The hospital's Operating Cost Sheet for April showed current accounts of \$7,978.82, with disbursements of \$7,080.32; leaving the net gain of \$898.50. Cash receipts for the period amounted to \$5,593.56 and total business to \$13,572.38.

Salaries accounted for the major part of the expenditures with \$4,290.90 having been paid out of the total expense of \$7,080.32.

The sheet indicated that total accounts receivable at the hospital as of May 1 amounted to \$36,-607.91.

1011 trays of food were served during that period at a total cost of \$692.24 or a cost of 68.5-cents per tray.


School is Out; So Are The Kids

Past history has shown that oil is where you find it and this bit of sage philosophy was proven to a fine point when the well being drilled in the city dump grounds in Rankin tested favorably in the Wolfcamp formation, flowing oil at the approximate rate of 240

barrels per day, plus a half-million cubic feet of gas. This is the first oil in this particular formation to be found within six miles of Rankin.

Drilling and testing of the well is continuing toward its contract dept of Ellenburger formation at approximately 12,000 feet.

Several weeks ago, mention was made in this column about a bill in the Texas Legislature that was supported by the Rankin School Board pertaining to certain school districts borrowing money for operational purposes on anticipated taxes. Legally, they had no way to borrow money on which to operate while the tax squabbles were being ironed out and often had to more or less toe the mark in order to get a settlement in time to begin operations of the school. When the new law goes into effect, school districts will no longer have their backs to the wall in tax disputes but will have a margin for maneuvering and will ot be entirely at the mercy of the large tax payers.

They thought it up and ran with the ball to the extent that other school districts realized its value and lent their support. Welsch says also that a good bit of credit must be given Rep. 


