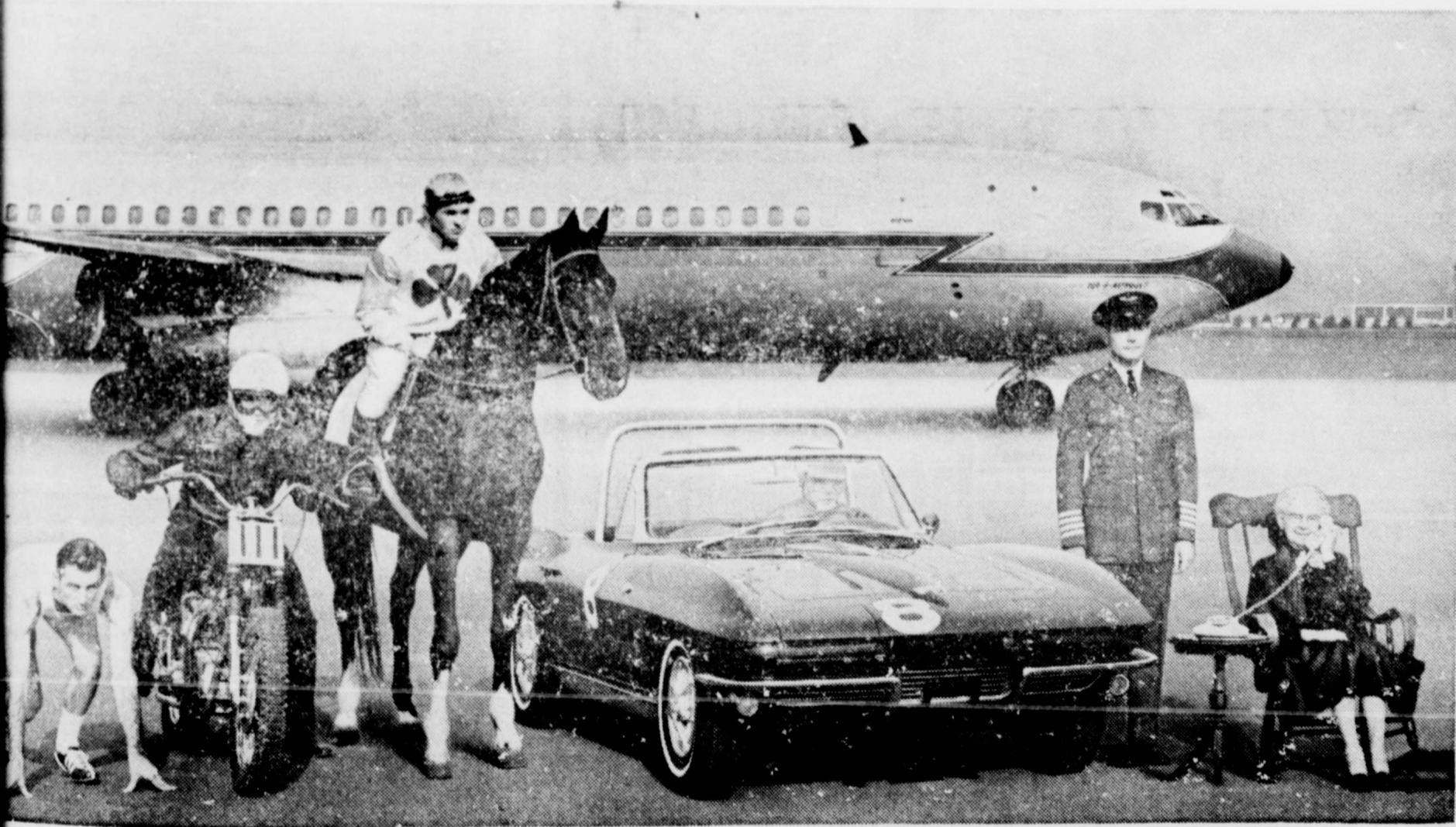
