Red Devils Seeking Win In Friday Alpine Trip

Following their first loss of the season, the 36-0 shelling last Friday night by the Golden Cranes, the Red Devils will take to the road this week and seek to get things back to normal—winning—at the expense of the Alpine Bucks. Kickoff time is 8:00 p. m. in Alpine and indications are that a fair number of Rankin supporters will follow the club.

Last year, the Red Devils had a well-earned 14-0 victory over Alpine. The Bucks promise to be somewhat tougher this year and only last week whacked Grandfalls 35-0. And Rankin may have to go without some of their top hands who are sidelined this week with injuries—none serious but all painful to the extent that only limited action may be seen Friday night by a good part of the Red Devil starting line-up.

Out of practice last Monday were Jerry McDonald, Sam Bean, Larry Braden, Ronnie Quick and David Brown—all key hands on both offense and defense for the Red Devils.

And as usual, the light Rankin

team will be at a weight disadvantage with the Bucks fielding some hefty linemen and capable backs.

There is optimism, however, among players and fans. Against a very strong Crane team (teams) last Friday, the Red Devils mov-

ed the ball well, grinding out some 10 first downs and would have likely made one or two touchdowns had not penalties and fumbles upset them.

Two Million Miles Without Accident—

RANKIN HALLIBURTON EMPLOYEES CHALK UP OUTSTANDING RECORD

Rankin employees of Halliburton Company were honored Tuesday night for driving more than two million miles without an accident.

The 48 local employees and

their families, headed by J. L. Simpson, district superintendent in charge, were presented the oil field service company's exclusive Two Million Mile Award. It was the second such award presented to Halliburton's Rankin employees.

M. W. (Cy) Reed, regional vice president from Halliburton's Duncan, Oklahoma, general headquarters, presented the trophy to Simpson and told the group:

"These achievements are particularly noteworthy in view of the fact that they were made during all kinds of driving and working conditions and in all kinds of weather.

"This driving record is at least seven times better than the driving record of the average American driver."

P. C. Mayfield, division manager from Midland, pointed out that, "You have even managed to better by a considerable margin the safety records established within the petroleum industry."

Renewed Fight On In Worm Eradication

Screwworm cases being detected in counties that haven't had infestation for many months indicate that it will require all of the resourcefulness screwworm eradication workers and livestockmen can muster to prevent a buildup of the insect this fall. Dolph Briscoe, Jr., Uvalde rancher and businessman and newly-elected president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, has said

Briscoe noted that screwworm cases had been reported in Fayette and Colorado counties, which are located in an area that has had no screwworms since spring. Other areas, including the Panhandle and Rolling Plains, are also showing an increase in the

Rankin Park Building. They included J. I. Jordan, manager of safety, from the Oklahoma headquarters; and Ted Thornton, regional safety supervisor, Midland.

screwworm infestations.

He said that these cases point up the fact that all parts of Texas are vulnerable to fall screwworm cases and that it will take complete cooperation from all livestock producers to prevent a buildup that could threaten the gains the eradication program has already made.

Briscoe stated that eradication

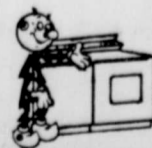
