Remember how it zoomed right back up when it rained early in September? Well, the same thing could happea this year; cases are lextremely rare right now, but as soon as cool. wet weather arrives, you can just bet screwworm activity will pick up.
The time to prevent that fall build-up is RIGHT NOW! There are fewer screwworms now than at any time since March. At the same time, the plant near Mission is producing more fies per week- 130 millionJthan ever before. It's only logical that cooperation and assistance from producers coupled with sterile fly release should prevent a fall build-up from occurring, or at teast limit it to the extent that it can be quickly brought under control.
Like we said, we know it's extremely difficult to sell anyone on anything during the montin of August, but if you, through your personal contacts, can help sell the idea that a few precautions now can prevent a fall build-up
