John C. Upton was born in Tennessee and came to Texas in 1859. He raised a company at the outbreak of the Civil War which became a part of the 5th Texas Infantry, Hood's famed Texas Brigade. His company fought in the campaigns in and around Virginia, and after being promoted to Lt. Colonel, John Upton led a charge upon the enemy rear guard at the Battle of Second Manasses the day before his death there.

William F. Upton, also born in Tennessee, came to Texas in 1853. When the Civil War broke out, he enlisted in the Texas State Troops which protected the Texas Frontier. During his service, he helped to guard 2000 miles of frontier and coastline which was open to Union and Indian attack. William F. Upton served in the State Legislature in 1866 and 1876-1882.

The Texas State Histrical Survey Committee, State agency for historical preservation, is in charge of research and inscriptions for the markers.

The State Building Commission is responsible for their erection. The marker to be erected on the courthouse lawn on the south

east corner, is of Texas pink granite, stands five feet high, and has the Texas star and wreath incised at the top.

The marker is part of a three-

year program to commemorate the Civil War in Texas in stone. The TSHSC is endeavoring to place markers at important Civil War locations in Texas, for dis-(Continued To Page Five)

THE SCOOP by Scoop

MARKERS AND SUCH-

From time to time, we read in newspapers about historical markers being erected in this or that place. Several have been posted in or near Rankin. A program is underway-expected to take three years-to mark graves of Civil War veterans in Texas and to erect other markers related to the Civil War as it affected Texas. A story on one phase of this program appears elsewhere in this issue of The News.

All of these are worthwhile and contribute to the preservation of historical facts related to Texas and Upton County. They are of considerable interest to those of us who have lived here any length of time. And they are supposed to be of interest to tourists.

Perhaps they are. But hardly a month goes by during the summer when folk are traveling about the country that The News does not have a visitor or two who has some questions about the country and its history and almost without exception the querry come up: What about the Indians?

Maybe it's because of television

or the tales of the Wild West but the people who stop in who are from any distance to the east seem to always be interested in

And what about the Indians? It might be a little hard to get any detailed facts about their life in Upton County but from a few tales that I have picked up here and there, there was at one time, plenty of Indians in this immediate area. I'm told that a large campsite is located at the foot of one of the mountains between here and McCamey and that there is an Indian burial ground south of Rankin.

If we're really interested in attracting the attention of a few tourists, I'll betcha the Indians would outdraw all the other historical sites combined. If an arrangement could be worked out to open one or both of these sites to the public, it could well be worthwhile-even if we had to "salt" the area with a few arrow

Special Range Day Set For July 9th




