#### CHANGE POLICY

In school policy study, the Board adopted the following additions and revisions of policy:

A detention hall for high school students is to be established. The detention hall is intended as punishment for minor offenses with the purpose to improve class discipline, to improve campus society, and to improve obedience to rules and regulations set forth by the high school principal within the framework of school policies. Students shall be assigned Tuesday, September 10.

to the detention hall only after conferences with the student, the teacher and the principal. The date and time assigned to the detention hall will be determined how and when the parents might be notified of the action. Time for the detention hall will be from 4:00 until 5:00 p.m. with bus students riding the activity bus. Students who might be assigned frequently to the detention hall could expect corporal punishment, suspension, or expulsion.

A policy revision for "Detainment after School", page 23. Policies and Regulations of the Rankin Public School results in "Pupils may be detained after school hours, after parents have been notified of a special problem. Elementary and Jr. High teachers may find it necessary to keep students in during a part of the noon hour, also.'

The revised policy on corporal punishment, also on page 23, of the Policies and Regulations now reads-"Corporal punishment this form of punishment is administered after careful thought. and is to take place in the principal's office. Any teacher who administers the punishment in the office without the principal's being present should have another teacher or the secretary as wit-

PROFOSED CONSTITUTIONAL

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION
NO. 1 proposing an amendment to
Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the
Constitution of the State of Texas
so as to repeal the provision making
payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorment for voting and so as to author-ize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows:
"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, any vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1962. dment shall take ef-

Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipa-

see invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all beliefs and at which election all ballots sha have printed thereon the following

"(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointed officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County; provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7½%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the political subdivision.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson Country, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson Country; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication. Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, con-tributed by the political subdivision is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have printiples of the printing words: ed thereon the following words:

"FOR the addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

Section 3. One might think that I no longer have The McCamey Hospital or Upton County at interest since I am no longer the administrator of The McCamey Hospital. This is not the case.

If you will compare the total expenditures for salary, etc. these totals are about the same. The accounts receivable is the difference. McCamey does have much more charity and poorer paying habits than Rankin. I believe your article in Scoop to be incorrect in saying Rankin and McCamey have about the same amount of charity.

As to the ball parks, I can not say, as I am not abreast of their expenditures. I do not prefer to elaborate on matters when I have only a scant idea on the subject.

I do admire your interest in conservatism in all levels of government. We should all be so interested.

ED. Mr. Rickles is well qualified to clear up the matter of why it costs twice as much to operate the McCamey Hospital as it does the Rankin Hospital. The Scoop stands corrected. McCamey does have more poor folk and dead beats than Rankin-but then, they have about twice the population and therein may be an indicator that if the county is to operate its own type of socialized medicine, then the cost can be reasonably estimated to nerease in proportion to the population.
