After the newspaper is printed and distributed, a group of numbers representing all those printed in the nine ads are put into a paper sack and the merchant draws one from his lot of numbers. This is the winner of his store prize and the number is posted in the place of business. Someone has that same number appearing in the merchant's ad in the newspaper. JACKJOT NUMBERS

THE WILD WEST-

For a good many years now we have all been accustomed to referring to the West—espec. ially the Old West—as being wild and wooley. It has often been said and taken as gospel, that in the West the sixgun was law.

That may well have been— in the Old West. But not anymore. A crime report just released by the FBI shows that the West is just not as tough nor violent as we have been lead to believe. In fact, only 15 percent of the murders in the U.S. were committed in the West in 1962 and only 14 percent of them by gunshot.

Compare this with the South—
of which Texas is listed as being a part and we find that this area accounted for 45 percent of the murders and that 52 percent of these were performed with gun in hand.

The South was followed by the North Central area with 23 percent of the killings and 23 percent by gunshot; and the Northeast with 17 percent and 11 percent.

Now this is nothing of which one should boast. In fact, it goes a long way toward putting a big blotch on the so-called Southern hospitality. On the other hand it proves that the Old West just ain't what she used to be.

Incidentally, for the record, the toughest big town in the U. S. is not New York. It's Chicago. They have the distinction of topping all major cities in crimes of all catagories except larceny of over \$50. In that one department, New York takes the cake.



foreboding and ar approach to the euverings of JFK's brain trust and the irles Ponzi of the 1920s. Their methods of opera. tion and their fiscal philosophies run paralled enough to cast a pall on the economic future of our Country if the present day "Miracle Workers" remain in

Ponzi was a daring and audacious swindler. He worked on the age-old desire of mankind to get something for nothing. He started a "firm", Securities Exchange Company in Boston. His newspaper ads read: "I have a new investment system which guaran. tees 50 per cent profit on your

money every 45 days."

People came running. Savings accounts were drawn out. Stocks and real estate were sold by those rushing into Ponzi's great plan to make men rich without lifting a finger. His system was simple: He just paid the first investors with new money being funneled in by newer investors. His operations were cloaked in great secrecy, made necessary, he glib! explained, because competitors were attempting to steal hi system. He said he was deaing in "postal reply coupons."

As the money rolled in, he began to spend huge sums. H bought a mansion, five Bost banks and a yacht. However, little more than a year, Ponzi's bubble burst. He was in jail. He died a pauper.

He thought that by paying in-


