After the program, there will be audience participation in singing Christmas Carols.



another matter. The Eagles have four of their five starters back from last year and have the big boy in the district with a lad who stands about 6' 6" tall and is a capable player in addition.



### POLICICS-

Since we are about to enter a new round of politics and since we have just began to recover a little from a most shocking political happening, it might be well if we stepped back and took a small look at ourselves and the political scene.


It's not uncommon to hear someone say that they don't like politics, that all politics are "rotten" or that they just ignore politics. That's a very poor attitude and one that is not entirely true. In the first place, this nation is a political nation-as are all types of governments. To say that one doesn't like politics is to say that they have no appreciation for the American system or governments in general. They evidentally prefer the type of society in which the survival of the strongest is of the essence. To say that one never takes part in politics is also an untruth for you do take a parteither by direct action or by failure to fullfill your rightful role.

Politics is important and if we as individuals are going to make any wothwhile contributions to the political scene, it seems to me that we are going to have to change our thinking a little. We are going to have to realize that we have a responsibility and we are going to have to look at that responsibility a little more realistically.

In determining which candidate will get our vote, may of us have failed as qualified voters. We very often use the wrong yardstick in making our selections. We ask ourselves: Do we like this fellow? Does he belong to the right club, the right church, the right party? Has he been a good Republican or a good Democrat? Is he kind to old ladies and children? Does he need the job? Is he rich? Is he a "smoothe" speaker? Does he "play ball"? Is his wife attractive?

Perhaps the time has come for us to look upon the candidate and measure him with this one question: Is he the best man for the job? Until we reach the point of electing our office holdrers— for every office from dog catcher to President—with the thought in mind that only the best qualified man available should hold the job, we are all guilty of immature thinking in our political judgment.

Stick with a party if you must. but demand that that party look for and offer the best quality available in their candidates. And remebers, that quality does no necessarily have to come wrapped in a pretty package—nor does it have to be of a size that's exactly to our personal liking. It doesn't even have to smell good.

## **Other Insects May Follow Screwworm In Eradication Work**

Until recently the screwworm was the only insect that had been eradicated in practical operations by releasing sterile insects. However, in expericents in 1962 and 1963 on the island of Rota in the Pacific, the Department's Hawaii Fruit Fly Laboratory demonstrated that the melon fly can




