Eight Team Tournament Kicks Off Here Friday

Basketball fans and the public in general will get ample opportunity to view some thrilling action beginning at 2:30 p.m. Friday when the Eighth Annual Rankin Boys Basketball Tourament opens at the Red Devil Gym. Friday games are scheduled as follows: Iraan vs. Imperial at 2:30 p.m.. Wink vs. Big Lake at 4:00 p.m. McCamey vs. Ozona at 7:00 p.m. Sterling City vs. Rrankin at 8:00 p.m.

Saturday's play will open at 9:10 alm. in the consolation bracket and play will continue throughout the day with games scheduled approximately an hour and a half apart. Finals for the championship open at 9:00 p.m. Saturday night.

Big Lake is the defending champions, having won in 1961 and in 1962. They have not yet seriously taken to basketball, having been involved in the state playoffs in football and are expected to find the competition a bit rough in the tournament.

In the seven previous tournaments held, there have been only three champions with McCamey taking the first two in 1956 and 1957, Fort Stockton winning the next three from 1958 through 1960, and Big Lake, the last two. Rankin has never finished better than third place in their own tournament, that win coming in the first year. They have, however, taken several individual awards with Debs Gamblin being the high individual in 1956 and Johnny Rameriz being named the outstanding player of the tournament in 1958. In 1961. Bucky Scarborough of the Red Devils was named to the sportsman award and Roy Winters took that honor for Rankin last year.

The McCamey Badgers hold the record for the high team score for three games when they dropped in 198 points in 1956. The three-game low score went to Imperial in 1959 when they managed only 67 points in their three outings.

Two records are held by the Iraan Braves-the high one game score of 88 points marked up in 1958 and the low one game score, put into the books the previous year when they rang the bell only 21 times.

Trophies were put on display on Monday at the West Texas Utilities office in Rankin and included the championship, 2nd, 3rd and consolation winner awards. Individual awards given in the match are for outstanding player, sportmanship, all-tournament team 10,

and championship team, 10. The public is encouraged to attend these games and cheer for their favorites.





Game Crop Increase Noted by Sportsmen BY W. M. (DUB) DAY County Agent, Upton County

The deer hunting season is in full swing and hunters are reminded that they, too, have a large stake in the screwworm eradication program underway in the Southwest.

Early reaction from sportsmen indicates that wild game is more pentiful than it has been in years. Estimates of 10 to 65 percent increases in the deer crop have been made.

A number of factors have been credited for the increase in deer populations, with the screwworm eradication program usually listed at the top. Some wildlife experts have stated that in past years the screwworm has accounted for the death of at least three out of every ten fawns each year.

The eradication program seeks to eliminate the screwworm by release of millions of screwworm flies that have been sexually sterilized by being subjected to atomic radiation. The sterile males mate with native fertile females and no offspring are produced. Sportsmen helped finance the program through their contributions last year.

While the screwworm appears to be on its way to extinction, the heaviest infestations of the insect presently being deteced are in the areas with the highest population of deer.

Hunters are encouraged by program officials to bring sightings of infested deer to the attention of land owners so that the cases can be reported to eradication workers. Infestations in wildlife are even more critical to the program than those in farm animals because they cannot be treated. A single undetected, untreated case can be the source of hundreds of future infestations.


