Fourteenth All-Kid Rodeo Promises Colorful Week-End

For the fourteenth year, it's Rodeo Time in Rankin.

A festive aire began taking hold of th community this week as the day for the opening parade approached and all signs point to one of the biggest and best All-Kid Rodeos yet staged by the Upton County 4-H Club.

As last minute preparations for the two-night show were being worked out, entries began coming in at the office of County Agent Dub Day and he said that this could be a big one.

The fourteenth rodeo is being dedicated to Bud Poage, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walton Poage of

Rankin. His picture will appear on the front of the rodeo programs. Bud was one of the originators of the rodeo and has been in and assisted with 4-H Club work in Upton County for the past thirteen years.

Kicking off the activities at 5:30 p.m. Friday will be the parade, featuring floats by business firms, individuals and civic organizations, contestants by the score, pretty girls in bunches and horses of all sizes. Forming at the Rankin Park Building, the parade is to leave on eWst Tenth to Main, South down Main to Highway 67 and on out to the Dub Day 4-H Club Arena where action will begin at 8:00 p.m.

The Rankin Red Devil Band is to perform both nights at the arena.

Included in the events will be barrel races, calf roping, steer riding, hair pulling, ribbon roping, boot scrambles pole bending and other attractions. Entry fee is \$3.00 per event with junior and senior divisions.

Announcer this year will again be Ezra Trotter, the popular and fast-talking announcer who delighted the audiences last year and who contributed greatly toward keeping the show moving at a fast, even clip.

Bill Shaw will be the clown and provide additional laughs and color to the action.

Grimm Taylor is timekeeper, Les McFadden, Bud Poage and J. D. Shipp are judges while Mrs. Tex Collins, Mrs. Jay Lane and Mrs. Shankle Bloxom will be the bookkeepers.

Kenneth Welsch Resigns As RISD Superintendent

In their meeting last Tuesday night, members of the Rankin School Board accepted the resignation of Superintendent Kenneth C. Welsch. Welsch will stay on with the local school until July 1 when he and his family will move to West Columbia where he will take over duties as superintendent of the consolidated school district.

West Columbia, a 3-A school, is located some 50 miles south of Houston in Brazoria County and has an administrative staff composed of the superintendent, an as sistant superintendent, a tax collector, a business manager and five principals.

Members of the West Columbia school board were in Rankin last week and talked with a number of local residents and school board members before offering Welsch the position.

Rankin School Board has now

opened the position variated by Welsch to application until their next meeting on June 18 at which time they will consider applicants. They have set up the following procedure for application:

 All applications to be addressed to the school board in care of the business office.

(2) All applicants must have a Mas...s degree and an administrative certificate.

(3) All applicants must have had previous administrative experience.

(4) All applications are to be submitted in writing and accompanied by a data sheet.

The board will contact those applicants with whom they wish to speak personally and have requested that they, as board members, not be contacted in person nor individually.







Along with this reduction there will be a slight increase in most person-to-person calls within the state, Young announced. This will amount to five cents in the basic person-to-person rate on most day and evening calls.

The new reduced station-to-station rates for three-minute calls will fall into three brackets, according to the local manager.

Calls of 83 to 202 miles will cost 50-cents, a reduction ranging from five to 25 cents under present rates.

Calls of 203 to 360 miles will cost 60-cents, a reduction of 20 to 40-cents.

Calls of 361 miles or more will cost 80-cents, a reduction of 20 to 50-cents.

Station-to-station rates will not be reduced on calls made between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m., nor will the reduction apply on collect calls or on calls charged to a third telephone.

Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users

The following changes in the charges for long distance calls between points within the State of Texas will be made effective June 15, 1963:

Basic rates for station-to-station calls between 9 p.m. and 4:30 a.m. between points more than 82 miles apart will be reduced from 5 to 50 cents, with a maximum charge of 80 cents for a three-minute call, anywhere within the State of Texas.

Station-to-station rates remain unchanged on calls of less than 83 miles, and on calls made before 9 p.m. In Texas, the lower "after 9" rates will not apply on collect calls or on calls charged to a third telephone.

Person-to-person rates will not be changed on calls of 56 miles or less.

Basic rates for most person-to-person calls between points more than 56 miles apart will be increased five cents for both day and evening calls.
