### Knob Hill Getting Face Lifting --

## Dirt Work Underway On School Athletic Field

Work is now underway on Knob Hill where the construction of an athletic field calls for completion in time for use in next springs track and field events. Rankin Board of Trustees of Rankin Independent School District accept-

ed the low bid of \$9,966, submitted by the W. E. "Billy" Rankin Construction Company for the dirt work portion of the project. Other bids ranged upwards to \$14,000 for this work.

Billy Rankin reported Wednesday that the work was coming along well thus far but that they still had a long way to go. A considerable amount of rock must be moved around and fills made in order to get the site into the proper condition.

Overall plans call for the track facility to be located on the hill north of the administration building, overlooking the entire school campus, and will be generally utilized in the complete physical education program, according to school officials. Its nearness to the gymnasium dressing room will facilitate students' preparation for P. E. classes, and provide more time for P. E. activities during the class period, the office of the school superintendent has explained.

They open district in Menard on November 18 and host Big Lake the following week.

On October 2, it's Sonora in Sonora. October 9, Iraan comes to Rankin and the following week is the open date, followed by a trip to Sanderson October 23 and a visit the next week by Eldorado to Rankin.

November 6 calls for the long trip to Junction and the final is set for November 13 with Rankin to host Ozona.

It will be noted that each game is alternately on the road and at home with all the "far-away" places scheduled for out-of-town action.

## Soil Testing For Yards and Gardens

There has been some people asking the questions of what ad-testing will not tell you what the vantage is it to test your soil. Soil ground will grow or how much it will grow or if it is infested with disease or insects.

A soil test will aid in determining the need for nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium. Also, the amounts to be used can be determined from a soil test.

It will also determine the PH which is the acidity of the soil, and the amount of organic matter present in the soil and the amount of soluble salts in the soil.

A leaflet on how to collect soil

samples and also an information sheet and the containers for the sending of the soil are available at my office. The cost of this test is \$2.00 per sample. If you are interested in securing samples from several flower beds, take a little soil from each and mix thoroughly in a clean container. If you have a specific problem in your lawn and would like to have that particular soil analysed, do not mix with any other soil from over the lawn.

Most soil analysis which have been returned to this office have shown a high PH content with a low nitrogen level. An application of flake sulphur at the rate of one ton per acre or calcium sulphate has proved to be successful in lowering the PH of Upton County soil. However, if you have been applying some type of fertilizer in the past, a new analysis would be advisable.

The Upton County Community Improvement committee has outlined their projects for the year and one of them is lawn care and management. Therefore, a soil test is a must and a first in order to carry out lawn beautification.

At this time of the year the soil testing laboratory is not as busy as they are in the spring. Therefore, it would be advisable to get your samples in to the laboratory before the spring rush begins.

## Farm Buildings . . .

Farmers interested in labor saving equipment will want to look over the 1963-64 catalog of building and equipment plans available in the county extension agent's office.

Included in the catalog are listings of plans and blueprints for many utility type buildings, corrals, self feeders, stock trailers, and many other items of labor saving equipment. Plans listed in the catalog may be ord-

ered, free of charge, through the county agent.
