# **School Enrollment Holds Better Than Expected**

Enrollment in Rankin Schools stood up better than at first expected and even registered gains in high school over last year's opening date. Due to transferrs by a number of people employed by oil companies, it was feared that a heavy loss in student enrollment would be experienced. In the Hementary School, a total of 188 students reported to class last Tuesday-opening day of the 1963-64 term. A healthy and wide-eyed fiftyfive first graders got their opening day experience in classroom work while forty-two turned up in the second grade; fifty-two for the third grade, giving it the second largest enrollment of any class in school; and thirty-nine in the 4th grade. Last year, on opening day, the figure was 226. At junior high, enrollment was near the same mark as it has been on past opening dates with 170 registered in four classes. The fifth grade listed fortythree students: the sixth grade, thirty-eight; the seventh grade,

forty-five and the eighth grade, forty-four. Last opening day saw 190 enrolled.

Due to a large group of freshmen, the high school chalked up a gain in first-day students on hand with 133 as compared to







resins now on the market, says the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The new plastic is strong, lightweight, and easy to fabricate, so says the USDA. It is of the type used in glass fiber-reinforced plastic boats, automobile and truck bodies, on construction panels, furniture and home appliances

Other apparent advantages of the pine-gum-based product are its higher strength and greater impact resistance, according to research being carried out by the USDA's Agricultural Research. It also has a low rate of water absorbtion and good resistance to alkalis and acids, indicating that the plastic can be used to produce stronger and longer lasting glass fiber-reinforced plastic products

Although additional research is needed to finish development of the product, work thus far indicates good possibilities that it will claim a share of the 200 million pounds a year market for polyester resins.. This market is expected to expand to a level of 300 million pounds by 1969.

The new plastic reflects the Department's continuing efforts to develop new uses and markets for agricultural commodities through research.




